


1.1 MISSION STATEMENT

In October 2024, the project technical team began working with the Middletown Township Comprehensive Parks, Recreation, Open Space, Greenways, and Trails Plan (CPROSGT) Steering Committee, to:

- Engage residents and interested partners in the community;
- Assess the conditions of open spaces, parks, and recreational facilities:
- Explore alternatives for additional facility development and recreational programming; and
- Utilize the previously completed Middletown Multimodal Improvement Plan (2024) to fine-tune trail options and pedestrian connections.

The project goal was to develop a concise plan with specific recommendations that are aligned with the 2020 Middletown Comprehensive Plan's vision for the future of the Township.

The CPROSGT Plan was completed within twelve (12) months. Like many communities across the nation, the COVID-19 pandemic has etched into the collective consciousness important lessons about the critical role of parks and outdoor spaces in healthy lives. Recreation and open spaces are high-value assets to families and businesses when choosing a place to call home.

Parks often symbolize the identity of a community. This is true in Middletown— where multiple generations have shared stories and memories of family and friends who have run to, played in, and explored cherished Township spaces. The Middletown community's enthusiasm for its parks is palpable.

The final CPROSGT plan will serve as a vital planning document for the Middletown Township Parks & Recreation Department - and will serve as a companion guide to the: Middletown Multimodal Improvement Plan; the 2021 Middletown Climate Action Plan; and current and future Middletown Comprehensive Plans – by providing specific directions and implementation strategies for preferred improvements.



This CPROSGT was funded by a grant from the PA Department of Conservation & Natural Resources (DCNR) Community Conservation Partnerships Program (C2P2).

Middletown Township undertakes this CPROSGT planning effort to ensure that it provides:

- 1. Safe, accessible, and inclusive parks that promote healthy outdoor interactions.
- 2. Creative recreational programming for all ages and abilities to promote physical, mental, and social health.
- 3. Attention to preservation, maintenance, and sustainability of existing open spaces for natural systems to flourish.
- 4. Desired safe trail and sidewalk connections for pedestrians and cyclists between communities, to and through neighborhoods, and to parks.
- 5. Efficient stewardship of Township resources for the upkeep of spaces that are a source of community pride.

1.2 VISIONS & OPPORTUNITIES SUMMARY

The Middletown Township Comprehensive Parks, Recreation, Open Space, Greenways, and Trails Plan (CPROSGT) replaces the 2005 Middletown Millenium Recreation, Parks, and Open Space Plan and is anticipated to be adopted by Middletown Township.

The MT CPROSGT Steering Committee reviewed the 2020 Middletown Comprehensive Plan elements and established the following Vision Statements, Goals, and Opportunities:

Vision 1

Accessible, safe, modern Township parks

Goals

Create a stewardship management system to ensure that ADA-compliant, universalaccessibility features are incorporated within every Middletown Township park, including actions to:

- Deliver paths through each park.
- Prioritize phased facilities replacements based on condition, age, and universal accessibility.

Opportunities

- 1.1 Implement elements of the Middletown Township Park Accessibility Strategy 1.2 Adapt / update the Middletown Township Parks signage system 1.3 Implement the Twin Oaks Park
- Master Site Development Plan 1.4 Regularly update a municipal log of all recreation facilities

Vision 2

Parks linked to neighborhoods by safe pedestrian and bicycle routes

Goals

Create safe bicycle and pedestrian access from Middletown neighborhoods to the nineteen (19) municipal parks, four (4) municipal preserves, five (5) Bucks County parks, and to the regional trails and bike routes that link Middletown and its neighboring communities, including actions

- · Build the missing 'last half mile' linkages between parks and existing pathways / bike routes.
- · Pursue partnerships to build missing connections to County and neighboring municipal trails.

Vision 6

Definitions

Accessibility – refers to the design of facilities and spaces to be usable by people of all abilities, including compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards.

Easement – is a legal agreement that allows the use of land for a specific purpose(s), such as conservation or public access.

Floodplain – is an area of low-lying land adjacent to a stream or river which stretches from the banks of its channel to the base of the enclosing valley walls, and which experiences flooding during periods of high flows.

Greenway – is usually a linear corridor of land set aside/ conserved for recreational use(s) and/or environmental stewardship.

Multimodal – refers to transportation systems that integrate multiple modes of travel, such as walking, biking, and public transit.

Naturalization – is the process of restoring land to a more naturally-functioning ecosystem, often by planting native vegetation, minimizing human intervention, and removing invasive species.

Open Space – are areas of land and water designated for use as active or passive recreation and/or for natural resource protection, including: parks, agricultural lands, natural lands such as wetlands, woodlands, etc., untended lands, and connecting greenways, blueways, and trails.

Passive Recreation – are activities that require minimal facilities, have low impact on the environment, and are commonly non-competitive, such as walking or birdwatching.

Active Recreation – includes play activities that involve physical exertion and often require structured facilities or equipment, such as sports or playgrounds.

Riparian – the interface between land and a water body such as a river, stream, lake, or wetland.

Stormwater Management – include practices and systems designed to control and reduce runoff from rain and storms to prevent flooding, erosion, and pollution of water bodies.

Watershed – is an area or region of land that drains into a specific river, river system, or other body of water.

Wetland – is an area of land where water covers the surface or saturates the soil for part of the year, and is characterized by the presence of water, specialized vegetation, and unique soil types.



2.1 TOWNSHIP PROFILE

2.1.1 **Township History**

Middletown Township was formally established in 1692 by William Penn and his surveyor General Thomas Holme. It shares similarities with many townships that were part of the original three counties that surrounded Philadelphia and attracted Swedish and Dutch colonists seeking a "new home" close to the major seaport and commercial and political hub of Philadelphia as well as lush and abundant farmland.

These early settlers were followed by waves of immigrants from the British Isles and by the development of rail and commerce. Langhorne Terrace and Parkland, on the western side of the Township, were developed as summer home communities; other parts of the Township, including Attleboro, now incorporated as Langhorne Borough, developed along rail lines that connected the community to Philadelphia and Trenton.

The early 20th century saw the rise of the automobile, which led to additional development in Middletown Township as Philadelphians moved away from the city to more rural areas. In 1952, US Steel opened the Fairless Steel Works in neighboring Falls Township, employing more than 8,000 workers by the early 1970's.

To house these workers, Levitt & Sons completed the largest planned suburban community in the country, Levittown in 1958, which sprawls across the southern half of the Township and three neighboring municipalities. (For more on the cultural landscape created by Levittown, see sidebar on page 14.)

There is a rich history of recreation in Middletown, as well. Levittown was exceptional in its creation of a "complete community" with areas in each neighborhood set aside for schools, churches, pools, parks, and greenbelts. Levittown had as many as five public pools, including the former pool at Forsythia Crossing Park. The Pinewood Pool, now operated by Falls Township, is the only pool that remains. Levittown's early greenways continue to provide respite to residents today, demonstrating the development's enduring recreation legacy.

Pennsylvanians still seek out Middletown Township for its central location to many of the region's landmark attractions, educational opportunities, and commercial centers.


Levittown's Cultural Landscape

When it was built, Levittown was envisioned as the archetypical American suburb, and in striving to achieve that status, a unique cultural landscape was created that endures today.

The "development" is divided into numerous neighborhoods. Within each neighborhood, every street begins with the same letter as the neighborhood (for example, in Quincy Hollow you can find Quill, Quartz, and Queens **Bridge Roads, while Forsythia Gate contains** Falcon, Firtree, and Flamingo Roads). With this naming convention, addresses could easily be located.

The Levittown road network is also noteworthy. Within the development, there are no four-way intersections, except for major roads that pre-existed the neighborhoods. Each neighborhood is surrounded by a "drive" type of street with the same name as the neighborhood and these drives each connect internal neighborhood "roads" to the larger regional road network.

Sidewalks are also a key part of Levittown's cultural landscape. Every Levittown neighborhood has sidewalks on all streets, to provide residents with opportunities for connection and exercise. The only exceptions are neighborhood called "The Gates" (Red Rose Gate, Forsythia Gate and Snowball Gate) which were intended for management and executive workers. These workers were expected to exercise and relax at the nearby country club rather than in their own neighborhoods like workingclass residents, and so sidewalks were not created inside the "gates".





2.1.3 Demographics & Economy

Population/Age/Race

Population Trends and Forecasts: 2015 - 2045

Middletown Township has a population of 46,040 as of the 2020 census, a 1.37% increase from the 2015 population. This represents roughly 7% of Bucks County. DVRPC municipal population forecasts indicate that Middletown Township population is expected to increase approximately 6% by 2045. This estimate is lower than the 7.57% population increase by 2045 expected in Bucks County overall.

Age

The largest increases in population in Middletown Township between 2011 and 2021 are:

- 65 to 69 years (+1.9%)
- 55 to 59 years (+1.7%)
- Under 5 years / 85+ years (both +1.4%)

The largest population decreases between 2011 and 2021 are:

- 50 to 54 years (-3.4%)
- 45 to 49 years (-2.2%)
- 15 to 19 years (-1.6%)

The growing segment of aging population is a demographic that seeks pedestrian connections to both active and passive recreational amenities as well as other destinations (transit, retail, etc.) as they navigate changes to mobility due to age. Similarly, the increase in young children in the Township represents a population requiring a variety of recreational opportunities including both active and passive recreation.

Racial Diversity

82.2% of Middletown Township's residents identify as White/Caucasian. (This is also proportionate to Bucks County, which is 80.7% White/Caucasian). The past ten years have seen a shift in the racial composition of Middletown Township. The most notable of these changes is a 6.0% decrease in White residents, while the share of Black/African American residents rose 1%, Asian residents rose 1%, and Hispanic/Latino residents rose 1.7%. Also notable is a 2% rise in residents identifying as two or more races.

Income/Industry/Education

Median Household Income & Poverty

Middletown Township experienced a significant 22.8% growth in median household income from \$78,292 (2011) to \$101,356 (2021). This growth was replicated in neighboring municipalities such as Upper Makefield (+23.4%) and Bristol (+24.1%) and is also similar to the 23.4% growth experienced in Bucks County as a whole.

Middletown Township (4.7% to 4.5%) and Newtown Township (3.7% to 1.8%) were the only municipalities in Bucks County to see a reduction in the percentage of the population below the poverty level between 2012 and 2021. The neighboring municipalities of Bristol (8% to 9.9%) and Bensalem (6% to 9.9%) saw significant increases, while at the County level, Bucks saw an increase from 5.4% to 5.5%.

Educational Attainment

95.3% of Middletown residents have at least a high school diploma, while 38.9% have achieved at least a bachelor's degree. This level of attainment is similar to Bucks County, where 94.5% have a high school diploma and 42.9% have a bachelor's degree. Other notable statistics for Middletown include: 4.7% have no high school diploma and 17.3% have some college experience but did not finish their degree.

Commuting/ Vehicle Ownership

Method of Commute (2021)

- 79.4% driving alone
- 6.9% carpooling
- 2.2% use public transportation, and
- 10% work from home

The 2020 Census indicates an increase in the "work from home" category, which began to increase as a result of the impact of the COVID epidemic, but industry analysts agree that working from home is an established growing option for workers.

Vehicles Available by Household

Middletown statistics for vehicle ownership within the workforce population over the age of 16 years in the Township (23,902):

No access to vehicle: 1.3%
Access to 1 vehicle: 11.1%
Access to 2 vehicles: 40.4%
Access to 3 vehicles: 47.2%

These numbers of vehicles within the Township emphasize the importance of planning for and implementing safe multimodal connections to parks and open spaces.

Community Character

Middletown Township, like much of Lower Bucks County, is a highly developed suburban community. Remnants of the Township's agricultural past remain evident, particularly north of the Rt.1 corridor and CSX's Morrisville Train Line, though, outside of land preserved by the Township and/or County, the vast majority of agricultural lands have been developed. South of the Rt.1 corridor, the Township's suburban character dominates, particularly in the Levittown section, where neighborhoods are well connected internally, but often isolated from their surroundings unless using a motor vehicle.

2.2 METHODOLOGY: DATA COLLECTION AND SITE RECONNAISSANCE

The basis of the analysis efforts for this Plan was the compilation of the best available data from Geographic Information System (GIS) mapping sources and the updating of specific park, recreation and open space features through in-person site visits and conversations. Existing plans or records from the Township also were consulted.

The following sources provided the data presented in this Plan:

- Pennsylvania Spatial Data Access (PASDA)
- Delaware Valley Planning Commission (DVRPC) GIS data and planning resources
- PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR)
- Bucks County Planning Commission
- US Department of Agriculture
- US Geological Survey

Site reconnaissance tours were conducted multiple times throughout the study duration with and without Township staff, both formally and informally.

Formal reconnaissance included two full-day MT parks tours and full-day in-person MT P&R Department interviews with Public Works/Parks staff.

2.3 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

The public participation component of the CPROSGT included the following outreach elements:

- Public Meetings
- Key Person Interviews
- Focus Groups
- Attendance at two (2) MT P&R Special Events
- Online Public Opinion Survey

Steering Committee meetings were held to provide a forum to present technical data and analysis to Committee members and to solicit their specific comments on the information. Feedback at these meetings helped to inform materials presented at each subsequent Public Meeting. These meetings were open to the public.

All meeting materials for both Steering Committee and Public Meetings were posted to the Middletown Township website, and the public was invited to contact the consultant team directly with comments or questions. Public Meetings were held at the Middletown Township Municipal Center and virtually to allow for greater participation.

Notes from all Committee and Public Meetings are included in the Appendix of this report.



2.3.1 Public Meetings

Public Meeting #1: January 23, 2025 – Programming and Brainstorming

The consultant team and Township staff introduced the purpose, timeline, and elements of the CPROSGT study, basic geophysical data about the Township, and an introduction to the public opinion survey. The meeting presentation illustrated the scope of the MT parks, and described the resource analysis process and the range of definitions used for open space. A brainstorming session followed the presentation with participants invited to rotate between four breakout stations, each focused on parks within a different quadrant of the township.

Comments received included:

- Lack of pedestrian connections (trails, crosswalks) makes access to Core Creek Park difficult
- New trails should connect Core Creek Park to Styer Orchard
- Additional pickleball courts should be added at Core Creek and Middletown Community Parks
- Meadows and other naturalized areas should be added throughout the park system
- Twin Oaks Park could use additional maintenance, improved stormwater management, and additional parking
- A public pool is desired, particularly following the closure of the pool at Forsythia Crossing
- Patriot Path at Veterans Memorial Park could be extended, connected to Greenway trails
- Creek access at Cobalt Ridge Park is difficult because of "overgrown" riparian buffer
- New trails at Langhorne Spring Water Co. would be appreciated
- Firefighters' Park and playgrounds in general need more shade
- Invasive removal and native plant seeding would make great community events
- Connections between the eastern and western (Langhorne/ Parkland) portions of the township are important

Public Meeting #2: March 27, 2025 – Preliminary Concepts

The consultant team summarized the research and analysis to date, including: preliminary results of the online public opinion survey; feedback received at the first public meeting; initial takeaways from Key Person Interviews; and analysis of existing sidewalks, trails, open space, and wetlands.

The consultant team then presented four initial concepts for the plan:

- 1. Improve access to and, where appropriate, within MT open spaces
- 2. Improve pedestrian/bicycle connections to MT parks
- 3. Park facility improvements: maintain expectations of clean/safe/ready to use parks, with consistent capital funding, a sustainable fee schedule, and successional plan for continued success.
- 4. Continued strategic growth of programming to eliminate barriers for participation with processes and procedures memorialized.

Brainstorming followed in one online and three in-person breakout groups, focused on four questions:

- 1. Which Township or County Park would you most like to access by bike or walking? Comments included:
- Core Creek Park
- Middletown Community Center
- Middletown Community Park
- Styer Orchard
- Connections from Levittown to other neighborhoods
- 2. What would be your "Generational Project" (large-scale, money-is-no-object, dream project)? Comments included:
- · Pedestrian tunnel at Woodbourne Rd.
- An amphitheater. Could be a source of income for the Township.
- · Public pool/Splash pads
- Year-round restrooms
- Outdoor classrooms
- Turf field complex
- Indoor recreation facility

- 3. What are the top three (3) MT parks requiring major capital improvements?
- Middletown Community Park: Skate Park phase 2, Pickleball courts, connections to Township Line Road, more basketball courts, additional event parking
- Middletown Community Center: ADA accessible bathrooms
- Twin Oaks Park: field improvements, playground improvements, paved path around the park
- Simmons Park: new play equipment, consistent surfacing on the path
- Firefighters' Park: improved parking, water fountain, restrooms
- · Trails at Forsythia Crossing Park
- 4. What is your assessment of recreational programming?
- Overall, the diversity and amount of programs is great!
- Is there room for more casual (noncompetitive) athletics on MT park facilities?
- Important to maintain pickleball courts for drop-in use
- More diversity of non-sports programming would be appreciated

Public Meeting #3: May 15, 2025 - Draft Plan & Recommendations

The consultant team summarized public participation comments received to-date and presented six (6) draft visions for the plan, as well as preliminary recommendations for the plan. The "Visions" presented were:

- 1. Vision 1: Accessible, safe, modern Township parks
- 2. Vision 2: Parks linked to neighborhoods by safe pedestrian and
- 3. Vision 3: Recreation programming excellence
- 4. Vision 4: Increased availability and access to open space
- 5. Vision 5: Efficient and sustainable Parks and Recreation management, maintenance, and administration
- 6. Vision 6: Township policy/ordinances to support recreation needs, with funding strategies to achieve multi-functional infrastructure improvements.


Recommendations included:

- 1. The Middletown Parks Accessibility Strategy
- 2. Priority Pedestrian-Bicycle Connections
- 3. Open Space: Improve access to and, where appropriate, within open spaces and celebrate open spaces as "preserves"
- 4. Field Use and Maintenance: Clarify division of maintenance responsibilities between Parks & Rec and youth athletic associations and track field use to coordinate maintenance activities
- 5. Implementation recommendations: revision Zoning Ordinance and SALDO to support open space provision and development and create a Middletown Official Map to express the Township's interest in acquiring specific lands for public purposes.

Discussion included questions about the potential for acquiring land to provide improved access to Core Creek Park, locating trailheads outside of neighborhoods, and the potential for a pool or splash pad to be included in the recommendations.

2.3.2 Key Person Interviews

A total of nine (9) Key Person Interviews were conducted with organizations and individuals who have knowledge, experience, and specific interests in advancing various aspects of recreation and open space services in Middletown Township. Conducted both virtually and in-person, these meetings established important perspectives of the varied ways that recreation and open space are integrated into everyday life in the MT community. Notes from Key Person Interviews are included in the Appendix Section 3.

Pertinent comments/information received from the KPIs are highlighted below:

Heritage Conservancy (HC)

- Styer Orchard is owned by the Township, operated by the farmer (who holds a lease on the property), and funding is controlled by HC. HC is interested in increasing programming at the property and is open to simplifying the relationship by potentially purchasing the property from the Township or by transferring funds to the Township with restrictions.
- HC holds the conservation easement at Langhorne Spring Water Company, and could be open to trail development, but additional information is needed.

Bucks County Staff

- Currently updating the Bucks County CRPOSP, focused on maintaining existing assets and increasing accessibility.
- · Core Creek Park: exploring conversion of agricultural fields, plans for emergent wetlands at the north end of the lake as a water quality BMP.
- Core Creek Neshaminy Greenway Trail to connect the Park to Woodbourne Road near Ellis Road will be completed in 2026.
- Partnership opportunities may exist around a potential indoor recreation center.

Emergency Responders

- · Main priorities for improvements would be visibility into parks, lighting, and emergency access.
- · Wayfinding system along trails for emergency responders and open-access AEDs would also be desirable amenities.

Middletown Senior Center Association

- Facility is owned by the Township and leased to the Senior Center for \$1/yr.
- Township provides Summer Camp, classes, and rents some rooms individually to third parties.
- Current building does not meet Senior Center needs, particularly with the shortage of ADA-compliant restrooms.
- An addition and/or new two-story facility would be desirable.

Middletown Township Supervisors

- Supervisors would like to see deed restrictions on existing Township-owned open space properties to ensure development of these properties cannot occur.
- Supervisors hear many concerns about rezoning requests for higher-density development, would like recommendations for strengthening Zoning and SALDO.

St. Mary Medical Center

 Existing trail network on St. Mary campus frequently used by the public, could provide "low-hanging fruit" for expansion of Township trail network.

Woods Services

- Currently working with PennDOT on Corn Crib Bridge design (connects Woods' properties on north and south sides of Rt. 1) as part of PennDOT-RC3 (Rt. 1 Reconstruction Project).
- Woods is interested in "integrating" the campus with the larger neighborhood, could be open to providing access to Township residents to one indoor and two outdoor pools on campus as well as other recreational amenities.

Neshaminy School District

- · Currently facilities are locked after school hours for safety and liability reasons.
- Athletic organizations are sometimes permitted to use school facilities under strict parameters, but costs are rising due to custodial staff overtime.

Neighboring Boroughs

 Boroughs are interested in the idea of connecting neighborhoods to Langhorne Spring Water Company Preserve and other projects that provide safe pedestrian movement.



2.3.3 Focus Groups

Focus groups were selected by MT to engage a cross-section of voices into two (2) specific areas of interest to this CPROSGT report: Youth Athletic Organizations and Neighboring Parks & Recreation Directors.

Some cross-over existed between groups also represented in the Key Person Interview process. Valuable feedback was received during these meetings, as attendees reinforced priorities expressed within the selected topics or highlighted issues or groups within the Township that had not been considered.

Focus Group areas of interest and attendees are noted below with highlights of those discussions:

Athletic Organizations Focus Group

- Hulmeville Soccer Club
- Langhorne Athletic Association
- Middletown Athletic Association

Participants expressed a need for increased clarity of responsibilities for maintenance at Township-owned fields as well as the need for additional facilities based on current demand.

Neighboring Parks and Rec Directors Focus Group

- · Bensalem Parks and Recreation
- Bristol Parks and Recreation
- Falls Township Parks and Recreation
- Lower Makefield Parks and Recreation
- Lower Southampton Parks and Recreation
- Northampton Township Parks and Recreation

Participants expressed a desire to collaborate on both new and continuing programming.

Notes from Focus Group sessions are included in the Appendix Section 4.

2.3.4 Public Opinion Survey

The consultant team, in collaboration with Middletown Township staff, crafted a 22-question public opinion survey to assess resident and park user sentiments on current park and recreational programming offerings in Middletown. Several questions were intended to gauge public sentiment on the preservation of open space within the Township.

The survey was launched to the public in October 2024, and public response was very strong, with over 1,500 responses recorded through May 2025.

Highlights of the public opinion survey include:

- Active use of the park system in Middletown, with almost 60% of respondents reporting using a park several times per week
- Strong public support for safe pedestrian connections
- Strong public support for the preservation of natural open spaces

The complete summary of the online public opinion survey can be found in the report Appendix Section 5.

2.4 SUMMARY OF EXISTING PLANNING DOCUMENTS

2.4.1 Prior Plan: 2005 Millennium Park Plan

The previous Recreation, Parks, and Open Space Plan (known as the Millennium Park Plan and completed in 2005) produced an inventory, analysis, and recommendations based the Township's needs and desires at the time.

Highlights of the plan included:

- A focus on conservation of natural resources
- Recommendations to consider the parks as a system through marketing and infrastructure improvements
- Recommendations to build greenways and trail connections
- Recommendations to consider constructing an indoor recreation facility to provide for life-long recreation opportunities
- Recommendations to invest in the Parks and Recreation Department at a level "commensurate with responsibilities and resources."

The Township has made significant progress toward multiple goals and objectives set out in the Millennium Park Plan. In 2024, approximately 40% of Parks and Recreation Department revenue came from non-tax sources, representing a doubling of this number from 2005.

The acquisition of the Saba Property (now frequently referred to as Saba Open Space) represents a significant step towards conserving natural resources in the Township.

The Middletown Multimodal Improvement Plan (see below) provides a master plan for bicycle and pedestrian trails, also recommended in the Millennium Park Plan.

Other significant Township developments toward Millennium Park Plan goals include: the development of the 2010 Twin Oaks Park Master Plan; field development and renovations at Simmons. Jones, and Firefighters' Parks; expanded programming and program staff; and the move to using RecDesk for recreation program registration.



2.4.2 Middletown Township Comprehensive Plan (2020)

The Township's Comprehensive Plan, adopted in 2020, is subtitled "Connecting Our Community to Embrace the Future."

Goals from the Recreation section include:


- Create greater community cohesion by connecting parks and recreation facilities.
- Invest in the parks and recreation facilities to sustain and enhance the quality of life.
- Establish greater walkability and bikeability in and surrounding the parks.


Strategies include:

- Recreation Strategy #1: Coordinate with Bucks County in greenway planning and implementation. Greenway sections include: Lower Neshaminy Creek Trail, Middle Neshaminy Creek Trail, Newtown Loop Trail, Newtown Rail Trail, and Mill-Queen Anne-Black Ditch Creek Trail
- Recreation Strategy #2: Update the Middletown Millennium Plan's Recreation, Parks, & Open Space Plan (This strategy provided the impetus for the creation of this CPROSGT plan)
- Recreation Strategy #3: Implement existing master plan for Twin Oaks Park
- Recreation Strategy #4: Continue practice of upgrading existing facilities
- Recreation Strategy #5: Maintain preserves
- Recreation Strategy #6: Increase public access to open space and recreation properties controlled by others
- Implementation steps include: Initiate discussions with Neshaminy School District to provide access to Idlewood **Environmental Study Center:**
- Work with HOA's with open space properties along proposed trails to ensure trail alignment takes open spaces into account.

Relevant goals from the Sustainability section include:


 Sustainability Strategy #2: Improve the stormwater management system to mitigate pollution and flooding: Incorporate "green" approaches to stormwater management, such as planting specific trees and shrubs in parks, open space, and preserved areas that help serve that purpose.





2.4.3 Middletown Multimodal Improvement Plan

The Middletown Multimodal Improvement Plan was adopted in 2023 as an element of the Township 2020 Comprehensive Plan. Some MIP opportunities align with the CPROSGT including strategies to improve connectivity within the Township for pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users, and mobility aid users. Recommendations for connections to parks and open spaces in the Township include sidewalks, side paths, bike lanes, crosswalks, and bike parking, among others. A full list of parksrelated recommendations is included in Appendix Section 6.




2.4.4 Middletown Climate Action Plan

The Middletown Climate Action Plan, adopted in 2021, is the first local climate action plan prepared in Bucks County. The Plan provides goals for the Township's greenhouse gas emissions reductions and identifies how these efforts could improve the Township's climate resilience. Actions relevant to this planning effort include:

- WR-2E: Deploy recycling containers at Township parks to prevent littering and to divert recyclables from solid waste stream.
- TR-1B: Partner with PennDOT to expand the local bike lane network and to make roadways safer for bicyclists.
- TR-1C: Improve sidewalk connectivity between residential and commercial developments.

The plan notes that "Actions that reduce impervious surfaces can reduce the potential for flooding by retaining stormwater in place. These types of actions include ... expanding or restoring green space".



2.4.5 Bucks2040 Vision Plan

Bucks2040 Vision Plan is a comprehensive and vision plan for the county and was adopted in January 2024. Though the plan is wide-ranging, addressing a variety of issues, parks and recreation are relevant to many areas of the plan, as shown below.

Seven (7) issues of greatest importance have been established:

- 1. Make housing more attainable
- 2. Promote economic opportunity
- 3. Expand our travel options
- 4. Act on climate change
- 5. Improve our infrastructure
- 6. Enhance our parks and trails
- 7. Protect our farmland and natural resources

2.5 ZONING AND SALDO ORDINANCES 2.5.1 What are Zoning & SALDO?

Zoning ordinances are laws that regulate land use by determining which uses are permitted in specific locations, with associated requirements and limits, such as size, height, impermeable coverage, setbacks/buffers, building density, intensity of land uses, and protection of natural and historic resources.

A Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SALDO) determines municipal design standards, procedures, or other requirements that all developments must adhere to in Middletown Township.

Municipalities may amend these types of ordinances to reflect results of planning efforts and changes in economic and environmental conditions. Amendments to zoning and SALDO can also take the form of "overlay" districts that apply additional regulations based on a parcel's location. This MT CPROSGT will make recommendations to ordinances based on the regulations currently in place.

2.6.1 Natural Lands / Geophysical Inventory

Geology & Soils


The local history of Middletown and the Delaware Valley demonstrates that the area's rich agricultural land attracted the area's early European colonists, many of whom were farmers. Agricultural soils predominate in Middletown and several creeks traverse the Township. These natural elements still influence Middletown Township development. More information about the Township's natural resources follows.


Hydric Soils

Hydric soils are found along streams and wetlands in Middletown Township. Hydric soils form under saturated conditions. Ponding and flooding for long periods create anaerobic (lacking oxygen) conditions and allow these soils to support wetland ecosystems. Typically, these soils are found along waterways as well as in delineated wetlands.

Agricultural Soils

The qualities of prime agricultural soils and "soils of statewide importance" are defined by the US Dept. of Agriculture as well as Pennsylvania criteria and can produce a crop high yield when managed with acceptable farming practices. The Delaware Valley has an abundance of these types of soils, particularly in areas that are desirable for development due to their relatively flat topography.





Geology

Middletown geology divides the Township into three distinct areas: the Stockton Formation in the northern third of the Township composed of sedimentary rock; crystalline and quartzite rock, including Chickies Formation, through the center and western portions of the Township, and a combination of unconsolidated sediments and schist in the southern part of the Township, marking the inland edge of the Atlantic Coastal Plain.

The Stockton Formation is composed primarily of sandstone, shale, and siltstone. The groundwater in the Stockton Formation often has a high sulfate content, which may be a result of industrial contamination and urbanization.

South of the Stockton Formation, gneissic rock and the quartzite Chickies Formation mark the Fall Zone, a 900-mile escarpment that marks the boundary between the Piedmont and Atlantic Coastal Plain physiographic provinces. The gneissic rocks form hills of medium to high relief with steep and stable slopes.

The unconsolidated sediments consist of the Pensauken and Bridgeton Formations. The geometry and provenance of sand and gravel indicate that these formations were deposited by a large river that once flowed through the area. The Wissahickon Formation consists of rocks of sedimentary and volcanic origin, and schist, a metamorphic rock that has large flaky crystals and visible minerals.

Watersheds

The vast majority of Middletown Township is contained within four (4) main watersheds. The Core Creek watershed is a "sub" watershed of the Neshaminy Creek watershed, and the Queen Anne Creek watershed is a "sub" watershed of the Mill Creek watershed. Both the Neshaminy Creek watershed and the Mill Creek watershed empty into the Delaware River.

Small areas of the Township fall into three additional watersheds. Portions of the east-central Township, primarily north of Route 1, fall into the Brock Creek watershed, which flows into Buck Creek before reaching the Delaware River. The Newtown Creek watershed crosses into Middletown in the far northwest corner of the Township before flowing into Neshaminy Creek. A small area in the southeast corner of the Township falls into the Otter Creek watershed.

Core Creek Watershed

The Core Creek watershed traverses much of the northern third of the Township in the Stockton Formation described above. including all of Core Creek Park, before meeting Neshaminy Creek.

Neshaminy Creek Watershed

The Neshaminy Creek watershed includes most of the western portion of the Township and Neshaminy Creek forms the western border of Middletown. The Neshaminy Creek Greenway includes a planned Bucks County trail system extending from Doylestown in the north to the Delaware River.

Mill Creek Watershed

The Mill Creek watershed cuts generally north to south through the central portion of the Township. The Mill Creek Greenway represents a key opportunity for Middletown to enhance connectivity.

Queen Anne Creek Watershed

The Queen Anne Creek watershed in Middletown occupies the eastern boundary of the Township before flowing into Mill Creek. At the southern end of the watershed, the Queen Anne Greenway offers opportunities to expand the Township trail system and enhance riparian buffers.

Wetlands / Floodplains / Other Natural Resources

Wetlands

Wetlands are areas that are defined by certain soil types and are saturated enough to support specific types of vegetation. Wetlands are one of the most biologically diverse ecosystems in the world, providing important environmental services such as flood control and nurseries for animal and fish habitats. Even wetlands that are considered seasonal provide habitat for many varieties of plants and animals. Pennsylvania has lost more than half of its natural wetlands to development. Even when man-made wetlands are built, they rarely match the effectiveness of natural wetlands.

There are some wetlands and hydric soils scattered throughout the Township. Most notable is the area referred to as the Saba Wetlands in the northeastern portion of the Township, near the boundary with Lower Makefield Township. Other wetland areas can be found along the Townships waterways, including a notably large wetland areas along Neshaminy Creek west of Core Creek Park and in Chickenfoot Park along Queen Anne Creek.


Floodplains

Floodplains are low-lying areas next to streams, rivers, or waterways that are subject to periodic complete or partial flooding during rain events. Floodplains act as storage areas during storm events and as groundwater recharge zones to replenish aquifers. Naturally vegetated floodplains can help trap and reduce the amount of suspended sediment and upland runoff effects that may otherwise reduce water quality. Rainfall runoff, which may otherwise produce flooding in downstream sections of a watercourse, is contained in floodplains.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) authorizes the studies that map the elevations of storm levels. Noted as 10-, 50-, 100-, and 500-year storms, these numbers reflect not how often they occur, but rather the percentage chance of exceedance in any given year.

Protection of floodplains from development is vital not only for natural habitats and cultural resources, but also for life and property.






Woodlands & Greenways

Most native woodlands that existed within Middletown were cleared long ago for the establishment of agricultural lands. More recently, they have been cleared for the development of industrial and residential developments.

Existing forest canopy today within Middletown can best be described as sparse woodland patches that are highly fragmented, due to the large network of regional highways located within the Township. The Township's largest contiguous forested areas can be found along waterways include Neshaminy Creek and Mill Creek. Additional wooded areas are located near the intersection of Rt. 1 and I-295, within Core Creek Park, and within the open space areas known as Langhorne Spring Water Company and Saba Wetlands.







Topography & Steep Slopes

Areas of steep slopes (defined as topography that has greater than 15% slope) are predominantly found along streambanks in Middletown. Some additional steep slopes are located along the highways and rail lines that cross the Township.

The areas of highest elevation are generally found in the central and western parts of the Township. Topography declines towards Neshaminy Creek and the Delaware River, with the lowest elevations along Neshaminy Creek south and west of the Parkland neighborhood.





2.6.2 Historic & Cultural Resources

The 2020 Middletown Comprehensive Plan provided an inventory of Historic Sites in the Township originally compiled in 1993 by the Middletown Historic Preservation Commission. This list has not been officially updated since that time. A quick search of PA-SHARE, the states directory of historic resources, reveals 15 sites in Middletown that have applied for and been found eligible for historic designation since the completion of the report. These sites include the Middletown Crossroads Hotel, located at 970 Durham Rd., the Philadelphia & Reading Railroad District, and the Levittown Historic District, covering much of the Township east of New Rodgers Road/Veterans Highway and south of Business Route 1.

2.6.3 Park Inventory & Analysis

Open Space Inventory

A map of existing Township and County-owned open spaces in Middletown Township can be found on page 39. Information about the ownership and operation of these open spaces is publicly available; for the purpose of this report, the map delineates existing open spaces as parks, preserves, or open space.

The vast majority of dedicated open space land in Middletown is owned and stewarded by the Township. A portion of the open space, including Styer Orchard and the Langhorne Spring Water Company property are protected with conservation and/or agricultural easements held by the Heritage Conservancy. This preservation arrangement has been successful for many years, with recent interest from the Heritage Conservancy in revisiting these relationships. Additional information can be found below under Opportunities 4.2 and 4.3.

Open space requirements for developments

Middletown Township requires that open space be provided in all subdivisions, multifamily residential developments, and mobile home parks. Where deemed essential by the Board of Supervisors, the Township may require an additional 1,500 square feet of open space per residential dwelling unit dedicated to recreation areas and/or community facilities. A fee-in-lieu of open space or recreation areas is permitted, though the amount of this fee is not specified in the SALDO. Recommendations to strengthen the open space requirements and fee-inlieu calculations can be found below under Opportunity 6.3.

Publicly Owned Open Spaces

Most open spaces in Middletown Township are not named; instead, they are presented merely as Townshipowned property that is undeveloped and largely inaccessible to the public. One notable exception in the Langhorne Spring Water Company property described below under Preserved Lands.

Neshaminy Creek "Preserve"

Along Neshaminy Creek, west and south of Core Creek Park, the Township owns approximately 170 acres of open space, referred to (in this report) as the Neshaminy Creek Preserve. These lands are largely wooded and provide a fairly healthy riparian buffer for Neshaminy Creek. A trail within the Preserve extends north from Newtown-Langhorne Road. The trailhead is unsigned, and no parking is provided. This preserve could also be considered part of the larger Neshaminy Creek Greenway, a passive greenway corridor extending from Peace Valley Park near Doylestown in Upper Bucks County to the Delaware River.

Saba Wetlands "Preserve"

In the northwestern portion of the Township, an 83-acre open space known as the Saba Wetlands straddles the SEPTA rail line and Big Oak Road. Largely wooded, this open space also preserves extensive wetland areas. No public access is provided.

Idlewood "Preserve"

In the Idlewood neighborhood on the western side of the Township, nearly 30 acres of open space make up the proposed Idlewood Preserve. Heavily wooded, this area provides stormwater management services for the surrounding neighborhood. No public access is provided, but several local roads crisscross the property. This preserve could also be considered part of the Neshaminy Creek Greenway.

Greenways

Much of the open space in Middletown Township can be considered greenways, including both the Neshaminy Creek and Idlewood "Preserves" - which primarily deliver resource protection and passive recreation. In contrast, the greenways described below may be suitable for passive and perhaps some specific, appropriate active recreation with attention still given to resource protection.

Mill Creek Greenway

The Mill Creek Greenway extends from Delaware Park near the southeastern corner of Langhorne Manor Borough through the Frosty Hollow Tennis Center to the southern border of the Township. This greenway, largely occupied by the forested riparian buffer of Mill Creek, also includes several parks: Veterans Memorial Park; Forsythia Crossing Park, and Upper Orchard Park. This greenway represents a prime opportunity to improve pedestrian and bicycle connectivity in the Township.

Queen Anne Creek Greenway

In the southern half of the Township, the Queen Anne Creek Greenway extends from Queen Anne Park in the east to the southern border of the Township where the creek crosses into Bristol Township before joining Mill Creek. This Greenway is mostly considered parkland and includes Cobalt Ridge and Quincy Hollow Parks. Together with the Mill Creek Greenway, these properties contain more than 110 acres of open space and an additional 60+ acres of designated park land.

Other Township Open Space

In addition to its larger preserved open spaces, the Township manages several small open spaces scattered throughout the Township. These properties are largely wooded, and many of them include portions of Township waterways. Public access is limited or nonexistent.

Privately Owned Open Spaces

Middletown Township has several privately owned open spaces, in addition to the open spaces described above. Most remaining open spaces in the Township are already slated for development, including the former Stone Hill Farm area on the north side of Core Creek Park and a large area of open space between Business Route 1 and Neshaminy Creek.

Idlewood Environmental Study Area

The Idlewood Environmental Study Area occupies approximately 133 acres of the Neshaminy High School property. Located in Neshaminy Creek floodplain, this wooded area provides trails and environmental education opportunities for the high school and the community. Damage from the emerald ash borer forced the closure of the Study Area in 2018, but subsequent restoration efforts have allowed the trails to re-open to the public.

Woods Services

In recent years, Woods Services has greatly improved its open space resources - which are locates largely between I-295 and Route 1, include upland forest and grasslands in addition to several recreational amenities. Though currently open only to residents, Woods Services has expressed interest in providing recreational and open space access to the broader public.

St. Mary Medical Center


The St. Mary Medical Center Campus is located adjacent and northwest of Core Creek Park, and includes nearly 90 acres of open space. This campus includes an asphalt trail system that links to the Core Creek Park trail system as well as to the neighborhood sidewalk network in the Sturbridge and Hampton Bridge neighborhoods. This network is unofficially open to the public, and formalizing this public access would provide an opportunity for the Township to expand its effective trail network.

Other Privately Owned Open Spaces

Additional open spaces in Middletown include Our Lady of Grace Cemetery in the Parkland neighborhood and several small HOA controlled open spaces in neighborhoods throughout the Township. These spaces provide passive recreational opportunities for the surrounding neighborhood, but do not draw in visitors from other parts of the Township.

Trails and Connectivity

For definition purposes an existing trail is a pathway of sufficient width to accommodate both pedestrians, bicycles or motorized mobility devices (generally 8'-10' wide) and can occupy a dedicated section as part of a roadway or be located off road to connect areas of particular interest. The existence of "trails" by this definition in Middletown is restricted to County or Middletown parks with some very limited trails serving individual neighborhood green spaces.



Core Creek Trails

Core Creek Park includes approximately seven (7) miles of trails, both asphalt and natural surface. These trails form an incomplete loop around Lake Luxembourg with large gaps at the southeastern and northwestern corners. Proposed trails will link the existing Core Creek trail system to the future Neshaminy Creek Greenway as well as trails to Newtown. In recent years, connections between the Core Creek trail system the trail along Langhorne-Yardley Road (see below) have been constructed, providing access to Middletown Community Park.


Langhorne-Yardley Road

The multi-use trail along Langhorne-Yardley Road stretches from Woodbourne Road at Maple Point Middle School in the west to Middletown Community Park in the east. Largely within the Langhorne-Yardley Road right-of-way, this trail provides access to the Core Creek trail system but does not connect with the existing trail on Township Line Road in neighboring Lower Makefield Township. Bridging this disconnect represents a crucial connection opportunity for the Township and would greatly improve connectivity.

Neshaminy Creek Trails

The proposed Neshaminy Creek Greenway is a Bucks County trail that will extend from Peace Valley Park near Doylestown in the north to the East Coast Greenway along the Delaware River in the south, passing through Middletown Township. Existing trails in Middletown along the proposed route include the Neshaminy Creek Preserve trail described above.

Middletown Township Parks & Recreation Facilities

Middletown owns and operates 23 parks and preserved open space sites. These sites fall into four categories of facilities: Community Parks, Neighborhood Parks, Mini Parks, and Preserved

For a full matrix of MT park facilities and amenities, see Appendix

Community Parks

Community parks are larger parcels (generally 15 acres or larger) that can provide both passive and active recreation. One thing all community parks have in common is that they are typically destination parks that bring in visitors from outside of the municipality.

The following list of Middletown Community Parks includes notes on history, location, and observations taken during site reconnaissance visits:

Raymond P Mongillo, Sr. Community Center

The Middletown Community Center is home to the Middletown Senior Citizens' Association, and occupies a former public-school building in the Highland Park neighborhood. The single-story building, built in the 1950s, contains offices and classrooms for senior programming as well as rental spaces for community organizations and a small weight room. Some, but not all, restrooms are ADAcompliant and the building is showing signs of age; a new roof will be necessary in the next five years.

Behind the Community Center building are three pickleball courts, a playground with a pavilion, two (2) bocce courts, and a community garden with 13 4'x8' raised beds and 14 planting barrels. The pickleball courts are heavily used. Mature canopy trees provide shade along the perimeter of the property, except at the rear of the property where an unprogrammed lawn area exists. The parking lot contains 82 parking spaces.

In addition to the Senior Center programming, the Middletown Parks & Recreation Department provides programs at the Senior Center. Most popular among these programs is the Summer Recreation Program.

Middletown Community Park

Middletown Community Park is the Township's premier recreation complex and the most well-used park in the system. The 42-acre park contains five (5) baseball/ softball (diamond) fields, four (4) soccer/ multi-use fields, and a basketball court. All sports fields are lit. The park also includes a playground, two pavilions with tables and seating, a skate park, and an electronic kick wall. The kick wall provides opportunities for training and competitive games. Restrooms are provided both at the concession stand near the playground and at the concession stand for the four diamond fields in a cloverleaf formation.

An asphalt trail system extends most of the way around the perimeter of the park and connects to a side path along Langhorne-Yardley Road. The side path extends to Woodbourne Road to the southwest where it connects to Core Creek Park. The Community Park Barn provides space for recreation programming and events yearround and provides additional restroom facilities for the park.

The Langhorne Athletic Association (LAA) and the Langhorne-Neshaminy United Soccer Club provide maintenance of the fields, which are well cared for and heavily used spring through fall. Benches and/or bleachers are provided for viewers, but no shade is available for sports viewers. Play equipment is generally in good condition, though the climbing wall appears to be missing several holds and one of the access ramps for the playground is in poor condition. The skate park is well-used; informal (mostly wooden) ramps have been added by users at the edge of the skate park to supplement existing features.

Twin Oaks Park

Twin Oaks Park is host to nearly half of Middletown Townshipmanaged diamond fields, and is the Township's second most wellused park, behind only Middletown Community Park. The 18-acre park contains eight (8) baseball/softball fields and two (2) soccer fields, connected by one quarter mile of walking paths. Lighting is provided for four (4) of the diamond fields. The fields are wellmaintained, though dugout quality (seating and shade) varies from field to field. All fields are maintained by Middletown Athletic Association (MAA), the primary user of the park. Fencing along Trenton Road features large advertisements for local businesses.

A large parking lot near the corner of Trenton Road and Woodbourne Road provides more than 130 parking spaces. Beneath the parking lot, an underground basin manages stormwater flow from Trenton Road. A second parking lot near the corner of Trenton Road and Twin Oak Drive at the eastern corner of the park provides an additional 38 parking spaces.

The park is bisected by Queen Anne Creek. Deep drainage swales flow into the creek on the north and south sides of the park, and a semi-naturalized riparian buffer has formed along these swales, isolating the park from the adjacent neighborhood to the north. Despite these stormwater management efforts and the underground basin beneath the main parking lot, flooding remains a serious issue at the park.

A small playground adjacent to the creek is in poor condition with no safety surfacing. No barrier is provided between the playground and the creek. A concession building south of the playground also provides restrooms for the park; the building appears to be in poor condition and is located in the Queen Anne Creek floodplain. A batting cage and field maintenance facilities are located between the concession building and the main parking lot.

A master plan for Twin Oaks Park was completed in 2010 but has remained largely unimplemented, apart from the expansion of the main parking lot. The master plan eliminates the existing soccer fields and one diamond field, reorienting several of the remaining diamond fields so that batters face northeast, in accordance with DCNR recommendations. It also proposes an expanded parking area, an enhanced and expanded play area, and a new concession building located out of the Queen Creek floodplain and relocates the batting cages.

Firefighters' Park (formerly Poplar Park)

Firefighters' Park, formerly known as Poplar Park, is also one of the Township's most popular parks. The 15.2-acre park contains two (2) baseball/softball fields, two (2) multi-use fields, two (2) full basketball courts, and eight (8) pickleball courts, as well as a playground with an ADA-accessible perimeter path. The park is served by three parking lots, with more than 70 parking spaces. Though there are no permanent restroom facilities, portable restrooms are typically located near the playground and near the pickleball courts.

The park looks out over Neshaminy Creek, which runs approximately ½ mile to the southwest, providing expansive views of the region. A large stormwater basin occupies the lowest parts of the park. Large canopy trees provide some shade, particularly in the northern portion of the park, but some are starting to decline due to age. The park is well-connected to the surrounding neighborhood, particularly to the north, though sidewalks end at the park boundary and do not continue through the park.

Herbert Hoover Park

Herbert Hoover Park is a large complex of soccer fields adjacent to the Neshaminy School District (NSD) Herbert Hoover Elementary School. The park is owned by NSD and leased by the Township for \$1/ year. The township maintains the eight unlighted soccer fields which are used by the Hulmeville Soccer Club.

Neighborhood Parks

Neighborhood Parks can loosely be described as parks that are generally smaller than community parks (typically 5-15 acres) but may use the space to fulfill different programming needs. In Middletown, the ability to reach neighborhood parks without using a car is severely limited. Walking from adjacent developments is often unsafe due to a lack of crosswalks and automobile-centric infrastructure and parking is a necessary park component.

Cobalt Ridge Park

Cobalt Ridge Park, along with Quincy Hollow Park, is embedded within the larger (43 acre) Queen Anne Creek Greenway. This Greenway runs along Queen Anne Creek from Queen Anne Park (a Bucks County Park, see below) on Woodbourne Road to New Falls Road on the Township's southern boundary. Though sidewalks run most of the length of the Greenway, no formal trails exist within the park.

Cobalt Ridge Park includes a playground with accessible play amenities and two half-court basketball courts. Musical equipment in the playground appeared to be vandalized and is missing the hammers necessary for play. Several mismatched benches are located in the shade of trees neighboring the playground. The riparian buffer is wooded with primarily native tree species; the shrub and ground layers of the woodland contain a mix of native and invasive species, with some areas of the creek banks open, providing views of the creek.

Det. Christopher Jones Memorial Park

Jones Memorial Park is a 15.9-acre park, divided roughly in half from east to west, creating an active recreation park to the north along W Maple Avenue and a passive, "natural area" to the south. Within this natural area, a large, naturalized basin manages stormwater from the surrounding neighborhood. A short trail through the natural area links the active park to the neighborhood at Clearview Avenue. A native tree search invites visitors to learn about the trees around them, with answers to the search provided on the Township website. The sign introducing the tree search in the park is in poor condition and difficult to read.

The north side of the park includes a softball field, a multi-use field which overlaps with the softball outfield, and a playground with two shaded seating areas. The playground is beginning to deteriorate from age and appears ready for renovation. The entrance road wraps around the east and south sides of the active areas of the park, with 58 parking spaces distributed along the length of the entrance road. An asphalt walking path connects to sidewalks on Alscot Lane to the west of the park, looping around the sports fields and playground to link with the natural area path. Several benches are provided along the length of the path.

Forsythia Crossing Park

Forsythia Crossing Park is located along Mill Creek between the Forsythia Crossing and Snowball Gates neighborhoods in the Levittown section of Middletown Township. The park contains a playground with seating, picnic tables, a small pavilion, and the Township's only roller hockey rink, which was recently renovated. A walking path encircles the park, crossing the access road twice via cobblestone crosswalks.

A flat turf area in the center of the park provides space for community events like Groovin' at the Gates, inaugurated in 2024, which features local vendors, food trucks, live music, and beer and wine. Lighting is provided in the two parking lots, which provide more than 50 parking spaces, and along a short portion of the walking path.

The park formerly held a public pool. The Samuel Everitt School building, now home to the Bucks Intermediate Unit, lies adjacent to the park to the north, but no connection exists between the school and the park. Informal paths exist along Mill Creek on the park's south side, but no formal trails exist along the creek.

Simmons Memorial Park is a seven (7) acre park located on Brownsville Road in the Langhorne section of the Township. It is heavily programmed with a baseball field, two (2) basketball courts, Middletown's only Township-owned tennis courts (3), and a large playground with swings. A small building adjacent to the playground provides restrooms for the park.

A walking path loops around the perimeter of the park and connects to sidewalks on nearby Butterworth Lane, though no sidewalk is provided on Brownsville Road. The path also passes through a memorial plaza with flags, benches, and landscaping at the entrance to the park dedicated to Lance Corporal Harry J. Simmons Jr., the first Langhorne resident killed in the Vietnam War. Adjacent to the memorial plaza is a small, naturalized stormwater basin. A large parking lot off Brownsville Road provides 61 parking spaces.

Some confusion exists around the name of this park. Simmons Memorial Park was formerly known as Veterans Memorial Park and long-time residents frequently use this former name, which is now used for the mini park located on New Rodgers Road near the Department of Public Works office. The former name still appears on Google Maps.

Tareyton Estates Park

Tareyton Estates Park (5.0 acres) is located in the center of the Tareyton Estates neighborhood in north-central Middletown. Much of the park is unprogrammed turf with a ring of mostly mature trees roughly at the perimeter of the park. These trees are in varying condition with some healthy trees and others nearly or entirely dead. The park also has a small playground with swings, several picnic tables, benches, and trash receptacles. The southeast corner of the park is home to a small, landscaped area with additional benches. Little shade is available in the park, particularly in the playground area. A sidewalk extends the length of the perimeter of the park, providing a walking loop and connections to the surrounding neighborhood.

Mini Parks

Mini Parks are small parks with minimal programming – usually 1-3 elements that do not require much space. While these minimally programmed spaces sometimes lie within larger parcels, most of these facilities are smaller than 5 acres. Some are primarily devoted to conservation and passive recreation - typically trails or nature viewing areas.

Delaware Park

Delaware Park (11.2 acres) formerly included trails, a picnic area, and a playground. Following significant flooding in 2000, the US Army Corps of Engineers constructed a flood control levee along Mill Creek, eliminating virtually all programmed spaces within the park. Today, the park is largely unprogrammed with a 0.1-mile trail connecting Wyoming Ave. to the levee as well as a small stormwater basin. The remainder of the park is a riparian woodland.

Detweiler Park

Detweiler Park is a 2.4 acre. unprogrammed property in the western Middletown neighborhood of Parkland. Other than a small plague on Fox Court commemorating the donation of the park to the Township, there are no improvements in the park.

Harris Park

Harris Park is a 2.6 acre unprogrammed property located on the banks of Neshaminy Creek in Parkland. Access from Harris Drive is unmarked and nearly impossible to enter. No improvements are provided in the park, though it does provide potential trail access along Neshaminy Creek.

Lions Playground

Lions Playground is located at the corner of Trenton Road and New Rodgers Road in the Snowball Gate neighborhood. The 1.4-acre park contains a mid-sized playground and small turf areas, separated from the busy roads by a low railing. The playground is being renovated in 2025, and two (2) ADA compliant parking spaces will be added.

Periwinkle Park

Periwinkle Park is largely unprogrammed 3.4-acre property located on Neshaminy Creek at the foot of the Brownsville Road Bridge. A small storage building at the northern end of the park is unused because of its location in the floodplain. Because of the easy access to Neshaminy Creek, the park is often used as an informal kayak and boat launch, though no formal amenities are provided. The park is slated to serve as a staging area for the renovation of the Brownsville Road Bridge in 2025-26.

Quincy Hollow Park

Quincy Hollow Park, like Cobalt Ridge Park, is located in the larger Queen Anne Creek Greenway. The park consists of a basketball court with benches and garbage cans. The basketball court asphalt is deteriorating and needs to be restriped.

Sunflower Park

Sunflower Park is the Township's smallest self-contained park at only 0.4 acres. Located in the Parkland neighborhood, it contains a small playground with seating and a small gazebo, shaded by a tall canopy of mature trees. The playground is well-used by the neighboring private preschool, which also has its own private play equipment. Park signage is clear and easy to find.

Upper Orchard Park

Upper Orchard Park is located in the Upper Orchard neighborhood, adjacent to Mill Creek, where it forms part of the unorganized Mill Creek Greenway. The 0.9-acre park contains two half-court basketball courts and a small playground, separated by a large turf area. Around the playground, several benches and trash cans are provided, though shade is limited. The riparian buffer along Mill Creek is naturalized with a dense woodland composed of largely native tree species.

Veterans Memorial Park

Veterans Memorial Park is located on New Rodgers Road, adjacent to the Township's Department of Public Works office and Mill Creek. The 1.25-acre park includes a short memorial trail around a turf area with memorials to veterans of 20thcentury American wars. The Casey Jones, a decommissioned WWII tank, provides a particularly striking memorial in the park. The small picnic shelter is well cared for and contains a spigot for drinking water. A natural surface trail signed as the Hero's Walk extends from the memorial trail into the woodland along Mill Creek.

Some confusion exists around the name of this park. Simmons Memorial Park was formerly known as Veterans Memorial Park and long-time residents frequently use this former name. As a result, this park is difficult to locate on Google Maps.



Preserved Lands

In addition to Middletown's parks, the Township owns four (4) of what it calls "Preserved Lands." These lands vary widely in character and include an orchard, a golf course, forested natural areas, and a historic farm. These properties are not considered parks by the Township but form an important part of the open space network and provide a variety of active recreational opportunities for residents.

Styer Orchard

Styer Orchard is located southeast of Core Creek Park near the intersection of Woodbourne Road and Langhorne-Yardley Road, and is Middletown's only preserved agricultural land. The property is owned by the Township and operations are leased long term to a farmer, who also lives on the property. The Heritage Conservancy holds the easement on the property and manages funding.

The majority of the property at Styer Orchard is dominated by farm fields, including row crops and orchards, with associated outbuildings concentrated near the center of the property. A large commercial building on Woodbourne Road provides space for a farm market. The farmhouse next door provides housing for the farmer who leases the property. A wooded natural area roughly bisects the property from east to west, extending north to Langhorne-Yardley Road and Woodbourne Road along two waterways. Two pavilions have been constructed recently on the property, providing space for outdoor education programming.

Middletown Country Club

The Middletown Country Club, similar to Styer Orchard, is owned by the Township with operations and management leased long-term to a private company. The 110acre property contains an 18-hole golf course and formerly housed the Township's only public pool. This pool shut down in early 2020 after falling into disrepair. The clubhouse offered rentable event space indoors with catering and a restaurant, though in recent years these services have been greatly reduced or eliminated.

Langhorne Spring Water Company

The Langhorne Spring Water Company property occupies more than 80 acres on the former lands of the Langhorne Spring Water Company, which provided water from springs on the property to the surrounding community, starting in the late 1800's. The land, mostly within Langhorne Manor Borough, was purchased by the Township between 1993 and 2014 to preserve the high-quality woodlands which exist on the property. A conservation easement is held by the Heritage Conservancy.

The property contains a barn built in 1890 that is currently in poor condition. A collection of historic development plans and maps of Middletown is stored in the barn, though no catalogue of this collection exists. A house on the property is occupied by the caretaker. An old water tower and boulder with a memorial plaque mark the entrance drive to the house. Though no public access is provided on the property, informal trails have been created.

Spring Valley Farm

Spring Valley Farm, located near the southwestern corner of the Township where it meets the Boroughs of Hulmeville and Penndel, is a historic farm property dating back to the 17th century. Ownership records for the property are included in Appendix Section 10.

The 10.7-acre property includes a historic house currently occupied by the caretaker, a stone barn, and a springhouse. Three smaller parcels on the northwest side of the property are heavily wooded. Two unnamed tributaries to Neshaminy Creek flow across the property. To the northeast of Spring Valley Farm is Penndel Memorial Field, a heavily programmed park owned by the Borough of Penndel, with three diamond fields, two basketball courts, and a football field which overlaps with the diamond field outfields.

The Spring Valley Farm property was acquired by the Township in 2013, and a master plan was developed in 2016. The master plan emphasizes landscape elements including restoration of woodland and riparian areas, and the creation of a sizable meadow. It also proposes the creation of an amphitheater, a play area with a pavilion, a restroom/concession building, and an outdoor classroom. It also proposes removing the barrier between the property and Penndel Memorial Field to allow for the expansion of the southernmost diamond field into a fullsize baseball field. Little progress has been made toward implementation of this master plan; some members of the Middletown Township community have expressed that, due to the location of the property, it will provide more benefit to Borough residents than to Township residents.

Bucks County Parks

Core Creek Park

At 1,200 acres, Core Creek Park is the premier park in Middletown and home to the Bucks County Parks and Recreation Department. Centered around Lake Luxembourg, the park features four (4) soccer fields, two (2) baseball/softball fields, eight (8) tennis courts, three (3) playgrounds, eleven (11) pavilions, four (4) picnic areas, and the Township's only off-leash dog park. Approximately seven (7) miles of multi-use trail wind through the Park's natural areas to link the active recreation amenities above. Fishing in Lake Luxembourg is a popular activity, and two boat launches provide access to the lake. A boat rental facility provides kayaks, canoes, pedalboats, and row boats to rent. Four restrooms are distributed throughout the park.

A new master plan for Core Creek Park is identified as a high priority in the Bucks County Comprehensive Recreation, Parks. and Open Space Plan.

Playwicki Park

Playwicki Park is a 33-acre park perched on the banks of Neshaminy Creek. Much of the park is forested, and a significant portion of the park is not publicly accessible, as it is on an island in Neshaminy Creek.

The park features a basketball court and a small playground, as well as two (2) pavilions, two (2) picnic areas, and restrooms. A 1.1-mile natural surface trail extends into the forested part of the park

Frosty Hollow Tennis Center

Frosty Hollow Tennis Center is located on 90 acres at the southern edge of Middletown Township, near the confluence of Mill Creek and Queen Anne Creek, and is home to ten (10) tennis courts and a practice wall. Six (6) of the courts have lights. The courts host adult tennis leagues and the Bucks County Tennis Association's Learn, Practice, and Play programs. The remainder of the property is heavily wooded.

Chickenfoot Park

Chickenfoot Park is a 59-acre, largely passive park located across Trenton Road from Twin Oaks Park. Most of the park is heavily wooded, with areas of wetlands, particularly on the northern half of the park. The wooded portion of the park extends into Falls Township. The park also contains two (2) baseball/softball fields located on Woodbourne Road, one with a skinned infield and one without. The unskinned field is accessible via an accessible ramp descending from the gravel parking lot on Woodbourne Road.

Both fields are in somewhat poor condition and additional maintenance is needed. The forthcoming Bucks County Comprehensive Recreation, Parks, and Open Space Plan will recommend pursuing an MOA with the Township for management of the park.

Queen Anne Park

Queen Anne Park is a largely passive, forested park located primarily in Falls Township along Queen Anne Creek. A portion of the park extends into Middletown Township along Woodbourne Road. The portion of the park in Middletown includes a baseball/softball field with a skinned infield and small gravel parking lot.

Community / NRPA Benchmarking

Benchmarking is an analysis tool that compares communities of similar size and geographical type using criteria that compares recreational amenities that are contained within their boundaries.

Middletown Township was compared with: City of York (York County, PA), Haverford Twp. (Delaware County, PA), Evesham Twp. (Burlington County, NJ), Penn Hills Twp. (Allegheny County, PA), and neighboring Northampton Twp (Bucks County, PA). The numbers used in this analysis were derived from on-the-ground investigations (Middletown only) and from observations based on aerial photographs provided by Google.

Benchmarking is also used to compare Middletown's facilities against a metric determined by the National Park and Recreation Association (NRPA) based on population.

Community benchmarking and NRPA Standards cannot address the uniqueness of a community. Each community must evaluate its own specific needs. If a community has a strong youth sports program like Middletown, that community may require more fields than the averages suggest. Information below is derived from the National Park and Recreation Associations NRPA 2022 Agency Performance Review report and other NRPA reports.

A comparison of national averages for communities with 20,000 to 49,999 residents and between 50,000 to 99,999 residents is reviewed below and results are contained in Appendix Section 11.

NRPA provides information from over 1,000 park and recreation departments across the United States. The information provided by NRPA should be used as guidance only. Highlights of Middletown's comparison against NRPA metrics:

- NRPA & Community Metrics: Middletown needs additional playgrounds
- NRPA & Community Metrics: Middletown has an abundance of rectangular fields (soccer / multi-purpose)
- · Community Metrics: Middletown has a need for basketball courts

It should be noted that Bucks County facilities are not included in the benchmarking values. There exists a tacit understanding between the County and the Township that the County provides tennis courts while the Township provides pickleball courts. When County-managed tennis courts are included, Middletown exceeds the NRPA metric significantly. Similarly, when County-managed dog parks and playgrounds are included in the benchmarking values, Middletown meets or exceeds the NRPA metrics.

PA DCNR and the Trust for Public Lands provide data on trailhead, water, and recreational access.

Data on access to trailheads and water are provided as "10-minute drive" access. meaning a person living in the area could reach a trailhead or water access point by car within 10 minutes of their home.

Data on access to recreation – in this report - is provided as "10-minute walk" access, meaning a person living in the area could reach "open-access lands and trailheads" by walking within 10 minutes of their home. Areas outside of the 10-minute walk or drive "service areas" are defined as low, medium, or high need based on combinations of criteria that may include: density, population, youth, and low-income households.


Ten-minute walk access to recreation in Middletown Township is generally good, though less so than access to water and trails. Significant gaps in access exist throughout the Township, particularly along the western edge, including west of Core Creek; much of the western border of the Township along Neshaminy Creek; much of the area between Hulmeville Borough and I-295, and the central quadrant of the Township, largely between Styer Orchard and Business Rt. 1.

An additional area of high need is in the Red Rose Gate and Cobalt Ridge neighborhoods, east of Mill Creek. Much of the need for recreation access can be attributed to connectivity issues rather than a lack of recreational opportunities, as can be seen in how close some areas of "need" are to existing parks and open spaces.


Middletown Township generally has good access to trails and water. Only two small areas, one near Neshaminy High School (NHS) and the other immediately northeast of Hulmeville Borough, have a medium need for access to a trailhead. If the trails within the Idlewood Environmental Study Area (which was not open to the public at the time the data were recorded) were included in the study, the area near NHS would have trail access.

Water access in Middletown is also good, though less accessible than trail access. In the western part of the Township, a significant area, notably paralleling Neshaminy Creek, has a medium need for water access and a small area south of Firefighters' Park has a high need for water access.

Much of the southern quadrant of the Township also shows a high need for water access, particularly along the Mill Creek/ New Rodgers Road corridor. Two areas in this quadrant, one northeast of Hulmeville Borough and another east of Mill Creek between Trenton Road and Harvest Road. have a medium need for water access. Much of the need for water access could be satisfied by the installation of a formalized boat launch/water access point on Neshaminy Creek in the western portion of the Township.




10-Minute Drive: Water Access

2.6.4 Recreation Programming Inventory & Analysis

The Middletown Township Park & Recreation Department offers a robust number of programs for the community. Averaging about 300 program sessions and three (3) to five (5) special events per year, the department does a superb job providing all its residents with diverse offerings throughout the year.

Programs include enrichment programs for all ages, introduction to skateboarding, adult fitness, pickleball for different abilities, a variety of summer camps, and sports leagues. Many of those programs regularly fill up and generate a wait list. The department's special events are targeted toward multiple generations and are highly popular. In addition to staffed programs, the department maintains relationships with for-profit and non-profit groups to satisfy other community recreation needs.

Township-led Programming

The MT Parks & Recreation Department currently has four (4) fulltime staff that contribute to the Township-led programming efforts. Including other administrative duties, the two (2) staff Program Specialists, focus primarily on developing and delivering recreation programming. The other two (2) staff members, the Director and Assistant Director, have active roles in some events or programs, with their year-round recreation responsibilities more limited. The Township relies on many seasonal staff to deliver Township-led programs like Summer Rec, adult fitness classes, pickleball, and others.

Third-party-led Programming

Like many other parks & recreation departments in the region, Middletown Township relies on contractors and specialized community partners to provide a greater variety of recreation opportunities to the residents of Middletown.

Contractor-Led Programming

By partnering with third-party contractors for some programs, the department is able to continue its measured growth and satisfy the community's need for more programming while limiting the need to increase part-time and full-time recreation staff. The quality is normally high for these "canned" programs, where the contractors specialize in a specific recreation interest, which enables the department to offer a greater variety of programs to the community without finding instructors and/or investing in equipment and supplies. These relationships allow the department to generate positive net revenue with very little risk and time invested.

Athletic Organizations

Middletown Township is fortunate to have a large number of partners offering youth and adult competitive and recreational athletic opportunities to the community. Residents register directly with and are served by these groups. Without these volunteer-led partnerships, the Township would likely need to increase staff and provide a larger programming budget to satisfy the community desire for athletic programming. Many of these organizations utilize Township-owned facilities and, if not outlined in an agreement, the Township is responsible for daily and seasonal maintenance, and all or some of the capital expense needs.

The athletic organizations that utilize Township fields and courts for their programs include:

Middletown Senior Citizen Association

The Middletown Senior Citizen Association is a membership-based group operating out of the Middletown Senior Center, a Townshipowned facility. The Middle Township Parks & Recreation Department provides support to the Middletown Senior Citizen Association. which boasts a variety of programs and important socialization opportunities for older adults in the community. Low-cost meals for its members are also provided by the group.

Styer Orchard

Middletown Township owns the Styer Orchard property but maintains a long-term lease of the land for the farm and store. Recreation staff have worked with the operator and

the Heritage Conservancy, which holds the easement on the land, to offer unique programs on site that promote the farm and its operations. The Heritage Conservancy recently installed a pavilion and outdoor classroom space to serve as an additional venue for Township-led programs.

Analysis

Since the pandemic, the Department has steadily increased the number of programs and sessions offered to the public. Sessions have increased by nearly double (162 sessions in 2021 to 302 in 2024) resulting in increased revenue for the department.

Surprisingly, for a municipal entity in a suburban setting, the number of recreation programs skew more towards adults than school-age children, which traditionally would be a foundational demographic of a parks & recreation department.

In 2024, 219 of the 302 sessions offered by the department were identified as "Adult" programs, which represents 73% of the annual programs. Many of the adult-focused programs are fitness and wellness-based. The greater number of adult programs being offered correlates to the results of the survey with households indicating that 19% have participated in an adult program and only 4% have participated in a youth program. While more adult program sessions are being offered by the department, youth and teen programs generate more than double the number of participant registrations while also generating more than 75% of the department's program revenue.

While continued growth of adult programs is encouraged, there are opportunities for greater growth in youth programming. Teenfocused programming, which is frequently a difficult niche market for public recreation, is limited currently, but has potential for expansion.

Analyzing program cancellation rates (the percentage of programs offered that do not reach the minimum number of participants) is one tool that can be used to determine if a department is offering a good mix of recurring and new programs. Having some canceled programs is common and may be a result of staff trying out a new program idea, which should be encouraged.

Middletown Parks & Recreation's program cancellation rate ranges from 16% (2021) to 36% (2022) with a 5-year historic mean of 28%. If 2021 is removed then the mean increases to 31%. While a definitive program cancellation rate across the country isn't readily available, the accepted industry standard to target is between 20% to 25%. Based on that suggested target, Middletown Township is slightly above the desired program cancellation rate.

Cancellation rates of adult programs offered by the department have traditionally fallen within the industry standard of 25% while the youth program cancellation rate is much greater at a range of 40% (2023) to 61% (2022). The program cancellations were not associated with any one type of offering, but art programs were a notable category that was frequently canceled due to low enrollment. Common reasons for no or low enrollment in a program include a day or time not being convenient or conflicting with another popular activity, the program's topic is not of interest to that audience, or insufficient or ill-targeted publicity. When a program is canceled, there is a direct and/or indirect expense to the department with no off-setting revenue because staff time has been invested in program development, marketing, etc.

Programming Facilities

Middletown Township operates its programs at a variety of Township parks and other facilities in the community. The two primary Township-owned indoor locations for programs are the Community Park Barn and the Raymond P. Mongillo Sr. Community Center. These two facilities are essential to the Parks & Recreation Department's ability to offer year-round programs including its very popular Summer Rec camps, adult fitness & enrichment programs, and senior programming (operated by the Middletown Senior Citizens Association.) These venues also serve as the primary rental sites for private use. During evenings and weekends, the uses of those facilities is overseen by the Department's part-time Building Monitors.

Ensuring that these facilities remain maintained and operational is important for the Department to be able to generate revenue and provide safe, clean spaces for participants and renters.

2.6.5 Administration Analysis

The office of the Parks and Recreation Department serves as the central administrative and contact point for residents, businesses, and community groups of Middletown to register for programs, reserve fields and facilities, and learn about the park system.

The Department is responsible for:

- All department programs and events
- Processing permits for facilities like field, court, and room use
- Processing special event applications for park use
- Responding to complaints, questions, problems, suggestions
- · Coordinating with contractor-led program leaders and subcontracted maintenance staff
- Managing relationships with a variety of community partners
- Identifying, proposing, and implementing park capital projects

Current Full-time Department Staffing:


- Director (1)
- Assistant Director (1)
- Program Specialist (2)
- Administrative Assistant (1)

The general staff consensus is that there is a sufficient number of full-time staff to meet the current administrative and programming needs of the department, but if services are expanded, then additional staff may be needed.

The current Director will be retiring in the first quarter of 2026. It has not yet been determined if/how the other staff positions will be impacted by this departure.

Current Part-Time & Seasonal Staffing:

- Various Program Instructors
- Summer Rec Staff
- · Building Monitors



Prior to the COVID pandemic, the Department operated a seasonal internship program, but that position has not been filled since. From a department need standpoint, there is a desire to see this position return.

Expenses related to maintaining the parks are included in the Parks & Recreation Department budget. All park maintenance staff and operations fall under the Public Works Department. Previously, staff dedicated to maintenance of the parks were under the direction and supervision of the Parks & Recreation Director, but that staff has been absorbed into the Public Works Department's labor force.

The Parks & Recreation staff work in collaboration with two Board of Supervisors-appointed groups - the Parks & Recreation Board and the Environmental Advisory Council (EAC). Individuals interested in serving on these committees are required to submit a board/commission volunteer application to be considered for appointment.

The Parks & Recreation Board, in coordination with staff: oversees Township parks and open space; establishes and implements recreation activities; and plans for future recreation opportunities. A member of the Parks & Recreation staff attends the Board's monthly public meetings. Many of the Parks & Recreation Board members also serve as essential volunteers at the Department's seasonal special events.

The Environmental Advisory Council (EAC) advises the Board of Supervisors on matters concerning the conservation and preservation of natural resources, such as wetlands or floodplain areas, throughout the Township. The EAC is also responsible for organizing environmental-focused community events. A member of the Parks & Recreation staff also attends the EAC's monthly public meetings.

CAPRA Accreditation Analysis

The NRPA's Commission for Accreditation of Park and Recreation Agencies (CAPRA) is the only national accreditation body for park and recreation organizations. According to the NRPA website, "accreditation is a valuable measure of an organization's overall quality of operation, management, and service to the community. It serves as the foundation for a comprehensive management system of operational best practices. Achieving CAPRA accreditation is the best way to demonstrate that your organization and your staff provide your community with the highest level of service."

Lower Makefield Township Parks and Recreation is the only accredited agency in Pennsylvania.

CAPRA accreditation includes 154 National Accreditation Standards across ten (10) subject areas:

- 1.0 Agency Authority, Role and Responsibility
- 2.0 Planning
- 3.0 Organization and Administration
- 4.0 Human Resources
- 5.0 Financial Management
- 6.0 Programs and Services Management
- 7.0 Facility and Land Use Management
- 8.0 Public Safety, Law Enforcement and Security
- 9.0 Risk Management
- 10.0 Evaluation, Assessment and Research.

According to the NRPA website, "To achieve accreditation, an organization must comply with all 36 Fundamental Standards and 106 of the 118 Non-Fundamental Standards upon initial accreditation (90%) and 112 of the 118 Non-Fundamental Standards upon reaccreditation (95%)."

Accreditation lasts for five years before reaccreditation must be pursued. To maintain accreditation in the interim, the agency must complete a comprehensive annual report demonstrating how the standards are maintained and pay an annual fee.

Current practices at the Middletown Township Parks and Recreation Department appear to satisfy many of the CAPRA accreditation requirements; however, current practices and procedures appear not to satisfy several of the 36 Fundamental Standards. These Fundamental Standards include, but are not limited to:

- 2.5 Strategic Plan
- 6.1 Recreation Programming Plan
- 6.3.1 Outreach to Diverse Underserved Populations

The process of CAPRA accreditation would have benefits for Middletown Township, including providing standards for a wide range of administrative and management practices. As mentioned on the NRPA website, the process can also help secure financial support and reduce costs. However, the rigors of the review process and cost of accreditation are not insignificant and may outweigh the benefits given Middletown's historical success applying for external grant funding, limited staffing, and the lack of funding specifically dedicated to CAPRA-accredited parks agencies.





2.6.6 Maintenance Analysis

Maintained by full-time and seasonal Public Works staff, Middletown Township's parks are generally regarded as clean, safe, and well-maintained, but it is evident that upgrades are needed as some park amenities are nearing the end of their useful lifecycles. The Public Works Director dictates day-to-day maintenance activities within the parks – in coordination with the Parks & Recreation Director. The Public Works Director has recently assigned one of the department's Foremen to oversee maintenance operations in the parks in an effort to more effectively prioritize park projects.

The primary maintenance activities that occur within the parks include:

- Mowing operations
- Trash clean-up
- Playground safety checks and upkeep
- Athletic field maintenance (in a limited number of parks)
- Snow clearing
- Assistance with set-up/breakdown of parks & recreation programs and special events
- Complete capital improvements as requested, and time allows


The Public Works Department currently employs 22 full-time staff. Besides the one Foreman position that was recently assigned to focus on park maintenance, there is not a dedicated park maintenance team, but the following staff regularly operate in the parks completing mowing and trash-related activities:

Trash clean up and emptying of trash cans

• Equipment Operator 3 (1)

Mowing operations

- Operator of gang mower (2)
- Mowing crew (1 FT, 1 Summer Staff) (2)
- Mowing crew (2 PT) (1)



2.6.7 Budget Analysis

The Parks & Recreation Department's budget represents approximately 4% of the Township's overall operating budget. The Department has been at the same millage rate since 2015.

2025 Operating Budget

Parks & Recreation Department Budgeted Revenue: \$1,774,000

- \$745,000 (42%) derives from program fees, rentals, and donations/contributions.
- Non-resident fees are implemented for programs and range from an additional 10% to 50%, depending on the activity.
- In general, programs operate at a net positive income generated.
- The highest net revenue program is Summer Rec followed by the Basketball League.

Parks & Recreation Department Budgeted Expenses: \$1,842,350

• \$892,200 (48%) derives from a direct pass-through to the Public Works Department for park maintenance expenses.

The Department has operated with a slight deficit in recent years, but the gap has been lessening as "charges for services" (participant fees) have steadily risen since the COVID pandemic. There is an expectation that the Department operates in a selfsustaining manner.

Capital improvement budgets vary greatly from year to year and are not part of this data, but it should be noted that the Department previously derived most of its capital improvement expenses from the P&R Capital Fund (funded through development fees). That fund is nearly depleted and other possible funding sources need to be explored to maintain long-term financial solvency. Recently, the Township has been successful in securing state grants to supplement the funding of some needed capital projects.



3.1 ACTION PLAN MATRIX

Opportunities are organized as an Action Plan Matrix. The Action Plan summarizes each goal and provides corresponding opportunities to achieve that goal.

The Action Plan will serve as a 'living' document for Middletown that can be easily referenced and periodically updated by municipal partners to track progress on the goals.

Vision 1

Accessible, safe, modern Township parks

The Middletown community envisions its parks to be accessible, safe, and inclusive recreation facilities that deliver people to healthy outdoor places where they may interact comfortably and peacefully.

Actions

Create a stewardship management system to ensure that ADA-compliant, universalaccessibility features are incorporated within every Middletown Township park, including actions to:

- Deliver walking paths through each
- Prioritize phased facilities replacements based on condition, age, and universal accessibility.

Vision 2

Parks linked to neighborhoods by safe pedestrian and bicycle routes

The Middletown community desires the safe bicycle and pedestrian routes described in the 2024 Multi-modal Improvement Plan (MIP) to connect Township neighborhoods to parks, preserves, and open spaces inside Middletown Township, and to the regional trails and bike routes that extend into neighboring municipalities.

Actions

Create safe bicycle and pedestrian access from Middletown neighborhoods to the nineteen (19) municipal parks; four (4) municipal preserves; five (5) Bucks County parks, and to the regional trails and bike routes that link Middletown and its neighboring communities, including actions

- · Build the missing 'last half mile' linkages between parks and existing walkway / bike routes.
- Pursue partnerships to build missing connections to County and neighboring municipal trails.

Vision 3 Recreation programming excellence

Middletown residents and Township staff will continue to work collectively to ensure the Township legacy of excellent programming by continuing to serve all ages and abilities, and to promote physical, mental, social, and emotional health for all users.

Actions

- · Ensure recreation facilities are wellmaintained and available for public use.
- Continue to diversify and expand program offerings for the diverse Middletown population while maintaining existing programming.
- Maintain efficient and sustainable program operations.

Vision 4

Increased availability of and access to open space

The Middletown community seeks to add recreation opportunities to the Township park system through strategic acquisitions that increase acreage under municipal stewardship, as well as improve public access to Township-owned open space.

Actions

- · Permanently preserve all Townshipowned open space
- Pursue opportunities to use natural greenway corridors to physically connect Middletown neighborhoods with schools, parks, commercial and civic places that exist within the Mill Creek, Queen Anne Creek and Neshaminy Creek watersheds.
- Explore and enhance appropriate passive recreation opportunities in Township preserved lands (Styer Orchard, Middletown Country Club, Langhorne Spring Water Company, Spring Valley Farm) that protect the health of the natural systems while bringing people closer to nature in their own neighborhoods.

Vision 5

Efficient and sustainable Parks & Recreation management, maintenance, and administration

Middletown Township will continue its mission to deliver excellent park and recreation experiences to the community who take pride in their neighborhoods and history.

Actions

- Update record-keeping systems and agreement processes
- Refine contractor procurement processes / requirements
- Formalize the training of P&R staff and consciously build an open informationsharing culture

Vision 6

Township policy / ordinances support recreation needs with funding strategies that achieve multifunctional infrastructure improvements

Middletown Township seeks to balance development with quality-of-life needs and the modernization of infrastructure that can serve multiple needs: transportation, ecological restoration, stormwater management, and recreation.

Actions

- Employ modern remedies to transportation barriers that limit public access to recreation, using strategic, consistent incremental phases of planning, funding, and engineering.
- Review Township policy and ordinances to support the recreational and open space needs of the community.
- Coordinate funding strategies between finance, planning, parks & recreation, and public works departments to maximize the potential to capitalize and maintain park and open space improvements.

Vision 1: Accessible, safe, modern Township parks

The Middletown community envisions its parks to be accessible, safe, and inclusive recreation facilities that deliver people to healthy outdoor places where they may interact comfortably and peacefully.

Goals

Create a stewardship management system to ensure that ADA-compliant, universal-accessibility features are incorporated within every Middletown Township park, including actions to:

- Deliver paths through each park.
- Prioritize phased facilities replacements based on condition, age, and universal accessibility.

Overview

Safe pedestrian routes and interconnected neighborhoods, parks, and open space were the resounding priorities identified by the public opinion surveys for both the 2024 MT Multimodal Improvement Plan (MIP) and this CPROSGT study. Public comments received during this study indicate that residents seek out parks and open space for peaceful experiences, only to find passage into the parks stressful due to access and safety concerns.

Universally accessible park features are lacking in multiple Middletown parks and many parks lack accessible internal routes to amenities such as playgrounds and sports fields. A concerted effort can prioritize updating park amenities to provide access for people of all abilities.

The implementation of park-specific signage across Middletown parks can visually link these vital assets by creating a strong sense of identity and also subtly differentiate them graphically from the neighborhood signage where they are located.

Opportunity 1.1 Implement elements of the Middletown Township Park Accessibility Strategy

- Implement elements of the MT Park Accessibility Strategy for compliant access within park boundaries to facilities including parking, restrooms, playgrounds, etc. (the MT Park Accessibility Toolbox).
- Inventory the conditions of all internal park paths, from park boundaries and parking lots and between amenities to ensure that viable ADA-compliant routes exist to park features.
- Prioritize parks lacking ADA-compliant routes.
- · Include internal park accessibility components on future grant applications.

Access to open space and recreational venues must not be limited to those whose physical abilities enable it. The intent of the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) is to structure universal access to improve the quality of life for all. Federal guidelines for ADA compliance in parks and open space are specific. Not all areas require impervious surfaces.

The MT Park Accessibility Strategy offers a set of tools to provide ADA-compliant access within park boundaries to all facilities, such as parking, restrooms, playgrounds, and sports fields. These tools include: sidewalks (paths within park-adjacent rights-of-way or adjacent to park entrance drives); paths (paths outside of the right-of-way); and crosswalks. Other tools included in the Middletown Multimodal Improvements Toolbox may also be useful, though typically most of those will effectively be implemented outside of park boundaries.

Implementing the MT Park Accessibility Strategy can begin with an inventory of existing conditions of park paths to ensure that viable ADA-compliant routes exist to all

park features. Some routes may be made accessible with simple repairs to existing park paths. Other routes may require the Township to construct new paths or to regrade existing paths. Priority should be given to parks that lack ADA-compliant routes. Implementation should also include analysis of the approach to each park: Are there sidewalks that lead to the park? Are there curb cuts to provide ADA-compliant access to the park with clearly marked crosswalks?

An additional consideration of the MT Park Accessibility Strategy is the accessibility of the facilities themselves. Are there universally accessible play elements included in playgrounds? Can active recreational facilities like basketball or volleyball courts be adapted for use by people with mobility limitations?

Two of the most frequent reasons reported for individuals not visiting parks were the lack of shade and restrooms. Both served as deterrents for more frequent and longer stays in the parks. A system-wide park strategy can be adopted that prioritizes increasing the density of the tree canopy

in each park, especially around amenities where active recreation is occurring like playgrounds and sport courts.

In locations where tree planting may not be possible, like the skatepark, or where shade is more urgently needed, the installation of manufactured shade structures should be considered. Additional operating funds may be budgeted each year to fund the needed shade elements and these may also be partially funded by grant-funded capital improvements.

Two case studies below demonstrate how the MT Park Accessibility Strategy may be applied to improve accessibility at Middletown Parks.

Case Study: Firefighters' Park

Firefighters' Park largely lacks an internal path system that would create accessible routes to the various amenities in the park. These amenities include three (3)

parking lots, two (2) diamond fields, a soccer field, two (2) basketball courts, a playground, and eight (8) pickleball courts. Existing paths connect one parking lot to the basketball courts, another parking lot to the playground and a path that encircles the playground, and the third parking lot to the pickleball courts.

The MT Accessibility Strategy proposes additional accessible connections throughout the park. A proposed sidewalk along Poplar Street connects the northeastern parking lot to the northwestern parking lot, continuing along Duxbury Drive to the entrance drive for the pickleball court parking lot. The sidewalk extends along this entrance drive to connect to a path along the north side of the pickleball courts. Crosswalks at all entrance drives, across Poplar Street at Hulmeville Road, and across Duxbury Drive at Poplar Street connect the proposed sidewalks to the existing sidewalk

network. Internal paths provide accessible connections between the three parking lots and all other amenities in the park.

In addition to providing accessible routes to all amenities within Firefighters' Park, the path system proposed as part of the MT Park Accessibility Strategy creates two pedestrian loops around and through the park. One extends around the perimeter of the active recreation portions of the park, providing views toward Neshaminy Creek overlooking the stormwater basin at the southern end of the park. A smaller loop includes sidewalks on Poplar Street and Duxbury Drive, extending to the pickleball courts before cutting north to the northwestern parking lot through the center of the park.

Case Study: Middletown Community Park

Middletown Community Park is largely wellconnected with accessible routes providing connections between various parts of the parking lot and many of the amenities in the park. These amenities include a large parking lot, five (5) diamond fields, four (4) soccer fields, four (4) multi-use fields, a basketball court, a playground, a skate park, an electronic kick wall, two (2) pavilions, and the Community Park Barn. Existing paths connect the parking lot to all five diamond fields, one of the soccer fields, the skate park and basketball court, and the Township's sidewalk network.

The MT Accessibility Strategy proposes additional accessible connections, largely on the eastern half of the park. New paths provide connections to soccer and multi-purpose fields. Additional short path sections finish the connection between existing paths and the playground and

electronic kick wall and link disconnected sections of the park's internal path network. At several locations in the parking lot, crosswalks are provided to grassy shoulders of the vehicular circulation system. These connections should be paved to ensure accessibility.

Proposed paths may provide further connections to the Township's sidewalk network. Crosswalks are proposed where the internal pedestrian network of the park crosses the entrance drive. Sidewalks and crosswalks are proposed on Langhorne-Yardley Road and Village Road to link the sidewalk network.

Most, if not all, of the recommended improvements at Middletown Community Park could be constructed in-house by Public Works staff. Alternatively, if additional park improvements are planned, the accessibility improvements described above could be included in that work.

In addition to accessibility improvements, the proposed connections in Middletown Community Park complete the perimeter trail loop, a desired amenity in the park based on feedback from the public opinion survey.

Opportunity 1.2 Adapt / update the Middletown Township Parks signage system

 Add/modify the details of the Middletown Township signage and branding systems to ensure a comprehensive graphic and informational approach for all levels of signage that make parks functional, safe and attractive.

In recent years, Middletown Township has installed identity signage at the entrances to many neighborhoods and parks throughout the Township. This signage has helped create a recognizable brand for the Township and has significantly improved wayfinding by standardizing design with reflective white lettering on a blue background. This standardized signage may create some confusion, where parks and neighborhoods signage have the same graphic design and, in many cases, the same name.

The Township can consider changing the background color of park signs from blue to green to clearly identify which signs are for neighborhoods and which are for parks. Township Preserves could be identified with signage using a brown background to distinguish them from Middletown parks.

Typical park signage systems may include branding, directional, safety, informational, and interpretive displays. Many Middletown parks lack clearly posted rules and hours, or have rules posted for specific park amenities but not for the park as a whole. Using signage at each park that dovetails with the established MT graphic brand will make it simpler for visitors to locate and use.

Opportunity 1.3 Implement the Twin Oaks Park Master Site Development Plan

• Implement elements of the 2010 Twin Oaks Park Master Site Development Plan.

Middletown developed a master site development plan for Twin Oaks Park in 2010, but implementation has been limited. Many of the issues identified in the master site development plan remain relevant to this day, including limited parking, flooding, accessibility within the park, and degradation of grass fields due to overuse.

The Township can revisit the 2010 master site development plan to ensure improvements will continue to serve the Township's needs, then implement elements of the plan to ensure that the park is safe, accessible, and modern. These elements may include:

- Playground updates and expansion to create universal play opportunities
- Playground updates to reduce or eliminate access to Queen Anne Creek from the play area
- · An accessible internal pedestrian path system
- Reorientation of fields to meet contemporary field standards. Reorientation will likely require the elimination of one or more of the existing playing fields; the Township should work to ensure other baseball facilities are available (see Opportunity 5.7)
- Improved vehicular circulation. particularly on the west side of the park
- Stormwater management improvements.

Implementation may be performed in phases to ensure field access is disrupted as little as possible. Additional fields at Chickenfoot Park and Queen Anne Park, both Bucks County Parks, could accommodate some, if not all, of the displaced field use.

Opportunity 1.4 Regularly update a municipal log of all recreation facilities

The Parks & Recreation Department should annually update its resource catalogue of all parks and preserve sites (elements tagged by location), including, but not limited to: equipment model/ source, age; noted damage; area occupied by play equipment; required fall zones, maintenance requirements, etc.

This log should also include anticipated replacement dates for all equipment including playgrounds. A replacement schedule for playgrounds should be shared publicly, when appropriate.

Vision 2: Parks linked to neighborhoods by safe pedestrian and bicycle routes

The community desires Middletown Township to implement the safe bicycle and pedestrian routes, as described in the 2024 Multi-modal Improvement Plan (MIP) to connect Township neighborhoods to parks, preserves, open spaces inside the Township, and to the regional trails and bike routes that extend into neighboring municipalities.

Goals

Create safe bicycle and pedestrian access from Middletown neighborhoods to the nineteen (19) municipal parks; four (4) municipal preserves; five (5) Bucks County parks, and to the regional trails and bike routes that link Middletown and its neighboring communities, including actions to:

- Build the missing 'last half mile' linkages between parks and existing pathways / bike routes.
- Pursue partnerships to build missing connections to County and neighboring municipal trails.

Overview

As noted in Vision 1, creating a more connected community with safe pedestrian/bicycle routes to parks, open spaces, and neighborhoods was identified as a top priority for Middletown Township Parks & Recreation Department in the public opinion survey for this CPROSGT study. Building these connections will require working with partners to ensure pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure are included in associated transportation and other infrastructure projects.

Opportunity 2.1 Implement / update the priorities of the Middletown Township Park Accessibility Strategy

 Implement/update the priorities of the MT Park Accessibility Strategy within this CPROSGT Plan for last-half mile connections to MT parks and open spaces.

To achieve township-wide access for all Middletown residents, accessibility measures can be implemented to reach parks as some of the most frequented civic destinations. This approach, may be referred to as "last-half mile connections," and focus on accessing parks via accessible routes can often deliver accessibility to multiple other local destinations for all residents, regardless of ability. Tools similar to those described in Opportunity 1.1 can be used to help

deliver this access, and the MIP provides references for additional measures that may be implemented.

Considerations for priority implementation projects include: sidewalk gaps; trail gaps; and links to local connections (including public transit). Obstacles to these connections may include infrastructure, such as Rt. 1, and private parcel ownerships.

Opportunity 2.2 Select priority locations for pedestrian / biking connections

 Select priority locations for the pedestrian/biking connections, noted in Opportunity 2.1 above, by carefully weighing multiple criteria.

The Township can refer to the recommended priorities laid out in the MIP as a starting point for prioritizing park accessibility improvements. The Township should consider the following criteria when prioritizing pedestrian and biking connections recommended above in Opportunity 2.1:

- All costs (planning, design, permitting, construction)
- Viable partners
- Potential for outside funding sources
- In-house leverage funds (these funds can be used as a match for any grant

funds where a match is required)

- Estimated local service population
- Type of improvement needed.

Several gaps in the Township trail system represent "low-hanging fruit," that may offer significant improvements to the network with relatively low investment.

Langhorne-Yardley Road and Village Road near Middletown Community Park

The MIP proposed a sidepath on Langhorne-Yardley Road to connect existing paths north and south of the park. Subsequent improvements have provided the connection to Core Creek Park, but no connection to the trail on Township Line Road in neighboring Lower Makefield Township exists. The MIP also proposed a multiuse trail in the park to complete the

loop trail around the perimeter of the park and connect with a sidepath along Village Road. The Village Road sidepath terminates at Core Creek Park. Members of the public mentioned these connections multiple times during the public engagement for this plan, demonstrating strong support.

The majority of these trail sections fall within the rights-of-way of the roads they parallel. There may be limited need to negotiate access easements along the proposed route to navigate private property, but overall, obstacles to the trails will be minimal.

Exeter Road in the Sturbridge neighborhood

The existing trail in the proposed Neshaminy Creek Open Space Preserve (see Opportunity 4.6), part of the Neshaminy Creek Greenway, terminates at the end of Exeter Road, a short culde-sac in the Sturbridge neighborhood. A sidewalk on this street would connect the trail to the Township's sidewalk network which provides connection to the Core Creek Trail system through the St. Mary Medical Center property. The existing right-of-way appears wide enough to easily accommodate this sidewalk without need for access easements.

Clearview Avenue and Brownsville Road between Det. Christopher Jones Memorial Park and Lance Corporal Harry J. Simmons, Jr. Memorial Park

The MIP proposed improving the existing trail in Det. Jones Memorial Park and providing sidewalks along Clearview Avenue and Brownsville Road to connect to Simmons Park. Crosswalks and a Rapid Flashing Beacon are also proposed along this route for pedestrian safety. The existing rights-of-way appear sufficient to accommodate the proposed sidewalks included in this route.

Mill Creek/Queen Anne Creek Greenway Trails

The MIP proposed trails along the Mill Creek and Queen Anne Creek Greenways, connecting Trenton Road to Frosty Hollow Road and Woodbourne Road, as well as the Frosty Hollow Tennis Center. The portion of this trail in the Frosty Hollow Tennis Center, known as the Frosty Hollow Trail, has entered the planning phase in partnership with Bucks County Parks & Recreation and the Bucks County Planning Commission. These trails provide much-needed pedestrian connections in the largely untrailed Levittown section of the Township. The Queen Anne Creek Greenway also provides connections within the Quincy Hollow and Cobalt Ridge neighborhoods, where sidewalks terminate in parkland but do not provide passage over the creek. Both of these greenway trails are proposed within Township parks and open space; trail areas not within Township property fall within existing rights-of-way.

Potential funding sources for these trail sections can be found in Chapter 4 – Implementation.

Opportunity 2.3 Prioritize local neighborhood pedestrian / biking connections to the Lower Neshaminy Creek Greenway Trail

 Prioritize local neighborhood pedestrian/biking connections to the Lower Neshaminy Creek Greenway Trail currently under construction inside Core Creek Park, through coordination with the Bucks County Planning Commission and Bucks County Parks & Recreation Department.

Core Creek Park is not a part of the MT Parks and Recreation system but is the most widely recognizable and most visited park in the Township. Ground was broken on the Lower Neshaminy Creek Greenway Trail Phase III in May 2025, and this work will connect existing trails within Core Creek Park to an existing pedestrian network at the intersection of Woodbourne Road and Ellis Road. By prioritizing local pedestrian and biking connections to this new trail section, the Township may leverage the new Lower Neshaminy Greenway Trail improvements to create quick connectivity successes for Middletown residents.

The MIP proposes several improvements in proximity to this new trail section. At the east end, a side path is proposed along Woodbourne Road. At the west end, a short side path is proposed along Tollgate Road with a crosswalk at Park Road. This side path will provide a future connection to a planned trail connecting Tollgate Road and Langhorne-Newtown Road.

Opportunity 2.4 "Piggyback" municipal pedestrian / bicycle improvements on vehicular transportation partnership projects

 Piggyback municipal pathway/ bicycle improvements on vehicular transportation partnership projects, including PennDOT Route 1 Reconstruction Section RC3.

Pedestrian and bicycle improvements are mandated to be included as part of multimodal transportation projects, and not simply standalone projects themselves. The Township can review all vehicular transportation projects proposed inside the Township, including those administered by partners such as PennDOT, for their potential to include pedestrian/ bicycle improvements. "Piggybacking" ped-bike improvements with vehicular transportation projects may provide access to additional funding sources and help to reduce disturbances caused by separate construction projects.

The PennDOT RC3 project represents a unique opportunity to work with the agency and neighboring municipalities to make this section a genuine multi-modal demonstration by converting remnant Route 1 right of way into a dedicated ped-bike facility that can link residents to multiple priority destinations like the Neshaminy High School and the Woods Services Campus with a new offroad bike

Woods Services has been working with the PennDOT project team throughout the RC3 process. The Township may consider partnering with Woods Services in the near term to capitalize on this existing relationship to ensure bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure priorities are considered around this large PennDOT infrastructure redevelopment.

Opportunity 2.5 Combine priority Ped-Bike improvements with related municipal, county, and state infrastructure goals

• Combine priority ped-bike improvements with related municipal, county, and state infrastructure goals in the early program and planning phases whenever possible, such as integrating ped-bike improvements with stormwater, utility, roadway, bridge and transit projects.

Opportunity 2.4 describes combining priority pedestrian and bicycle improvements with other related infrastructure goals to reduce disruption of multiple construction projects and potentially access additional funding sources. The Township can work to combine these improvements in the early program and planning phases to ensure

that ped-bike improvements are seamless and that no new infrastructure conflicts are created.

Vision 3: Recreation programming excellence

Middletown residents and Township staff will continue to work collectively to ensure the Township legacy of excellent programming by continuing to serve all ages and abilities, and to promote physical, mental, social, and emotional health for all users.

Goals

- Ensure recreation facilities are wellmaintained and available for public use.
- Continue to diversify and expand program offerings for the diverse Middletown population while maintaining existing programming.
- Maintain efficient and sustainable program operations.

Overview

Overall, Middletown Township residents report being satisfied with the current program offerings the Middletown Township Parks & Recreation Department provides. However, public opinion survey results show opportunities to improve program offerings, particularly for older children/ young adults and for seniors.

Organized youth athletics programs are among the most well-attended programs in the Township, with most of these programs offered by partner organizations using Township owned or managed facilities. Ensuring that these facilities are wellmaintained and well-managed, with opportunities for open play in addition to organized athletics, will be key to the future success of these programs.

A diverse range of program offerings, including active recreation such as organized athletics and more passive offerings such as environmental education and arts programming, recognizes the diversity within the Middletown community. The MT Parks & Recreation Department continues to strive to supplement programming diversity and to help ensure that all community members are welcome in parks and open spaces and their varied needs are provided for.

Opportunity 3.1 Create a system for confirming field / facility use and maintain public availability for some Middletown Township fields

- Create a system for confirming field/ facility use to enable Middletown Parks & Recreation and its program partners to strategically evaluate the needs for additional facilities. Prepare a seasonal schedule of public availability of MT fields for non-structured use(s) by Township residents.
- Staff may consider artificial turf field retrofits to provide physical space and additional time slots for active recreation.

Middletown Township is fortunate to have multiple local and regional partners who utilize the Township athletic fields and sport courts - which serves many recreation needs of residents. One challenge of those user partnerships is seasonal wear-and-tear on the fields, which have generated calls for additional fields and courts to supplement the demands for

While some fields absolutely need to be rested for maintenance purposes, prior to investing the options for additional fields and/or significant field investments, it is important that Township staff clearly understand actual usage rates versus permit rates. To date, actual daily use data is unreliable. This can be documented with the help of these partners.

Staff can review permitting vs. actual uses to assess opportunities that may serve new community and private group requests, as well as consider opportunities to allot time for non-structured uses by Township residents.

This analysis will also be helpful as staff create a rotational "field closure schedule" for short and long-term maintenance. Data on permitting/usage rates may be used to negotiate future financial contribution agreements with community groups for needed annual maintenance and capital improvements - based on actual current and projected future facility usage estimates. Staff can also consider artificial turf field retrofits for how they might provide more durable physical facilities and additional time slots for active recreation.

With so many of the Middletown parks and facilities being utilized weekdays after municipal office hours and on weekends, the Township may also consider creating a park patrol program that could serve dual mandates:

- 1. Serve as park ambassadors and
- 2. Monitor park rules and permits.

Preventing misuse and overuse of facilities offer potential financial savings to the Department. Regular reports can alert Public Works staff to hazards found in the parks, so they may be addressed as priorities. This approach might be funded through a combination of new fees assessed to athletic associations, with increases in rental fees.

Opportunity 3.2 Continue with work to update agreements with local youth sports associations

 Continue with work to update agreements with local youth sports associations and plan to review those agreements every 5 years.

Local youth sports associations, including: the Middletown Athletic Association: Langhorne Athletic Association; Hulmeville Soccer Club; and others are invaluable partners for Middletown Parks & Recreation – by providing sports programming and assisting with maintenance to varying degrees at the Parks facilities they use.

During this CPROSGT report production, the Township has been revisiting agreements that govern these partnerships - after several years without written agreements. The Township can continue to expedite finalizing these agreements, and plan future partnership agreement reviews every five (5) years to ensure that expectations around maintenance and field availability are clear to all participants.

Based on feedback from surrounding communities and acknowledging that Middletown Township has a unique relationship with each of its youth sports associations, the following opportunities may be considered when revising the current agreements:

- · Youth sports associations should seek Township approval prior to expansion of programs that could create additional need/demand for more fields.
- · Youth sports associations must have a representative attend a regular (recommended semi-annual) field stakeholder meeting. Failure to do so could result in use permits not being issued.
- Youth sports associations must submit seasonal use permit requests to the

Parks & Recreation Department.

- · All daily and seasonal maintenance responsibilities for the youth sports associations and the Township will be memorialized - including but not be limited to, mowing, fielding lining, infield dragging, goal maintenance, backstop/ fence maintenance, building repairs, trash clean-up, and field lights.
- Clearly state capital improvement funding expectations - what are the sole responsibilities of the youth sports associations and the Township and what should be a shared capital expense.
- · Document an official opening and closing date for each park or field and mandatory rest periods of time.
- List repercussions for violations of park rules and/or department mandates.
- The Parks & Recreation Board and the Board of Supervisors should be engaged to determine if they desire that use fees be established, increased, or decreased for use of Township fields. Both boards should be informed of what services the Township provides to each youth sports association and any costs incurred by the Township.
- Residency of a youth sports association and/or a residency of a percentage of the association's participants should be considered when determining fees and prioritization of use.

Opportunity 3.3 Continue a regional approach to providing contractor- / vendor-led

· Continue regional approach to providing Contractor/Vendor-led offerings to maximize the types of activities offered.

The MT Parks & Recreation Department has historically maintained a positive and collaborative relationship with its municipal neighbors and with Bucks County. As a result, the various departments have been able to supplement each other's program offerings and facilities, rather than competing or duplicating. In some cases, two or more P&R departments have partnered on programs by each taking separate registrations - with a single department hosting the program.

This collaborative approach benefits residents of all participating communities. by combining enrollments to populate programs at viable levels and by sharing resources across allied departments. This best practice may be continued in the future.

Opportunity 3.4 Evaluate Parks and Recreation staffing needs for programming by season

Generally, parks & recreation departments see staffing requirements fluctuating from season to season. With the summer season traditionally being the busiest for staff, the Township can consider reinstituting a paid summer internship position (May to August) to provide additional department support. This position helps the Department staff and supports the growth of the parks & recreation industry in helping to develop new professionals and may serve as an important method for identifying potential new staff.

Based on public feedback, the concept of conservation is highly valued in Middletown Township and there is a strong desire for an increase in environmental-based programming – and this will generate support for environmental conservation programming, which can then lead to increased citizen stewardship of parks.

The creation of a part-time or full-time natural resource position within the Public Works staff could work with programming staff to expand nature-focused recreation opportunities with the development of new programs as well as leading volunteer stewardship improvements in the parks. This position could also lead the proposed Middletown Nature Center (see Opportunity 3.9).

Opportunity 3.5 Consider ways to strategically collaborate with the Neshaminy School **District**

 Consider ways to strategically collaborate with the Neshaminy School District (NSD) to provide recreation opportunities to MT residents using NSD facilities.

The Neshaminy School District (NSD) is a significant provider of recreation facilities in Middletown Township, with six (6) schools and several former school buildings providing playgrounds and sports facilities. With the exception of Herbert Hoover Park, which the Township leases from NSD, these facilities are not available to the public outside of school hours.

The Township can consider ways to strategically collaborate with the NSD to provide recreation opportunities to MT residents by sharing NSD facilities when they are not being used by students. Precedents for such collaboration can be found in the lease of Herbert Hoover Park and in the Idlewood Environmental Station at Neshaminy High School. Idlewood formerly provided trails open to the public through more than 125 acres of riparian forest. The reopening of this facility to the public would provide much desired trail access on the west side of the Township. Additional collaboration opportunities may exist at the now-closed Pearl S. Buck Elementary School and Samuel Everitt Elementary School, both of which are currently leased to the Bucks Intermediate Unit.

Opportunity 3.6 Explore potential program offerings where Middletown Township might collaborate with other community members

· Explore potential program offerings where MT might collaborate with other community members to create a dynamic integration of diverse populations.

As the MT Parks & Recreation Department looks to diversify its program offerings, the Township can explore partnering with local organizations that already provide programs for populations not served or underserved by current program options. By working with partners, the Township can stay current on options for serving diverse populations, while amplifying efforts of organizations already working within the Township and/or within surrounding communities.

Two potential partners are St. Mary's Community Health and Woods Services. These organizations are already providing recreational and educational programs for diverse populations within the Township. In the past, St. Mary's collaborated with the Township to provide cooking classes for youth.

In recent years, Woods Services has enhanced its campus with recreation improvements, including basketball courts and paved, accessible trails through the forest portion of campus. Two (2) outdoor pools, an indoor pool, and equine facilities already exist on the campus. When thinking about partnerships, the Township should consider measures that may permit residents to access these facilities.

Opportunity 3.7 Collaborate with the Heritage Conservancy at Styer Orchard

 Collaborate with the Heritage Conservancy at Styers Orchard for program offerings related to urban farming, gardening, or careers in food production fields for high school students.

The Heritage Conservancy has expressed an interest in increasing environmental and agricultural education programming at Styer Orchard. The two pavilions recently installed at the property provide the ideal venue for such programming. MT can work with the Heritage Conservancy to target a portion of this new programming for high school students/teenagers, as this population is less well-served with nonathletic program offerings than other age groups in the Township.

Philadelphia Parks & Recreation's Farm Philly program started in 2014 and provides a model for urban agricultural programming. The program supports 60 agricultural projects throughout the city. including: education gardens, community gardens, composting, and farms. The Junior Farmers program works with young people to care for small gardens, orchards, and pollinator gardens. A similar program at Styer Orchard might increase program offerings for teens while helping to connect the larger community to agriculture and the natural world.

Opportunity 3.8 Create a new Middletown Community Center

- Create a new Middletown Community Center, including a senior center element and other facilities that are modern, code-compliant, and provide additional indoor programming space and modern amenities.
- A feasibility study may be needed to determine if existing buildings / site might be retrofitted for this purpose.

The current Middletown Community Center (MCC) is home to the Middletown Senior Center, summer camp programs, and indoor rental space for the community. Indoor recreation facilities for the general community are limited to the Community Park Barn, which does not provide space for indoor sports such as basketball or volleyball. Maintenance needs at the MCC building, such as a new roof, are becoming significant. The building currently lacks ADA-accessible bathrooms and a dedicated cafeteria space. Space limitations create conflicts between various uses.

A new MCC would accommodate all programming currently conducted at the MCC and provide space for additional indoor recreational programming, including athletics such as basketball and volleyball. A feasibility study may be needed to determine if the existing building may be retrofitted to accommodate additional amenities and meet current code requirements, or if a new building would be necessary.





A concept drawing for a new 45,000 square foot MCC building with indoor sports facilities is shown below. The MCC building is located closer to Trenton Road to provide a more welcoming experience from the street. This location also accommodates an additional three pickleball courts to the rear of the building, as well as an expanded parking lot with approximately 200 parking spaces.

Other sites were considered in the process of concept development for the MCC, but no site was found that could accommodate the facility with the same level of access that the current facility provides.

Opportunity 3.9 Consider the development of a Middletown Nature Center

- Consider the development of a 'MT Nature Center' – using the Silver Lake Nature Center as a model.
- Explore use of the former Samuel Everitt Elementary School building along Mill Creek Greenway for this purpose.

Public engagement for this CPROSGT plan revealed great interest in environmental education and programming which creates connections with nature in Middletown. The Township can consider the development of a Middletown Nature Center to provide for this programming. Silver Lake Nature Center is a Bucks County Parks and Recreation facility in Bristol, PA that provides a good model for such a facility - where a small visitor center anchors the Nature Center's largely outdoor exhibits and provides interpretive information for the various habitats preserved within the surrounding Silver Lake Park. The nonprofit Friends of Silver Lake Nature Center provides fundraising and programmatic support.

The Township may consider partnering with the Friends of Silver Lake organization Interpretive Signage at Woods Services and/or the Bucks County Department of Parks and Recreation to establish a nature center in Middletown. The Township could also consider partnering with another existing local environmental education nonprofit organization, such as those described in Opportunity 4.8.

A center could be housed within an existing Township facility, such as Det. Christopher Jones Park (home of the Native Tree Search), or could be provided with a dedicated facility. One such potential location for the Middletown Nature Center is the former Samuel Everitt Elementary School building, currently leased by Bucks

Intermediate Unit. Located adjacent to Forsythia Crossing Park and the Mill Creek Greenway, the building is well-located to anchor the proposed Mill Creek Greenway Trail. The proposed Natural Resource Manager position (see Opportunity 3.4) could also manage the Nature Center.

Opportunity 3.10 Review and update Middletown facility fee schedules

 Review and update MT facility fee schedule at least every two (2) years to ensure that each fee covers all Township costs and contributes a percentage toward MT parks maintenance and operations costs, or other parks and recreation purposes.

To ensure that Middletown Township Parks & Recreation is covering all expenses associated with operating its facilities (including utilities and building monitoring) and is generating revenue needed to

keep pace with department costs, staff should review and revise the MT facility fee schedule at least every two (2) years. This review can compare the Township rates to its municipal neighbors and forprofit entities to compare current rental market rates. This practice will enable the Department to continue working towards achieving financial sustainability.

Opportunity 3.11 Explore new programming opportunities

 Explore new programming opportunities such as bus trips, additional smaller special events, and potential 'drop-in' attendance options for some programs.

MT Parks & Recreation is doing an exemplary job providing activities for its residents, including 300 program sessions, and three (3) to five (5) special events annually. Based on staff feedback, several additional programming opportunities would require minimal work to yield additional revenue for the department.

For programs that currently have additional enrollment capacity, staff may consider adding a "drop-in" or "try-it" option. This may be ideal for pre-school programs or adult fitness classes where participants (or their caregivers) are looking for flexibility and/or shorter-term commitments. A higher fee per class could be charged in exchange for this flexibility. This approach may also appeal to individuals interested in trying out a program before signing up.

One-day or multi-day trips may be of interest to Middletown residents, especially older active adults. To reduce the challenge of filling an entire trip on their own, staff could partner with departments already running one-day bus trips. There are several for-profit companies that offer multi-day trips that only require the Township to advertise the trip and then a set fee or percentage of the trip cost would be paid to the Department. These companies, which include Premier World Discovery and Odysseys Unlimited among others, work with multiple municipal partners, so a township is not required to meet a minimum number of participants. A very limited amount of staff time is required to generate positive net revenue.

MT Parks & Recreation has historically been known for running larger, high-quality, and well-attended special events such as its Earth Day celebration. The Department should consider offering additional, scaleddown special events to remain in the public focus year-round. Examples of these types of events include: weekday children's concerts in a park, pop-up events in neighborhood parks, and additional pickleball tournaments.

Department staff has done well offering several teen-focused programs/camps/ events. It is recommended that the Department continue expanding its efforts with this challenging but important demographic.

Prior to expanding new youth programming opportunities, the staff should assess the reasons for the high youth program cancellation rate and work to reduce the percentage of canceled programs. The first step would be for staff to review each youth program that did not reach its required minimum participant level and document the day of the week, time, facility, and topic to identify commonalities between the programs.

The next recommended step would be for programming staff to review detailed results of this plan's public survey and the questions related to programs and events. Staff should consider what connections there might be between the programs that did not run and what the survey respondents indicated that they were interested in. If needed, utilize an online survey and/or social media to garner additional feedback from the public. When developing new programs, staff can refer back to this data to help guide decision making about what programs should be offered.

Vision 4: Increased availability of and access to open space

The Middletown community seeks to add recreation opportunities to the Township park system through strategic acquisitions that increase acreage under municipal stewardship, as well as improve public access to Townshipowned open space.

Goals

- · Permanently preserve all Townshipowned open space
- Pursue opportunities to use natural greenway corridors to physically connect Middletown neighborhoods with schools, parks, commercial and civic places that exist within the Mill Creek, Queen Anne Creek and Neshaminy Creek watersheds.
- Explore and enhance appropriate passive recreation opportunities in Township preserved lands (Styer Orchard, Middletown Country Club, Langhorne Spring Water Company, Spring Valley Farm) that protect the health of the natural systems while bringing people closer to nature in their own neighborhoods.

Overview

Open space preservation and improved access to open space emerged as high priorities during the public engagement for this report. Middletown Township is fortunate to have ample open space preserves, but access to these preserves is limited and many residents consider preserved open space as only undeveloped land. By working to permanently preserve these lands and provide public access where appropriate, the Township can raise the profile of this land in the public eye. Additionally, the Township can work to encourage public stewardship of open space lands by providing environmental education, allowing the public to appreciate the lands already preserved in the public's name.

Opportunity 4.1 Review the deeds of Township-owned open space, recreation, and preserved lands

- Review deeds of Township-owned open space, recreation and preserved lands to ensure that covenants / restrictions exist to prevent future development of these parcels.
- Coordinate with Township solicitor on the most cost-effective and efficient legal mechanisms for achieving permanency.
- · Consider establishing an open space working group.

Public feedback shows a great deal of concern about development in the Township. Permanently preserving Township-owned spaces with legally

enforceable mechanisms protects the status of parks and open space from changes in political and economic climates.

The Township EAC is tasked with compiling and maintaining a list of open spaces in Middletown to obtain "information on the proper use of such areas." The Township may also consider expanding EAC responsibilities to include review of the management of open space parcels and the potential to acquire additional parcels. when available.

Opportunity 4.2 Re-evaluate the operational control and management of Styer Orchard

 Re-evaluate the operational control and management of Styer Orchard with Heritage Conservancy to enable the installation of passive trail connections and educational programming opportunities.

The current management and operations approach at Styer Orchard works well for all three parties involved (Township, Heritage Conservancy, and Farmer) and depends on good relationships between these three parties. The Heritage Conservancy has expressed interest in re-evaluating the management of the property to ensure that it remains stable despite potential future changes in political and economic climates, as well as increasing educational programming at the property. Styer Orchard is well located to provide trail connections to Core Creek Park, which may require changes to the terms of the existing easement.

The Township may consider options, including selling the property to the Heritage Conservancy outright or working with the Heritage Conservancy to transfer restricted funds from the endowment to the Township for on-going programming and maintenance of the property.

Opportunity 4.3 Review terms of conservation easement on Langhorne Spring Water Company (LSWC) Preserve

- · Review terms of conservation easement on Langhorne Spring Water Company (LSWC) Preserve with Heritage Conservancy to evaluate the feasibility of enabling public pedestrian access within the parcel.
- Budget for a property survey to confirm parcel limits.

The Langhorne Spring Water Company Preserve represents one of the Township's largest open space properties but lacks public access. The Township can work with the Heritage Conservancy, which holds the conservation easement on the property, to review the feasibility of adding pedestrian trails throughout the property. These trails would be best located to minimize disturbance, particularly in environmentally sensitive areas of the preserve. Informal

trails already exist in some parts of the property where the public has created access and is evidence of public desire to access the property. A small parking lot might be located in an already disturbed area near the intersection of Gillam Avenue and Interchange Avenue, and trails could easily be linked to the existing pedestrian network.

There is a lack of clarity about the boundaries of the property and some potential encroachment by neighbors. The Township should consider carrying out a survey to confirm the limits of the property.

Opportunity 4.4 Conduct a feasibility study for the Middletown Country Club

 Conduct a feasibility study for the Middletown County Club property to evaluate the highest and best use of the facility.

Middletown Country Club has seen a decline in services over approximately five years – with the closure of the public pool and the reduction/elimination of restaurant/catering services. The condition of the course has declined over that period, as well. The current operating lease will end in 2028, providing a good opportunity to reexamine the sole use of the property as a golf course. The Township may conduct a feasibility study for the property to evaluate the highest and best use of all potential facilities on that site. Other uses that may be considered include a pedestrian trail system and as an environmental restoration area.

A feasibility study may include potentially re-opening the public pool on the property. If reopening the public pool was found not to be feasible, the Township has the option to consider if one or more water features at that site or other Township parks may help provide water-play recreation features. Water features can be as basic as push button misters near playgrounds and sport courts or as large as a splash pad complex.

Opportunity 4.5 Seek grant funding to implement Packages A & B of the 2016 Spring Valley Farm Master Plan

Middletown Township developed a master plan for Spring Valley Farm in 2016, following its acquisition in 2013. The master plan divides improvements into eleven (11) packages or phases. The Township can seek grant funding to implement Packages A and B of this master plan - which include: parking and vehicular infrastructure improvements; and a picnic green with access improvements. These improvements will provide public access to the property for the first time since acquisition. Specific grant opportunities that may apply to the implementation of these phases are described in the Implementation portion of this report.

The 2016 Master Plan also proposes an amphitheater connected to the picnic green. This amenity was widely requested during the public engagement for this CPROSGT report. Even though the Master Plan includes an amphitheater as part of Implementation Package F, the Township can consider if this new feature might be included in an earlier implementation phase.


Opportunity 4.6 Rebrand greenways and Township-owned open spaces as Middletown 'Preserves'

 Rebrand greenways and Townshipowned open spaces as Middletown 'Preserves' as a tool to create physical connections between neighborhoods and inspire residents to understand and take responsibility as stewards for natural spaces in their neighborhoods.


Middletown manages more than 800 acres of open space land throughout the Township, yet the public opinion survey and comments received throughout the process of developing this CPROSGT reveal that few Middletown residents are aware of these open spaces. By rebranding and publicizing these spaces as Middletown "Preserves", the Township can increase the profile of these spaces and encourage residents to think of these areas as valuable and worthy of stewardship, rather than as undeveloped and uncared-for leftover parcels.

Open spaces exist in many parts of the Township – with four existing open space areas that are particularly easy to identify, based on their geography and these could be easily branded as "preserves". These four open spaces are:

- Neshaminy Creek Preserve, including lands south and east of Core Creek Park
- Saba Wetlands Preserve, including lands located between the I-295 Corridor and Styer Orchard
- Idlewood Preserve, including lands along Neshaminy Creek south of Brownsville Road
- Mill Creek and Queen Anne Preserve, including lands in Levittown along Mill Creek and Queen Anne Creek



These preserves include the three Township greenways: Neshaminy Creek, Mill Creek, and Queen Anne Creek. All three represent prime opportunities to expand the Township trail network. The existing trail in the Neshaminy Creek Preserve would benefit from additional sidewalk connections. Trails within the Mill Creek and Queen Anne Greenways are proposed in the MIP; additional concept plans for these specific greenway trails are shown below. For additional greenway trails information, see Opportunity 2.6 above.






Fig. 3.6 Mill Creek Greenway Trail Concept

Opportunity 4.7 Protect / restore riparian corridors for the irreplaceable value of their green infrastructure benefits

- Protect / restore riparian corridors for the irreplaceable value of their green infrastructure benefits
- Prioritize neighborhood flood management practices in adjacent park and greenway sites.

Benefits of healthy riparian corridors include water quality and stormwater management, both of which are issues in Middletown Township that cannot be overstated. Several riparian corridors in the Township are fairly healthy, such as the Neshaminy Creek Greenway and significant portions of the Mill Creek Greenway, however others, including the Queen Anne Creek Greenway, are heavily degraded. The Township can work in partnerships to protect existing healthy riparian corridors and restore degraded riparian corridors.

One measure that would be particularly beneficial for these riparian corridors is the cessation of mowing to the water's edge. This practice increases bank erosion and reduces the water quality benefits of the riparian buffer. As noted above, many of the Township's greenways provide healthy riparian buffers, but additional reduction of mowing would be beneficial.

Members of the public have revealed mixed feelings about riparian corridors during the public engagement for this report. Though some recognize the invaluable ecosystem services these habitats provide. Others feel that a naturalized riparian corridor appears unsightly and overgrown, taking away from the experience of the waterways they surround. Additional education is needed about the benefits of riparian corridors to ensure the longterm stewardship of these ecosystems.

Education should focus on the importance of removing invasive species, the benefits of maintaining tree coverage for shade and water temperature control, and the dangers of mowing near stream edges.

Opportunity 4.8 Partner with education and conservation organizations to teach local youth and adults

 Partner with education and conservation organizations to teach local youth and adults about habitat naturalization, soil, flora, fauna and neighborhood pride and stewardship of these existing natural resources.

Environmental education allows people to access and appreciate the natural systems around them in new ways, whether though observing birds at a birdfeeder or discovering the diversity of plants introduced in a naturalized habitat area. This knowledge encourages pride and stewardship of existing natural resources and open spaces. The Township can explore partnering with local and regional education and conservation organizations to provide/increase environmental education programming for Middletown residents, both youth and adults.

The Heritage Conservancy has expressed interest in expanding environmental education programming at Styer Orchard and has worked with the Township to build pavilions that can be used as outdoor classrooms at the facility. The Township could use this type of partnership as a model to provide environmental programming at other locations throughout the open space system. Potential partners include:

- Bucks County Conservation District
- · Bucks County Audubon Society
- Bowman's Hill Wildflower Preserve

The Township has partnered with these organizations to provide indoor, seminarstyle classes, but has not yet expanded these offerings to include on-site programming.

Vision 5: Efficient and sustainable Parks & Recreation management, maintenance, and administration

Middletown Township will continue its mission to deliver excellent park and recreation experiences to the community who take pride in their neighborhoods and history.


Goals

- Update record-keeping systems and agreement processes
- Refine contractor procurement processes / requirements
- Formalize the training of P&R staff and consciously build an open informationsharing culture

Overview

Parks are often the primary venue for residents to interact with their municipality, forming important bonds with neighbors. Vibrant parks and open spaces require diligent and strategic planning for the infrastructure to endure resiliently and age gracefully into the future.

Park stewardship extends far beyond maintenance and upkeep. Planning for successful park spaces requires technical and administrative diligence, master planning, programming integration, and dedication to cost-effective practices.

Opportunity 5.1 Address turf field management issues

 Address turf field management issues (including field rest periods) with sports associations and clearly identify what field management issues fall on Township or user.

Grass field turf management is an ongoing challenge in communities like Middletown Township, where fields are in high demand and are used nearly year-round. Through formal agreements and permits with the various athletic

associations, field management needs include a clearly-identified list of tasks and who is responsible for each. Partner agreements should be reviewed regularly by Township staff (P&R and PW), with input from the users - and revised accordingly. A transparent approach to field management enables all stakeholders to plan and budget appropriately.

Opportunity 5.2 Systematically transfer institutional knowledge of Parks and Recreation procedures to the next generations

- Systematically "transfer" institutional knowledge of P&R procedures to the next generations of MT P&R staff and Public Works maintenance staff.
- Create a detailed job responsibility list for full-time and permanent part-time positions.
- Continue annual (at minimum) staff evaluations.

The MT Public Works staff is a dedicated and knowledgeable group of individuals who have effectively managed the Township park system for decades. To maintain that high level of services as seasoned staff retire and new staff are hired, it is important that the institutional knowledge and processes of those leaving is documented – so this wealth of information is not lost during staff transitions.

The Township can develop a Parks Maintenance Manual, so that all daily, weekly, monthly, and annual maintenance activities are memorialized. This document will serve as tally of tasks for current staff, and as a roadmap to orient and train new staff. The Parks & Recreation Director and the Public Works Director should collaborate in the development of this document - in coordination with the labor staff who possess important historical, sitespecific knowledge.

An alternative to developing the document with in-house staff, is the option to secure a RecTAP or DCNR Peer grant to aid in its development. The Parks Maintenance Manual should be reviewed and updated annually.

Additionally, any questionable park boundaries should be visibly delineated with markers so new and existing staff can quickly determine where Township property ends and private property begins. This will ensure more efficient maintenance operations and provide quick resolution to neighbor encroachment issues.

Opportunity 5.3 Re-establish a dedicated, parks-focused maintenance group

 Re-establish a dedicated, parks-focused maintenance group within the Public Works staff hierarchy.

A recent reassignment of all parks maintenance staff to the Public Works Department, is intended to ensure that park projects are given an appropriate level of attention. A Public Works Foreman may be considered to oversee park capital and maintenance operations. This internal staff dedication can be formalized, including renaming a specific Foreman position to specify oversight of park system and parks maintenance staff. Additionally, a policy for the delegation of park maintenance responsibilities should be agreed upon between the Parks & Recreation Director and the Public Works Director - to avoid labor staff receiving directions from multiple department heads and to ensure efficient operations.

As part of this re-establishment, all mowing operations could be audited. This audit should look at how often areas are being mowed (especially during drought-like conditions) and how the public is using the areas that are being mowed. There may be opportunities to reduce mowing frequency or to eliminate mowing an area altogether and naturalizing it. Prior to any change in mowing habits, all staff (including frontline administrative staff), adjacent park neighbors, the general public, and elected officials should be made aware of what operations are changing and why. This communication is imperative to a successful change in park maintenance.

The labor staff working in the parks currently focuses on important traditional park maintenance tasks such as mowing, playground inspections, park litter cleanup, and upkeep of existing active park amenities. These tasks should continue

with consideration for how some of those tasks could be altered to reduce the amount of time it takes to complete them.

With the available time created by more efficiently completing current tasks, staff could delve into expanding natural resource management within the park system. Focus could be on replacing nonnative vegetation with native vegetation, removal of non-native plants in passive areas, planting new native trees to grow the community's canopy, and naturalizing currently manicured areas. There are environmental and economic benefits to shifting the focus to these park management techniques.

This new approach may require developing natural resource expertise amongst the existing staff through training and certifications, soliciting contractors to assist with some of the work, and/or creating a part-time or full-time natural resource position within the Public Works staff. Depending on an individual's expertise, their time could be split between supervising natural resource management implementation by staff and organizing volunteers as well as working with programming staff to expand environmental-based recreation programs.

Opportunity 5.4 Establish park maintenance data collection and accountability protocols

 Develop / agree to set formulas for budgeting for the Public Works Department in park maintenance.

With park maintenance expenses being assessed to the Parks & Recreation Department, but Public Works Department supervising and directing staff to conduct park maintenance, it is imperative that the Parks & Recreation Director has the ability to access and measure the amount of work being completed in the parks by Public Works staff.

The following data should be provided to the Parks & Recreation Director as part of a monthly report:

- Mow reports which provide the gross staff hours dedicated to moving parks and open space and which were mowed.
- · Reporting of gross staff hours dedicated to trash collection in the parks.
- Reporting of gross staff hours dedicated to park maintenance (not mowing or trash collection).
- List of repairs and/or special projects completed in the parks.

This monthly reporting is important information so that the Parks & Recreation Director can advocate for adjusting staffing and/or resources based on what is or is not able to be completed in the parks.

Opportunity 5.5 Create naturalization strategies for specific parks

- Evaluate existing park stormwater management controls.
- Use the PA DEP Best Management Practices updated guidelines for retrofitting BMPs using natural system approaches.
- Provide public works staff with training in horticultural practices to maintain naturalized areas.

Strong public support was given during this study for improving existing park amenities. Residents and park users noted that, while families congregate for organized youth sports, they would also enjoy places to walk and sit quietly within beautiful, peaceful, and natural settings; many participants expressed the desire for shade. Naturalization techniques can include:

- Conversion of lawns into meadows
- Vegetative restoration of stream banks within parks
- Asphalt removal in parking areas for vegetated islands with trees
- · Naturalized trails and loops that encompass ecologically restored areas within parks for additional trail opportunities.

To successfully create naturalization in the parks, a plan can be developed and adopted - and staff "buy-in" is important to making this happen. A "naturalization plan could be developed by a consultant working with the P&R staff. EAC and interested residents - and funded by Township and/or grant funds – with the understanding that the plan will be implemented by municipal staff.

Both Parks & Recreation and Public Works staff must concur with basic decisions like where and when tree plantings are being completed, and mowing regimens for riparian buffers. All staff must be clear A stormwater basin in Middletown Community Park

on maintenance expectations to increase the likelihood of plant survival. Trees planted in naturalized areas need to be maintained and clearly marked so they are not accidentally mowed over - with proper spacing so mowers can periodically maintain the areas. Professional advice should guide specific planting plans for each park area, based on factors such as site conditions and desired plant heights, as well as prescribed maintenance plans.

Although strong public support was demonstrated for some naturalization strategies, some of the public expressed concern that natural areas within parks look unkempt and inhibit access to waterways. Working with the public to identify potential naturalization areas will increase public buy-in and improve future public stewardship of these areas, but additional education is also needed. The Township may consider interpretive signage in restored areas to educate people.



Opportunity 5.6 Incentivize staff to obtain certifications and training

• Incentivize staff to obtain certifications and training in areas of need or future focus.

To avoid a decline in the level of service provided by staff performing maintenance in the parks and expand what maintenance can be completed in-house, current staff and/or new staff should be encouraged to obtain certifications and participate in appropriate training. These certifications could include:

- Certified Playground Safety Inspector
- Pennsylvania Pesticide Applicator with Categories 7 (Lawn and Turf), 10 (Right-

- of-way and Weeds), 23 (Park or School Pest Control), and 24 (Swimming Pool)
- PHS Tree Tenders training

To incentivize staff to pursue these certifications and trainings, the Township can consider providing one-time or annual financial bonuses to staff who obtain, utilize, and maintain the specialized skills earned in addition to celebrating the commitment to continued vocational education.

Opportunity 5.7 Explore partnering with Bucks County P&R for potential additional programming

As home to five (5) Bucks County Parks and the Parks and Recreation Headquarters, Middletown has a well-established relationship with the Bucks County Parks and Recreation Department. The Township can review Bucks County-owned park/open space parcels located within Middletown to determine sites where partnering with the County for maintenance and programming could benefit both parties. Any such partnership should consider the current Public Works responsibilities of the Township to ensure that maintenance of Middletown Parks & Rec facilities is not affected.

Two sites for potential partnership are the Chickenfoot Park and Queen Anne Park ballfields – which, with improved maintenance, could provide space for additional programming for the Township. This additional programming space would be particularly useful if Twin Oaks Park is renovated to allow for the reorientation of the existing ballfields (see Opportunity 1.3).

These parks may also be able to provide additional stormwater management capacity. Both parks are situated in the Queen Anne watershed, which also contains Twin Oaks Park. The large natural areas, particularly at Queen Anne Park, could be enhanced to increase stormwater retention capacity and potentially reduce the stormwater retention demand at Twin Oaks Park. This work is a prime example of "piggybacking" a recreational project with other municipal infrastructure improvement projects. Potential funding partners would include DCNR and DCED.

Opportunity 5.8 Establish an Implementation Committee to oversee implementation of this plan

This plan is intended to serve as a guide for the Parks & Recreation Department over the next fifteen (15) years. The Township may consider creating an Implementation Committee to oversee the implementation of opportunities over the long term and provide annual updates for elected officials, staff, and the public. This committee could include members of the Steering Committee for this plan, as well as members of the Township's Parks and Recreation Board and EAC.

The Implementation Committee would work with Parks & Recreation Department and other Township staff to advise on priority opportunities described in this plan and ensure they align with funding opportunities, track progress towards goals, and collaborate with municipal partners to update the opportunities based on on-going feedback. Establishing this committee can provide the Township with a mechanism to ensure that the goals and opportunities contained in the plan remain priorities for the Township through any staff and leadership transitions and provide an accountability mechanism for the public.

Vision 6: Township policy / ordinances support recreation needs with funding strategies that achieve multi-functional infrastructure improvements

Middletown Township seeks to balance development with quality-of-life needs and the modernization of infrastructure that can serve multiple needs: transportation, ecological restoration, stormwater management, and recreation.

Goals

- · Employ modern remedies to transportation barriers that limit public access to recreation, using strategic, consistent incremental phases of planning, funding, and engineering.
- Review Township policy and ordinances to support the recreational and open space needs of the community.
- · Coordinate funding strategies between finance, planning, parks & recreation, and public works departments to maximize the potential to capitalize and maintain park and open space improvements.

Overview

As noted in Vision 5, vibrant parks and open spaces require diligent and strategic planning for the infrastructure to endure beautifully into the future. This infrastructure planning depends on a strong foundation of Township policy and ordinances that provide consistent funding and clear goals for the future.

Opportunity 6.1 Include resources for park access improvements in annual Township budgets

 Include resources for park access improvements in annual Township budgets to serve as "seed" funds to leverage partner funding that dovetails with integrated projects, including transportation, stormwater management, ecological restoration, streambank protection, flooding prevention/resiliency, and public safety.

Safe access to parks is a key priority of the Middletown Comprehensive Plan, the Middletown Multimodal Improvement Plan (MIP), and this CPROSGT report. In addition, implementation of the MIP was identified as the number one priority for Middletown Parks over the next three to five years in the public opinion survey.

Park access improvements will only rarely be standalone projects; more frequently, they will be one element of larger transportation, stormwater management, public safety, or other infrastructure projects. Implementation of park access improvement projects will likely require funding from multiple sources. The Township can include resources for park access improvements in its annual budget each year to serve as "seed" funds to leverage funding from partners. This demonstrated commitment to park access and improvements within the right-of-way will help give funders confidence in the Township's desire to create a connected and accessible community.

Opportunity 6.2 Aggressively pursue modern roadway improvements along Woodbourne Road at the SEPTA train station

 Aggressively pursue modern roadway improvements along Woodbourne Road at the SEPTA train station, including all multimodal (pedestrian and bicycle) transportation improvements needed to enable residents in surrounding Middletown neighborhoods to reach parks, open spaces, schools and commercial destinations in both directions without motor vehicles.

Woodbourne Road is a major north-south connector through Middletown Township, linking residential neighborhoods in the northern and southern halves of the Township to the Woodbourne SEPTA Station and commercial areas on Business Route 1. It also serves as a major recreation corridor, anchored by Core Creek Park to the north and by Queen Anne Park and the Queen Anne Creek Greenway to the south, and providing access to Chickenfoot and Twin Oaks Parks and Styer Orchard.

Pedestrian and bicycle improvements on Woodbourne Road were a focus of the MIP. Recommended improvements include a side path network, crosswalks and signal improvements, sidewalks, and a multimodal tunnel under the CSX rail bridge. These improvements will provide a significant connection to and expansion of the recreation network within the Township.

The most significant obstacle to pedestrian and bicycle connections along the Woodbourne Road Recreation Corridor is the CSX rail bridge, located just north of the Woodbourne SEPTA Station. Tackling this obstacle will require work with multiple partners and significant investment from the Township. The Woodbourne multimodal

tunnel was identified by residents as a high-priority project repeatedly during the public engagement process for this report and the Township should aggressively pursue it along with other, more easily accomplished improvements along the Woodbourne Road Recreation Corridor.

Opportunity 6.3 Consider modifications to the Zoning Ordinance and the SALDO

Appendix Section 12 provides recommended formulas for open space and fee-in-lieu of open space requirements. These formulas are commonly used to set requirements for open space ratios in other communities in the region. The Middletown Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SALDO) explicitly provides the option to pay a fee-in-lieu of open space or recreation areas, but does not provide the same option for other required improvements, such as sidewalks.

A general summary of opportunities related to MT Zoning and SALDO is given below:

Chapter 440-Subdivision & Land Development Ordinances (SALDO)-Design Standards- Recreation areas and community facilities

- Consider an increase in the required recreation space and community facilities.
- Consider allowing a fee-in-lieu of required open space with an established formula for calculating the fee.
- Consider allowing a fee-in-lieu of required sidewalks with an established formula for calculating the fee.

Chapter 500 Zoning

- Consider an increase in the required open space.
- Consider allowing a fee-in-lieu of required open space with an established formula for calculating the fee.

Opportunity 6.4 Create a Township Official Map and add priority connections

As permitted by the PA Municipal Planning Code, the Official Map is a combined map and ordinance designed to implement the goals and community vision set forth in the Comprehensive Plan.

The Official Map shows the locations of planned future public lands and facilities such as transportation, recreational parks and trails, and open space.


The Official Map expresses a municipality's interest in acquiring these lands for public purposes at some future time. The Official Map process does not mandate any action by the Township. However, if a parcel designated as future open space is included on a land development or subdivision application, it gives the Township an opportunity to discuss preserving at least part of the parcel as open space, in addition to whatever provisions may exist in the zoning ordinance for open space preservation or providing residents with public trails.

Considerations for land to identify as future open space include, but are not limited to:

- Potential reversion to floodplain
- Access to recreation and/or natural resources (trail, pathways)
- Stormwater management BMPs at small neighborhood scale
- Small neighborhood pocket parks
- · Community garden plots.

In addition, the Township can identify parcels it maintains that do not have the potential to offer open space/recreation benefits and explore divesting itself of these properties and using the income to fund recreation improvements elsewhere. Several such properties are holdovers from when the Township operated and the water and sewer systems


Opportunity 6.5 Diversify parks funding sources

- Reconnect with the Middletown Community Foundation.
- Work with the Public Works Department on capital park projects.
- Consider establishing a "Legacy Gifts" program

The Parks & Recreation Department previously had regular access to funds provided by the Middletown Community Foundation. Over time, funds have become less and less available to the Department. The Parks & Recreation Director and Assistant Director can reestablish a channel to help redirect some of the funds to the Department to offset on-going expenses for activities and efforts that align with the Foundation's mission. Alternatively, if funds are no longer accessible from the Foundation, the Department can consider establishing a non-profit Friends of Middletown Parks group to assist with the offsetting of operating and capital expenses.

The Friends group might provide a vehicle for donations from individuals interested in giving to Middletown's parks. There is currently no mechanism for individuals to make monetary donations to Middletown Township Parks & Recreation. To accommodate the Township's aging population, the Friends group could establish a "Legacy Gift" program to accept donations from estates, allowing interested parties to memorialize their enjoyment of Middletown Parks.

In an effort to be inclusive and ensure that budget and scope align with expected maintenance, the Parks & Recreation Director and the Public Works Director can develop priority capital park projects together. At a minimum, the Public Works Director should have an opportunity to review Parks and Recreation project plans and construction documents prior to the solicitation of bids.





4.1 MAKING IMPROVEMENTS IN PHASES WITH PARTNERS

Most public projects are funded and built in phases, and usually with multiple partners.

New park development, trails, greenways (and greenway extensions,) and preserves are projects that are almost always funded and built through partnerships. The Neshaminy Creek Greenway represents one such regional vision that forms the foundation of desired connections for its surrounding neighbors.

It will be essential for the Middletown Township Parks & Recreation Department to build strategic partnerships that match the types of projects with those mission-aligned funding partners. More than one project may be advanced simultaneously, depending on project types, funding sources available during specific periods, and the sources of matching funds that the Township can raise internally or by leveraging partners.

4.2 RECREATION IS A COMMON **ELEMENT WITHIN MANY PUBLIC PROJECTS**


Recreation is a common element within many Public Projects.

Straightforward "recreation" improvements within discrete park sites (e.g. playground replacements, internal park pathways, naturalization efforts) may be conceived of and treated as standalone public projects. However, recreation elements are very often integral with at least three (3) other generalized types of public projects, including:

- **Environmental Projects**
- Civic Projects
- Transportation Projects

Environmental Projects

Projects that address significant improvements to natural areas (including permanent preservation through acquisition and easements) include: ecological habitat management of existing park sites and open spaces; adding stormwater management practices that align with Middletown's Pollutant Reduction Plan; converting mowed areas to meadows; planting new canopy trees; managing existing woodlands; riparian buffers through Middletown Township stream corridors; habitat sustainability; and wetland restorations on public sites.



Civic Projects

Projects within Middletown that seek to create a sustainable community identified in the 2020 Comprehensive Plan include welcoming Township gateways, public spaces, and stormwater management improvements.

Transportation Projects

The improvements identified in the MT Multimodal Improvement Plan represent transportation improvements. The trail improvements contained in the MIP that provide inter-connections to neighborhoods and parks may be conceived of as transportation projects - allowing safe transit in the pedestrian, cycle and public transit modes of transportation. An important metric for discerning a "transportation" trail is a clear travel route between destinations.

Many trails deliver facilities that serve both transportation and recreation functions. A loop trail within a Middletown park, for example, is not considered a "transportation" improvement and would not qualify for transportation partnership funding. Sidewalks, paths, crosswalks - especially along routes to schools, parks, and transit - are transportation improvements that may also qualify for a percentage of recreation improvement funding – depending on what recreation purposes are served or what amenities are created as part of the project.

4.3 PARTNERS

Partnerships are possible with various local, county, regional, state, and federal agencies, as well as with for-profit and non-profit businesses.

In some cases, Middletown may be able to match funds from one partner to meet the requirements of another – a strategy that, when possible, helps stretch finite local dollars further.

Forming a clear understanding of which type of project is to be advanced will help greatly toward defining which funding formula options are realistic to develop into matching partnership applications that can advance a clearly achievable phase of a specific priority project.

A close review of the potential partner funding programs that are described below in this chapter will identify which partners will fund what types of projects – as well as what phases of projects they will fund, such as planning, design/engineering, and/or construction.

Middletown has a strong record of securing project funding from multiple sources for various planning and implementation projects. The consultant team remains ready to assist and answer questions from the community about funding strategies.

4.4 PRIORITIZING PROJECTS

Decisions about the priority of the recommendations made in Chapter 4 are ultimately the responsibility of the Township leadership. As experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic, changes to the political and economic landscape can occur quickly and municipal management must always adjust to changing conditions. However, there are several criteria below that will guide the effort of prioritization.

What type of project is it?

- Recreation ONLY
- Transportation
- Civic
- Environmental

What phase of the project is needed?

- Planning
- Technical studies (i.e. parking studies, cost estimates, soil testing)
- Design and permitting
- Construction



4.5 FUNDING SOURCES

4.5.1 Federal Sources

US Department of Transportation (DOT) (Bipartisan Infrastructure Law)



Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program (RCP)

In 2022, \$1 billion was announced to be available over 5 years as planning and capital construction grants to fund projects that restore community connectivity by retrofitting, removing, or mitigating barriers imposed by transportation infrastructure, including roads, highways, and rail lines, among others. Applications from economically disadvantaged communities are given priority and state DOTs must provide them with technical assistance through the Reconnecting Communities Institute. This source of funding is at risk due to policies of the Trump administration.

Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)

Starting in 2022, \$5 billion in funding is available over 5 years for planning and implementation projects that improve roadway safety by preventing deaths and serious injuries. Though Middletown has not developed an Action Plan as defined by DOT, the DVRPC is currently developing a regional Vision Zero Plan which will satisfy the requirements of a DOT Action Plan. Once this plan is finalized, Middletown may be able to apply for funding through the SS4A program, so long as the plan is focused in part on the roadway network

within Middletown. This source of funding is at risk due to policies of the Trump administration.

National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF)



Delaware Watershed Conservation Fund (DWCF)

The Delaware Watershed Conservation Fund was launched in 2018 to conserve and restore natural areas, corridors, and waterways on public and private lands that support native fish, wildlife, and plants, and to contribute to the vitality of the communities in the Delaware River watershed. Priority strategies for on-theground implementation include sustaining and enhancing fish and wildlife habitat: improving and maintaining water quality for fish, wildlife, and people; sustaining and enhancing water management to benefit fish and wildlife; and improving outdoor recreational opportunities within the Delaware River watershed. This source of funding is at risk due to policies of the Trump administration.

Delaware River Restoration Fund

The Delaware River Restoration Fund was launched in late 2013 to help community-based nonprofits and government agencies work together to clean up and restore polluted waters and improve habitat for target species, including eastern brook trout and river herring, in the Delaware River Watershed.

The Fund awards at least \$2 million per year in competitive grants, geographically focused on three priority strategies: (1) stewardship of working lands; (2) restoration of wetlands, floodplains and stream corridors; and (3) promoting the adoption of green infrastructure in urban/suburban landscapes.

Since 2014, the Delaware River
Restoration Fund has awarded 90 grants
totaling roughly \$14.7 million. These
investments leveraged more than \$23.36
million in grantee matching funds to
fund agriculture conservation, green
stormwater infrastructure and innovative
projects to improve the water quality of
the Delaware River. To date, the fund has
implemented more than 23,500 acres of
best management practices to improve
water quality and restored more than 190
acres of wetlands and 60 miles of riparian
habitat.

The Delaware River Restoration Fund is administered by NFWF in cooperation with the Delaware River Watershed Initiative, with major funding from the William Penn Foundation. This source of funding is at risk due to policies of the Trump administration.

4.5.2 State Sources

PA Department of Community and Economic Development (PA DCED), Commonwealth Financing Agency (CFA)



Greenways, Trails and Recreation Program (GTRP)

The Greenways, Trails, and Recreation Program (GTRP) provides funding for: constructing public park and recreation area projects, greenway and trail projects, and river or creek conservation projects. The program requires a 15% local cash match of the total project cost and applicant requests for DCED share of

funding must not exceed \$250,000. Annual applications to DCED are typically due in late May. More information can be found at:

Multimodal Transportation Fund (MTF)

The DCED Multimodal Transportation Fund (MTF) is administered through the PA Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) and provides grants to encourage economic development by ensuring that a safe and reliable multimodal transportation system is available to the residents of the Commonwealth. Funds may be used for preliminary engineering tasks, as well as development, rehabilitation, and enhancement of transportation assets within existing communities such as streetscape, lighting, sidewalk enhancement, pedestrian safety, connectivity of transportation assets, and transit-oriented development.

MTF grants are available for projects with a total cost of \$100,000 or more, and grants shall not exceed \$3,000,000 for any project. The CFA will consider grant requests over \$3,000,000 for projects that will significantly impact the CFA's goal to leverage private investment and create jobs in the Commonwealth. Financial assistance under the Multimodal Transportation Fund shall be matched by local funding in an amount not less than 30% of the nonfederal share of the project costs.

PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR)



Community Conservation Partnership Program (C2P2)

The Community Recreation and Conservation Program through the PA DCNR Community Conservation Partnership Program (C2P2) provides funding to municipalities and authorized non-profit organizations for recreation, park, trail and conservation projects. These grants may fund planning for feasibility studies, trail studies, conservation plans, master site development plans, and comprehensive recreation park and open space and greenway plans. The program also provides funding for land acquisition for active or passive parks, trails and conservation purposes, and construction and rehabilitation of parks, trails, and recreation facilities. Most of these projects require a 50% match, which can include a combination of cash and/or non-cash values. Grant applications for the C2P2 program are accepted annually—usually in April. Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF)

The Land and Water Conservation
Fund (LWCF) State Assistance Program,
established in 1965, is a federal source
of funding distributed to all states by the
U.S. Department of the Interior's National
Park Service. The program provides
matching grants for the acquisition and
development of public outdoor recreation
areas and facilities. DCNR administers
the LWCF Program for Pennsylvania. More

PennDOT



Transportation Alternatives (TA) Set-Aside Program

PennDOT administers the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Transportation Alternatives - TA Set-Aside Program under the Surface Transportation Program (STP) for community-based "nontraditional" projects that are designed to strengthen the cultural, aesthetic, and environmental aspects of the nation's intermodal transportation system. The program seeks to provide funding for the construction of on-road and off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other non-motorized forms of transportation. Non-motorized forms of transportation include sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian and bicycle signals, traffic calming techniques, lighting and other safetyrelated infrastructure, and transportation projects to achieve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. There is a minimum award of \$50,000 for construction projects and a maximum award of \$1,500,000, although higher awards can be justified for "exceptional" projects. No applicant match is required, but all engineering and environmental clearances must be completed with non-FHWA funds to enable the TA funds to be used for construction and construction inspections. This source of funding is at risk due to policies of the Trump administration.

Safe Routes to Schools (SRTS)

The SRTS program is administered by PennDOT through the federal TA Set-Aside program. SRTS is a national and international movement to create safe, convenient, and healthy opportunities for children to walk and bicycle to school. By getting more children to walk and bicycle to school, communities are helping children be healthier, reducing fuel consumption,

alleviating traffic congestion, and improving air quality. SRTS programs are built on collaborative partnerships among many stakeholders, including educators, parents, students, elected officials, engineers, city planners, business and community leaders, health officials, and bicycle and pedestrian advocates. Eligible activities include new or reconstructed sidewalks or pathways, pedestrian and bicycle signs or signals, transportation projects that achieve ADA compliance, such as curb ramps, bike parking facilities or bus bike racks, shared use paths, side paths, trails that serve a transportation purpose, crossing improvements, and traffic realignments, road diets, or intersection changes. This source of funding is at risk due to policies of the Trump administration.

Multimodal Transportation Fund (MTF)

PennDOT administers Federal Highway Administration funds as a state Multimodal Transportation Fund program to provide grants that ensure that a safe and reliable system of transportation is available directly to the communities and residents of the Commonwealth. The program is intended to provide financial assistance to municipalities, councils of governments, businesses, economic development organizations, public transportation agencies, rail freight, passenger rail, and ports to improve transportation assets that enhance communities, pedestrian safety, and transit revitalization. Grants are available for projects with a total cost of \$100,000 or more. Grants normally do not exceed \$3,000,000 for any project. The PennDOT Office of Multimodal Transportation will consider grant requests over \$3,000,000 for projects that will significantly impact PennDOT's goal to leverage private investment and create jobs in the Commonwealth. Financial assistance under the Multimodal Transportation Fund shall be matched by local funding in an amount not less than 30% of the amount awarded. These federal funds cannot be matched by other federal funding.

Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP)



DEP Growing Greener Watershed Protection Program

DEP funds local projects through the state Growing Greener Environment Stewardship Funds Program. Applications should be targeted toward clean-up of non-point source pollution. The grant will fund local watershed-based conservation projects with average awards totaling \$150,000 and requires a 15% match from a non-DEP fund source. Outdoor recreation facilities such as gazebos, pavilions, decks, paths, trails, and bridges are not eligible for funding under this program.

DEP Non-Point Source Implementation Programs Grant

Provides funding assistance for projects aimed at implementing Pennsylvania's Non-point Source Management Program. Targeted projects include control of urban runoff, and natural channel design/stream bank stabilization projects. The grant will fund local projects with the average award being \$200,000. No matching funds are required, but any matching funds provided will improve the competitiveness of the application.

4.5.3 Regional Sources

Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC)



Regional Trails Program

The DVRPC provides planning assistance and financial support for development of the Circuit, the Philadelphia region's multiuse trail network, through its Regional Trails Program. Technical assistance is available for planning and feasibility of specific trail segments. Guidance is also available for pursuing outside trail funding. 4.5.4 Other Funding Sources

Circuit Trails

The William Penn Foundation is the one of largest private foundations in Pennsylvania, providing over \$100,000,000 in grant funding to nonprofit and municipal organizations in the Greater Philadelphia region annually in recent years. The Circuit Trails Program provides funding for trail stewardship and maintenance aimed at growing community support for specific additional trails and programs, including guided walks, that potentially advance a

specific trail or trail section, among other projects. Specific project funding guidelines may change each year. Additional information can be found at: https:// williampennfoundation.org/objective/ circuit-trails

4.6 ORDER OF **MAGNITUDE COST - BY** PROJECT TYPE

Opportunities described in the previous chapter represent projects of various scales - small, large, and many that fall somewhere in-between. The MT Parks & Recreation Department will be able to assist with Township decisions on the plan recommendations by reviewing the levels of staff and costs required to implement priorities. For example, priorities can be evaluated by cost and level of personnel needed for each level (as shown below):

- LOW cost: Approximately <\$250,000: likely completed with P&R staff, and perhaps other Township staff - who can accomplish the task as part of their regular duties. Estimated time frame: 0-5 Years.
- MEDIUM cost: Approximately \$250K to \$1 million: Township budget has allowance for this type of task; additional contractors may be required; Township oversight of the project can be handled with existing staff. Estimated time frame: 0-10 Years.
- HIGH cost: Approximately > \$ 1 million: This type of priority may represent more than a 'recreation ONLY' project type and will likely require multiple phases. Combinations of municipal capital and grant funding are usually required for this type of project implementation. Estimated time frame: 0-15 Years

Presentation:

William Collins (WC), Anita Nardone (AN), and Toby Levin (TL) led the presentation and facilitated the agenda which included:

1. Introductions

• AN and WC introduced the SC team; attendees introduced themselves.

2. Committee Work

• AN reviewed the dates for the remaining three (3) committee meetings--highlighting the need for committee participation in the public participation process and the need for specific information about the community from local 'eyes' and 'ears.'

3. 'Mission Statement' Draft

- AN noted the DCNR requirement for the grant-funded work that a mission statement be developed for the study work that will give the agency (the MT P&R Dept.) defined goals and objectives.
- AN noted that part of this study scope will be to evaluate the goals established in the previous 2005 Millenium Plan for MT P&R.
- Samples were provided; committee will be prompted throughout the study to refine this.

4. Planning Relationships

- AN led the committee through the 'why' of planning; the importance of reviewing key plannings efforts for MT (Climate Action, 2020 Comp. Plan, MT Multimodal Improvement Plan, current Bucks County CROSP---underway, etc.) as well as past specific P&R master plans, regional ecological and environmental reports.
- AN noted important definitions that will guide the study effort: open space, conservation, stewardship, preservation.

5. Project Schedule

AN and PG noted that---based on the strong desire by MT to kick off the public opinion survey prior to the first Public Meeting to assist in generating interest/participation ---SC proposes moving PM#1 from November 14th to the date for the proposed PM#2 of January 23, 2025. PM#2 is tentatively moved to March 27, 2025. Committee will be notified when this date change is confirmed. A FINAL schedule will be transmitted. NOTE: There are no proposed changes to the committee meeting schedule.

6. Project Scope

AN reviewed the specific items that will be incorporated into the final plan. The
committee was familiar with them as they were part of the proposal review,
interview and selection.

7. Open Space & Recreation Resources

- TL guided through the committee on an overview of each of the twenty-four (24) recreational resources (parks) and four (4) preserved lands that will be incorporated into this study.
- Five (5) listed parks/resources are Bucks County owned
- TL noted existing components of the areas as well as opportunities for recreational and ecological improvements.

8. Analysis: Initial Mapping

• TL showed examples of the type of analyses that the study will produce (sidewalks, trails, wetlands) and noted examples of other types of analysis that the Committee will see (soils, hydrology, open space, etc.)

9. Key Person Interviews & Public Opinion Survey

- PG and AN led the committee through the listing of KPIs from the 2005 Millenium Plan to develop a list for the 15 scoped KPIs for this project.
- The following listing represents the discussion:
 - a. Neshaminy School District, include transportation manager if possible
 - b. Styer Farm-staff
 - c. Heritage Conservancy (Styer Farm)
 - d. MT Staff (including MT consultants; this may be two meetings)
 - e. Emergency Responders (Police, Fire, EMT)
 - f. Middletown Community Foundation
 - g. Buck County-P&R*
 - h. Bucks County Planning Commission*
 - i. Bucks County-Office of Aging
 - j. MT Human Relations Commission (serving disabled residents)
 - k. Woods Services
 - I. Bucks County Intermediate Unit
 - m. Bucks County Conservation District
 - n. Environmental Advisory Council representatives
 - o. Neighboring Boroughs
 - p. Consider meeting with Neshaminy Mall representative(s) after goals of report have been established

*Bucks County groups may be combined based on availability, etc.

• Focus Group: Sports organizations

- a. PG noted that there is an annual meeting in February of all sports organizations with the Township. This may be good timing within the schedule to conduct this focus group.
- AN and PG led the committee through the printed copy of the draft public opinion survey. AN noted that revisions suggested by PG and PK were already incorporated. Q4, Q10 and Q15 were discussed. Committee and DD offered comments/ suggestions:
 - a. Q4: Remove 'in your favorite' season.
 - b. Q6: PG and committee to review list and send additions; send feedback to PG. E.g. skate park, community garden; volunteering; baseball/softball pickup games
 - c. Q10: Suggest open-ended "What is missing in Middletown Township parks?". Leaving this as an open text box frees us to delete Q 11 and Q12
 - d. Q15: PG noted that it may assist P&R to break down this large list into segments; i.e events, camps, etc. DD noted that MT needs to know participation on some things, not others. For example, camp registrations are known
 - e. AN noted that MT may want to review Q20 and Q21 for specific wording; addition of questions that probe respondents' feelings about capital expenditures to acquire land, etc.
 - f. DD noted the importance of spending time/\$ on advertising QR codes at parking lots; trailheads; lawn signs; importance of keeping it short so that parents can do it on phones while waiting for children.

Brainstorming/Discussion

- 1. Events
 - AN noted that PG and PK had discussed the participation of SC at certain key MT events to promote the survey and the study. Next event: <u>Holiday Party-</u> December 12th
- 2. Maintenance
 - AN asked 'how' the Public Works Department (PW) and P&R handle park maintenance. PK noted that there are nineteen (19) full-time PW staff. The P&R Dept. assumes 20% of the annual budget for PW staff will be allocated to park and trail maintenance.
 - a. <u>Comment:</u> DD noted it would be helpful to get a copy of the Capital Plan or GFOA. PK noted it can be made available. AN noted SC may have it form the MMIP work.
- 3. P&R Goals
 - PG noted a department goal of being CAPRA accredited

- a. DD noted that only Lower Makefield in PA is CAPRA certified; good to outline steps needed, etc.
- 4. Langhorne Athletic Association (LAA) Comments
 - Kevin McGerry noted the following comments:
 - a. LAA gathers data on participants (age, school, etc.) to create projections for participation
 - b. 'Tribal' knowledge: Most knowledge of contracts, practices, etc. within athletic organizations is not recorded, existing only via word-of-mouth
 - c. Efforts should be made to differentiate between athletics-related volunteerism and ecological/stewardship-related volunteerism. Local athletic organizations are all volunteer-staffed and run

1. Simone Collins Landscape Architecture (SC) gave a presentation which included a draft Vision Statement for the CPROSGT plan, preliminary analysis including community and NRPA benchmarking and DVRPC Parks, Trails, and Water Access, proposed improvements

related to park access from the Multimodal Improvement Plan, and Preliminary Public Survey results. The presentation also included an overview of next steps, including the Public Meeting on Thursday, January 23 at 7pm, and the next steering committee meeting on Tuesday, April 1 at 5:30pm.

- 2. A committee member recommended including Open Space as a goal for the CPROSGT Plan.
 - a. The committee member noted that the preservation of and improved access to open space are both included in the goals of the 2020 Middletown Comprehensive Plan.
 - b. Another committee member recommended revising the third goal of the CPROSGT Plan to ensure attention to preservation, maintenance, and sustainability of existing and future open spaces for natural systems to flourish.
 - c. Another committee member asked if ensuring accessible parks included removing economic barriers to access?
 - i. SC responded that economic barriers to parks access <u>could be</u> included as specifically articulated goal for the plan.
- 3. PG noted that the Township has 3 tennis courts and 11 pickleball courts.
 - a. SC noted that these figures will be updated for future benchmarking discussions.
- 4. Committee members recommended mailing out postcards to advertise the Public Opinion Survey.
 - a. The committee also proposed reaching out to schools to market the Public Opinion Survey and obtain more youth and family input.
- 5. WC asked if the township plans to formally adopt the CPROSGT plan or if it would only be accepted by the Board of Supervisors, noting that, if formally adopted, the improvement projects included in the plan could be eligible for funding without an additional master planning process.
 - a. PK and PG indicated that they would discuss potential adoption of the completed plan with Township leadership and the Board of Supervisors.
- 6. The committee also discussed the format for the first public meeting. SC described the breakout discussion format used at public meetings for other planning projects and the committee expressed support for using the format for the first Middletown public meeting.
 - a. A committee member noted that the community will likely mention that mountain biking trails were recently removed by the Neshaminy School District behind Neshaminy High School.

- 1. Simone Collins Landscape Architecture (SC) gave a presentation which included:
 - a. A summary of comments received from both PM1 and PM2 (connectivity priorities; access to natural spaces; specific amenities needed (restrooms emphasized); programming and available recreational spaces and ideas for

- 'generational projects' (amphitheater; pool; splash pads; Neshaminy Creek access)
- b. Summary of KPI meetings held
- c. Summary of 1161 responses received to date from public opinion survey
- d. A review of the five (5) proposed 'visions' (tweaked based on the PM1 and PM2). Request that P&R staff and committee finalize these to set up the draft recommendations.

e. Initial Concepts

- Open Space: Access to and throughout existing spaces and not new open space acquisition; roughly 113 acres of open space in MT outside of parks; re-naming large swaths as 'preserves' encourages appreciation for these areas within neighborhoods; creates 'ownership' and 'stewardship' responsibilities. 'Neshaminy', 'Mill Creek', 'Queen Anne' and 'Langhorne Spring Water' preserves as a start.
- Ped Connections to Parks: Prioritizing the north, west, and southern park communities.
- A basic strategy for park facility improvements (maintaining basic expectations; consistent funding; sustainable fee schedules; successional planning)
- Programming: continue strategic, measured growth; memorialize procedures and processes
- f. What is your 'Generational Project'
 - Committee members were asked the question...!
 - SC re-presented the Woodbourne Pedestrian Tunnel concept prepared for the MMIP---noting that the pedestrian connections of such a large amount of population (e.g the Oxford Valley Mall re-development of multifamily) to the the two major rec destinations (Core Creek; Styers) represented a large rec + transportation project.

2. Discussion of Initial Concepts & Generational Project Ideas

- a. Open Spaces
 - Committee in agreement about the approach to 'open space'; many noting that they know little about the open spaces noted in the analysis
 - Angie N.: It will be important to define 'partners' for the 'preserve' areas noted.
 - Dana: Are there other 'preserves' of note in MT?
 - Dana: Would an 'open space' workshop be an important gathering---to
 put the analysis and options in front of key township officials? The
 connections that the greenways offer from the southern portion of the
 Township to Woodbourne are important.

b. Programming

Committee discussed the PM 2 comment of availability of facilities outside
of league use. PG commented on how the Twp is handling the pickleball
scheduling; communicating when those groups use the courts.

c. Park Facility Improvements

- DD: Commented that the RCO 'Responsible Contractor Ordinance' requirements within MT could possibly hamper the effective efficiency of implementing recommendations. (in MT, for all projects over \$25K, ust meet RCO reg'ts for labor levels, etc. In essence---union requirements)
- DD: MT may want to consider increasing the threshold amount to \$100K-\$125K (Angie supplied project amount noting how even the costs for small projects are increasing quickly)
- Dana + Bernadette: How to get this issue in front of the supervisors.

d. Amphitheater

- PG noted that 2015 survey results recommended an amphitheater at this location
- Comments from public noted desire to model it after the one at the Lower Bucks Government Center

e. Paul Kopera's 'Generational' Projects & Committee Discussion

- 1. Middletown Community Center/ Senior Center: New facility
 - Demolish existing structure; re-imagine; re-purpose site and structure (two levels) to accommodate more programming space
 - PG noted the importance of connections between MCC and the Levittown area
 - The 'barn' at MCP and the MCC have the ability to make money; serve large portions of the population
- 2. Middletown Country Club: 100 acres---better use?
 - MCC is in the last 4 years of its lease from the Township; important for the Township to keep an eye on that.
 - Overall questions: Is this 100 acres better off as a golf club? Or multipurpose park? Or trail with some other park amenities?
 - DD: Reviewed the Upper Dublin transformation of the Twining Valley golf course into naturalized trail/park area.
 - Detailed surveys done prior to vote by Supervisors;
 incorporated revenue-generating options; currently the #1 destination for parks in Upper Dublin
 - o What could work for MT here?

3. Public Pool

- PK: There used to be four (4) pools in Middletown
- DD: Feasibility of a pool should/could be studied by a specialty consultant; outlining revenue generating/management options

f. <u>SC Generational Project—The Woodbourne Pedestrian Tunnel/ Connection to</u> Oxford Valley Mall

- AN reviewed a slide from the MMIP breaking down the sidewalk gaps and key large cost pedestrian tunnels to provide the north-south link in the Township
- Bernadette: Noted that MT was waiting on two rail studies that needed to be completed; AN confirmed that these were underway or just starting as the MMIP was completed.
- WC noted that the Township had initiated some work in closing the sidewalk gaps along Woodbourne through grant applications.
- WC discussed how some key property acquisitions near the Woodbourne tunnel could serve multi-purposes that would support this rec + transportation project.

 - a. A review of the remaining project schedule;
 - b. An overview of the Visions, Goals, and Opportunities included in the draft report.

2. Discussion of Initial Concepts & Generational Project Ideas

- a. Does the report indicate the priorities of each project?
 - i. The report includes information about factors the Township could use to weigh priorities, but specific priorities will need to be determined by the Township. These may shift as community interests shift and as funding opportunities arise.
 - ii. This could be a responsibility for the implementation committee. This committee could be an extension of the steering committee.
 - iii. This would be a good responsibility for the Parks and Recreation Board also. The implementation committee could be a subcommittee of the P&R Board.
- b. Will the work of the Middletown Parks Accessibility Strategy be done in-house or by consultants?
 - i. Will depend on the size of the project. Many parks will only need minor improvements to achieve the desired accessibility.
 - ii. Some additional clarity for this opportunity would be useful.
 - iii. Access extends beyond the park boundaries to include the approach via trails, sidewalks, and crosswalks.
- c. Remove the word "walking" from "walking paths" so that the language is more inclusive.
- d. Was an Open Space EIT discussed at all during the report process?
 - i. An Open Space EIT did not come up during previous discussions. A referendum would be required.
 - ii. Are there any recommendations for funding other than grant opportunities?
 - 1. Most opportunities for additional funding are grants-related. Also include recommendation to establish a legacy gift program to allow individuals to donate to the parks department.
 - iii. Can fee-in-lieu funds be dedicated to sidewalks specifically?
 - The existing fee-in-lieu language in the SALDO is related to recreational lands. Those funds are to be dedicated to recreational development.
 - 2. Fee-in-lieu funding is likely to decline since few new development opportunities exist in the Township.
 - iv. Any additional SALDO recommendations?
- e. Remove references to existing in the open space vision to make it more inclusive of additional/new open space.

- i. Is there a map of privately-owned open space that is preserved through easements or other means?
- ii. The EAC is responsible for maintaining this list, which is due for an update
- f. The language in the Woodbourne Rd improvements feels very strong compared to other opportunities. Is there a reason?
 - i. The improvements described in the Woodbourne Rd opportunity are long-term in scope and will involve several partnerships with large institutions, including the railroad companies. The work required to get this project moving and maintain momentum through completion will require a lot of effort, so the language used to describe the opportunity is strong.
- g. Remove mention of dam repair at Lake Luxembourg. The project has not yet been approved.
- h. Is the Twin Oaks Master Plan still relevant? Does it need to be updated?
 - i. The issues identified in the master plan are still relevant, but some conditions have changed. The Township will need to revisit the plan as it moves toward implementation.
 - 1. Implementation should be done in phases to minimize the disruption to play.
 - 2. Substitute fields could be available at Chickenfoot Park (2) and Queen Anne Park (1) during construction.
 - a. These fields will likely need additional maintenance before they are ready to be used for regular play.
 - b. Additional parking may also be needed.
- i. What are the options for creating additional indoor recreation opportunities?
 - i. The plan recommends building a new community center to provide additional indoor recreation opportunities. The concept provided in the report would allow for indoor basketball in addition to senior center activities and other multi-generational programming.
 - ii. Are there other places the community center could move to? Parking is an issue already and will be more of an issue with a larger facility.
 - 1. The Township will need to manage the programming schedule differently also.
 - 2. One option is the vacant school buildings at Pearl S Buck and Samuel Everitt Elementary Schools.
 - 3. Could one be put at the Oxford Valley Mall?
 - a. That would need to be part of the redevelopment agreement.
- j. Township would like to see additional analysis of programming and finances, particularly related to tax funding and allocation.
- k. Township would also like to see further development of the opportunity to establish agreements with youth sports organizations based on feedback from

the neighboring parks and rec directors focus group and specific recommendations related to improvements to the trail network.

- i. Frosty Hollow Trail is currently being developed to connect Frosty Hollow Park and Upper Orchard Park.
- 3. Public comment can be made via a Survey Monkey link. The QR code used for the main public opinion survey will be reprogrammed to link to the public comment survey. The Township will need to publicize.

Next Steps:

- Finalize draft for public review by Friday, August 15, 2025.
- Public Review period: August 15 September 15, 2025
- Board of Supervisors presentation of Final Plan on Monday, October 6, 2025



1. Paul Kopera (PK) welcomed and thanked the participants for attending. He introduced the project team from Simone Collins Landscape Architecture: William Collins, RLA (WC), Anita Nardone, PE (AN), Toby Levin, RLA, ASLA (TL),

- and Derek Dureka, CPRP, as the consultants for the Comprehensive Parks, Recreation, Open Space, Greenways, Trails Plan study (CPROSGT) for Middletown Township.
- 2. Project team contact information (see C.4 below), schedule and agenda included on the meeting handout.

B. Presentation

1. AN, TL, and DD gave a presentation of the study as shown below and emphasized that the purpose of this third public meeting was to summarize public participation comments and present the visions and a selection of the recommendations that will appear in the report. AN emphasized that this meeting sought any and all feedback on the visions and recommendations for the report that are presented.

a. Schedule

- AN noted that the project will continue to seek public participation through the public opinion survey through June 1, as well as one additional committee meeting.
- The Draft plan will be published for public comment by July 2. Comments will be accepted through August 21.
- Final plan expected in early September 2025.
- Study will extend through late summer (September) of 2025; all material related to the study will be posted to the Township website under the P&R page.

b. Public Participation

- Public Meeting #2 (March 25)
 Key Takeaways included:
 - Importance of connectivity of neighborhoods and parks.
 Priorities should be getting folks to Core Creek Park,
 Middletown Community Park, and the Middletown
 Community (Senior) Center.
 - ii. Diversity and quantity of programming is great, but access for casual/drop-in athletics could be improved.
 - iii. Generational project ideas include
 - o Amphitheater
 - o Trail connections
 - o Bird sanctuary/Nature center
 - o Turf field complex
 - Woodbourne pedestrian tunnel

- Indoor recreation center
- iv. Priorities for capital improvement include:
 - o Twin Oaks Park improvements
 - o Improved lighting throughout the parks system

- 2. Vision 2: Parks linked to neighborhoods by safe pedestrian and bike routes
 - a. The Middletown community desires the safe bicycle and pedestrian routes as described in the 2024 Multi-modal Improvement Plan (MIP) to connect Township neighborhoods to parks, preserves, and open spaces inside Middletown Township, and to the regional trails and bike routes that extend into neighboring municipalities.
- 3. Vision 3: Recreation programming excellence
 - a. Middletown residents and Township staff will continue to work collectively to ensure the Township legacy of excellent programming by continuing to serve all ages and abilities, and to promote physical, mental, social, and emotional health for all users.
- 4. Vision 4: Increased availability and access to open space
 - a. The Middletown community seeks to add recreation opportunities to the Township park system through strategic acquisitions that increase acreage under municipal stewardship, as well as improve public access to existing Township-owned open space.
- 5. Vision 5: Efficient and sustainable Parks and Recreation management, maintenance, and administration

- a. Middletown Township will continue its mission to deliver excellent park and recreation experiences to the community who take pride in their neighborhoods and history.
- 6. Vision 6: Township policy/ordinances to support recreation needs, with funding strategies to achieve multi-functional infrastructure improvements
 - a. Middletown Township seeks to balance development with quality-of-life needs and the modernization of infrastructure that can serve multiple needs: transportation, ecological restoration, stormwater management, and recreation.

d. Draft Recommendations

 - Strategy to get people to parks and open space resources:

 - ii. Considerations include sidewalk gaps, links to transit routes, trails and green way gaps and connections, obstacles (infrastructure, ownership, etc.)
 - iii. A sample strategy was shown for Firefighters' Park, which included additional sidewalks, internal paths, and crosswalks. A high-level cost estimate for these improvements was provided.
- b. Priority Pedestrian-Bicycle Connections (Vision 2)
 - Queen Anne Creek Trail to connect Woodbourne Road to Walter Miller Elementary School and Mill Creek with future connections to Mill-Queen Anne-Black Ditch Trail
 - ii. Jones Park to Simmons Park via Clearview Ave. and Brownsville Rd. with future connection to Neshaminy Creek Greenway Trail
- c. Open Space Preserves (Vision 4)
 - i. Improve access to and, where appropriate, within open spaces and celebrate open spaces as "preserves"
 - ii. Mill Creek Preserve
 - 1. Trail could recognize the riparian ecosystem of Mill Creek with interpretive signage and other amenities.
 - 2. Would connect Veterans Memorial Park, Forsythia Crossing Park, Upper Orchard Park, and Frost Hollow Tennis Center (Bucks Co.), with future connections to Queen Anne Creek Trail.
- d. Field Use and Maintenance (Vision 5)

- i. Clarity is needed regarding the division of maintenance responsibilities between MT Parks and Rec and youth athletic associations.
- ii. Field use should be tracked more closely to ensure maintenance activities are coordinated properly and efficiently.
- iii. Biannual review of contracts with youth athletic associations would help ensure all parties understand their responsibilities.
- e. Implementation recommendations (Vision 6)
 - Make revisions to Zoning Ordinances and Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SALDO) to support open space provision and development.
 - ii. Create a Middletown Official Map to express the Township's interest in acquiring specific lands for public purposes sometime in the future.

C. Comments/ Questions

1. One participant questioned whether there was a possibility of acquiring land near the proposed development (Shady Brook) to provide a connection to Core Creek Park? Also, though a trail lover---this participant questioned whether trailheads should be placed in neighborhoods placing parking burdens on the neighborhood. Would rather see a trail located closer to the road.

Response/Discussion:

- TL noted that the conversations between the Township and the development applicant should continue to investigate this specific opportunity.
- Partnerships---like this one---show the value of achieving trail/open space needs by involving both the public and private community.
- TL encouraged public feedback to the Township for preferred trail alignments.
- 2. A participant noted that he walks the Mill Creek greenway frequently; and endorses the value of a more formal trail.
- A participant suggested including a splash pad/park in the plan recommendations. The participant noted that a splash pad would require less expensive maintenance than a public pool and would be safer for users without requiring staff.

NOTES:

- 1. TL started the conversation by providing a brief overview of the CPROSGT, including project scope, public engagement efforts thus far, and the remaining project schedule.
- The discussion then turned to safety and security considerations in the parks.
 - a. The main priorities for police and emergency services are visibility into parks, lighting within the parks, and access to all areas of the parks.
 - i. To maintain sight lines, keep trees pruned high and shrubs low enough to prevent individuals from hiding behind them.
 - ii. Improved lighting in all parks would aid nighttime patrols (which are typically done from a vehicle) and deter illicit activities.

- iii. When paths are provided, 8-9' of width allows for emergency services to use them as access roads into the park.
- iv. Generally access is good.
- b. Middletown Community Park sees the most issues due to its size and popularity/heavy use.
- c. ATV damage is most common in Veterans Memorial and Firefighters' Parks.
- d. A wayfinding system along trails would also be helpful for locating emergency callers within the parks. The system would contain markers with identified GPS coordinates on a map distributed to emergency services responders.
- e. Park signage identifying the name and address of each park would also assist in aid in ensuring responders are dispatched to the correct park given the similar names of several parks in the area.

3. TL asked about which parks see the most law enforcement/emergency services issues.

- a. Problem areas tend to rotate depending on neighborhood demographics. Issues are most frequent at parks with basketball courts or other gathering areas, such as pavilions.
- b. Open spaces have fewer incidents due to lower visibility and less use.
- c. Typically, special events proceed without incident. Police presence seems to be enough to prevent illicit activities.
- d. Brush fires are occasionally set by juveniles in wooded areas, particularly near schools.

4. The discussion then turned to parking issues and enforcement.

- a. Parking complaints are received most frequently near Veterans Park, Firefighters' Park, and Twin Oaks Park.
- b. Parking is prohibited on Trenton Road near Twin Oaks Park, but enforcement is typically lenient when the parking lot is full.
- c. Neighbors complain minimally about excess parking near Twin Oaks Park. They typically understand that on-street parking is for all, not reserved for neighborhood residents.

5. Emergency services would like to see open-access AEDs installed in parks, particularly at Twin Oaks and Middletown Community Park, as well as other parks with heavy sports-related usage.

- a. AEDs are currently installed at the Township Building, the Senior Center, and at the Community Park Barn.
- b. Alarmed, glass-encased AEDs would be best for outdoor installation. The alarm help prevent vandalism/abuse.

6. Conversation also addressed the unhoused population.

- a. Incidents are rare and quickly addressed in Township parks.
- b. Unhoused encampments are more commonly seen in County Parks due to the previous "hands-off" approach taken by County park rangers.
- c. It is possible that there are small encampments in Township open space, but they are not reported due to the lack of other users.

- 1. MT owns the building and land; Senior Center pays \$1/year rent to township
- 2. Township uses space for classes, Summer Camp and rentals.
- 3. Shared use creates scheduling conflicts and limits Senior Center to offer certain events or activities

C. Current Senior Center Facility Challenges

1. Building too small for current needs, especially when sharing with township

- 2. Lack of dedicated cafeteria space requires daily setup/teardown for activities that use the space.
- 3. Issues with wifi accessibility (cinder block walls)
- 4. Staffing:
 - Elisabeth noted that (including herself) the MSC has three paid staff—and does a lot with volunteers—including senior volunteers.
 - Some of the physical demands for setup fall on senior volunteers
 - She has advertised for 'service hour' candidates—but has not had much success.
 - MSC needs verified 'Verisafe' trained personnel for lunch distribution
- 5. Outdated bathrooms not fully ADA compliant
- 6. Old carpeting creates cleanliness and mobility issues
- 7. Limited parking due to pickleball courts
- 8. Summer camp use further restricts available space
- 9. Wood shop space cannot be continued;

D. Programming & Operational Constraints

- 1. Events capped at 100 people due to space limitations, impacting <u>fundraising</u> potential
- 4. Difficulty accommodating multiple activities simultaneously
- 5. Volunteer labor strained by daily setup/teardown requirements (see C.3 above)
- 6. Limited ability to offer intergenerational programming due to insurance restrictions and abuse clearance issues.
- 7. Approximately 350 active members (membership fee is \$15/year for Township residents), with 53 new members since January 2025.

E. Potential Solutions and Improvements

- 1. Dedicated cafeteria space is needed to improve efficiency of operations
- 2. Community garden plots have been given to MT residents; there are none that are used specifically by the Senior Center for an outdoor activity.
- 3. Outdoor bathrooms would benefit both Senior Center and park users
 - Elisabeth noted that many times, pickleball users come inside to use the bathrooms
 - Afterhours, if court users see lights on---they bang on the doors to use the restrooms.
- 4. Flooring upgrades (removing carpet) would improve cleanliness and mobility
- 5. Additional staff needed to expand programming and hours

F. Building Future

- 1. While ADA bathrooms are the primary need, additional space in the form of an addition makes sense
- 2. EG notes that leveling the 1950s-era building and starting over with (perhaps) a two-story facility
- 3. An asked whether current members would consider 'moving' to a new location, EG noted 'Y'—for those residents that can drive or can arrange transportation.
- 4. Consideration should be given to expansion/relocation of MSC in capital improvements plan

Next Steps:

- Elisabeth to send floor plan of the current facility to Anita
- Anita asked for some representative photos of typical daily operations
- Anita will provide 'printed' surveys to EG for distribution at the MSC.
- Office of Aging-pertinent information to Anita
- Draft CPROSGT plan to Bucks County for review and comments

A. Project Overview

- 1. Discussion of the open space strategy for Middletown Township's comprehensive plan before public meeting.
 - AN introduced purpose of meeting, to prepare for the public meeting and go over survey data and open space.

B. Current Open Space Situation

1. The township owns fair amount of open space concentrated in a few different areas with some additional scattered parcels.

- 2. Limited opportunities to acquire new open space due to being largely built out, even if funding was made available.
 - Discussed how the topic of limited open space can be approached with the public, managing expectations without disappointing them.
 - Propose to discuss improving access to existing open spaces and memorizing them as "preserves."
- 3. There is a strong public desire to preserve existing open space and semi-rural character.
- 4. Residents want increased access to natural areas beyond Cork Creek, a popular large preserved open space.
 - The are plenty of township owned natural areas in the township without proper access.

C. Development Pressures

- 1. Township is receiving rezoning applications for higher density development.
 - 3+ in the last 2 years, most being specific to a singular parcel.
- 2. Some high density developments increasing from 30% to 75% impervious coverage.
- 3. Residents concerned about loss of suburban feel to more urban-style density.
 - Increased density development has residents wanting to keep spaces open.
- 4. Board views differ on appropriate density levels, more agreeable to a higher density.

D. Potential Open Space Strategies

- 5. Improve access to existing township-owned spaces.
- 6. Memorialize existing open spaces and permanent "preserves."
- 7. Quantify and categorize existing open space types.
- 8. Ensure deed restrictions prevent sale of township open spaces.
- 9. Consider redefining "open space" to include access improvements like trails and sidewalks.
 - If open space includes access improvements, grants could become more available.
- 10. Address invasive species and ecological restoration needs.
 - Specific topics such as maintenance, length of restoration.
- 11. Analyze open space per capita metrics compared to other municipalities.

E. Woodborne Project as a Potential "Generational Project"

1. Would improve connectivity for two separate parts of the township and improve transportation infrastructure.

- 2. Includes a pedestrian tunnel, access to Steyer Park and trails.
- 3. Alighns with priorities from Master Implentation Plan (MIP)
- 4. Could attract funding by addressing multiple goals (transportation, access, drainage)

F. Public Engagement

- 1. Survey received over 1,000 responses
- 2. Many long-term residents (20+ years) generally satisfied with township
- 3. Generational project will be explained and feedback will be encouraged.
- 4. Need to manage expectations on new open space acquisition.

Next Steps:

- Dive deeper into open space free requirements for developments Free required for professional and commercial development, but unsure about residential minimum requirement.
- Research deed restrictions on existing township-owned open spaces
- Analyze open space per capita metrics
- Develop recommendations on ecological restoration needs
- Prepare to present initial concepts (open space, pedestrian connections, facilities management / operational efficiency, and programming.)

- 3. Public Survey Reponses to Q18 "What should be MT priorities in next 3-5 years?": Development of Township trails, paths, sidewalks (MMIP-2023)-79%; Pr4eservation of and protection of open space (52%); Add to or enhance amenities at existing parks (51%)

C. Past Associations Between St. Mary's and MT P&R

- 1. Joann briefed Anita on past associations between the hospital and MT P&R e.g. Chop Chop Cooking Camp, etc.
- 2. Basic comments on that overall-good experience:
 - Previous programs (e.g., Chop Chop cooking camp) faced logistical challenges due to limited accessibility and safe drop-off areas
 - Silver Lake noted as a good model with improved amenities (nature center, trails, splash pad)
 - Need for sites with better accessibility, lighting, bathrooms, and internal circulation for events/programs
 - Past "healthy neighborhood assessment" highlighted difficulty in walking between locations (St. Mary's a part of it with Neshaminy School District; Bristol Township?

D. St. Mary's Hospital Campus Trail

- 1. Existing trail network on campus:
 - East (Main hospital): Connection to Core Creek Park Road---but minimal width (2' maybe); no direct sidewalk to hospital main entrance---only a perimeter route; connection to sidewalk on 413.
 - West: St. Mary's Re-Hab site has internal trail (left over from the former school site that was purchased by Trinity) with spur to Hampton Drive/ Danby Way/ Albert Way sidewalk system. Albert Way abuts MT-owned open space leading to Neshaminy Creek.
- 2. Public frequently uses these trails, though formal agreement status is unclear
- 3. Potential "low-hanging fruit" for expanding township trail network by connecting to hospital trails

E. Next Steps

1. Anita to send Joann presentation; notes with email requesting clarification from St. Mary's/Trinity on community usage of trails (would it need a formal agreement? Legal protections needed for public access?, etc.)

2. Joann to see if there are some past programs; programming ideas that are still relevant---for possible inclusion in programming recommendations.

We answered a regional need for health services in Bucks County's most underserved area in 1973 – relocating to land previously used as a horse farm.

Fast forward five decades, St. Mary is now a beautiful 53-acre state-of-the-art Medical Center campus comprised of more than 700 physicians, nearly 3,000 colleagues, and 1,100 volunteers committed to providing quality care delivered with compassion and respect.

The evolution continues daily, as St. Mary attracts top doctors, introduces cutting-edge technologies and implements advanced procedures to meet the healthcare needs of the people it serves, including the nearly 630,000 residents of Bucks County.

C. <u>Updates from Woods Services</u>

- 1. Dawn and Kristin noted that master planning for new development on the campus was done by Kieran Timberlake a few years ago; re-imagining what the campus looks like.
- 2. A 'Transitional Housing Overlay' amendment was recently passed in MT (April 2025)---allowing them to consider 'new', attainable housing and additional medical building facilities (open to the public); retail establishments, etc. Consistent with mission to integrate the Woods community into the larger community. Equity partner identified. (Gilmore is engineer)
 - Residential bldg. proposed name 'Meadowbrook' with 42 units
 - Real estate space for 'social enterprises'; a family guest house; expansion of physical plant/maintenance area
- 3. Beth O'Toole and Dawn highlighted other campus recreational improvements that have been integrated in the years since the pandemic shutdown: paved, accessible trails through the forested portion of campus; grant money receive for basketball courts; 9-10 acres of unprogrammed open space (meadows, etc.)
- 4. Dawn updated AN on the PennDOT-RC3 (Rt. 1 Reconstruction Project follows RC1 in MT)
 - AN shared a conceptual plan from 2 years ago; DD noted that this is still the same plan proffered currently
 - PennDOT will be having a virtual Public Update Meeting on April 23 via Zoom at 7pm. Anita noted that she will attend.
 - Approximately 12 acres of Woods taken by eminent domain
 - Important elements for Woods: Expanded SR413 clover-leaf expands 413/ Woods Lane intersection by at least 20' with room for 10'-wide ped/ bike path at the new Highland Ave roundabout to the campus; two SEPTA bus stops for employees are being proposed in the new plan iteration
 - AN asked about Corn Crib Bridge---any discussion of sidewalk? Dawn noted that bridge will be out-of-commission for 18 months; PennDOT has

noted the 'anomaly' that no other PennDOT bridge connecting two private properties exists in the state (\$2M). Grade issues were addressed by PennDOT for the crossing to allow accessibility by wheelchair residents

- **Corn Crib connects to the Woods property on the north side of Route 1; near the Bucks County Library---also near recently sold Heckman School---where 66 townhomes are planned.
- o Important multimodal Rt. 1 crossing here!
- AN noted that the PennDOT 'Connects' planning element utilized in recent years tries to mesh community needs into these high-dollar infrastructure projects; urged pushing for full sidewalk
- Dawn noted that PennDOT appears to have 'heard' that request.

D. Recreational Programming Collaborations---A Possibility?

- 1. Beth spoke on the recreational uses of the campus (walking; equine and swimming). Woods has two outdoor pools and one indoor pool---mainly servicing the residential population there.
- 2. AN noted the very large interest of MT residents in a public pool;
- 3. AN asked if Woods staff knew the MT P&R staff (Mainly---only Paul Kopera)
- 4. AN noted that she felt that the MT P&R staff might like to explore rec opportunities to 'integrate' residents into the campus.

C. Review of NSD Properties in MT

- 1. School locations in MT superimposed over the parks map
- 2. Pearl S Buck currently closed; Jay confirmed that it is currently leased to the Bucks County Intermediate Unit (5 year lease)
- 3. Oliver Heckman School closed and sold; 66 townhouse units planned for the site

D. Middletown MMIP (2024): Link between Schools/ Parks/ Desired Retail

- 1. AN showed portuions of the 'toolbox' method applied to MT; specifically in the Levittown area.
- 2. Links between Schweitzer/Sandburg, Everitt and Miller ES 'couild' be accomplished with a greenway/ trail network.
- 3. Opportunities exist for grant funding that accomplished two functions: transportation and recreation---trails. Jay noted problems with security issues in bringing people onto campuses during school hours.
- 4. AN asked if traffic issues at these schools were a concern? JB: No; more at the new Core Creek ES/ Maple Pointe MS.

E. Public School Access for Rec Space after School Hours---A Possibility?

- 1. Jay explained the concerns of the school district with accessibility: safety and liability are the largest concerns.
- 2. Vandalism and loitering at playground after school hours is also a concern.
- 3. Jay noted that the school district employs a threat assessment / risk assessment firm to comment on these items.
- 4. Currently, most facilities are locked and fenced to control access to properties.
- 5. AN noted the very large interest of MT residents in a public pool;

F. Athletic Association Use of NSD Facilities

1. Jay confirmed that Annemarie Murphy and Scott could provide a listing of the typical parameters required by organizations for the use of school facilities

- 2. Costs are rising; opening a facility for athletic organization use requires payment of custodial staff, etc.
- 3. AN requested that information from the school district.

- 2. <u>Purpose of Meeting</u>: To provide information to MT P&R on the focus of the plan to-date; questions / concerns that affect the neighboring boroughs; ways that MT and their borough neighbors could collaborate on shared rec/open space/connectivity issues.

B. Middletown Multimodal Improvement Plan (MMIP) (2022)

- 1. Anita provided an overview of the MMIP completed by Simone Collins in 2022 for MT with the purpose of planning for critical pedestrian and bike infrastructure within the Township.
- 2. Anita will send the link to the Township MMIP to attendees along with notes.

C. Overview of Open Space in MT

- 1. Anita discussed the distribution of parks and open spaces in MT and discussed how MT compares with national average of open space per resident. Currently, MT exceeds the national average.
- 2. The challenge in MT is being able to access parks and open spaces safely as a pedestrian.

D. <u>Discussion of Preliminary Recommendations to MT: Open Spaces</u>

- 1. There is little opportunity to acquire 'new' open spaces; focus shall be on providing access to those open spaces---where passive recreational opportunities may exist with trails and safe ped connections.
- 2. 'Preserves': Using Township-owned land surrounding the Neshaminy Creek, the Mill Creek, the Queen Anne Creek and the Saba wetlands---the concept of 'preserves' with access shall be promoted.
- 3. Making pedestrian connections along these 'preserves' (greenways has the potential to connect neighborhoods, some Levittown parks and schools.
- 4. Middletown Country Club is Township-owned. Lease is up in a couple of years; Twp may want to consider a feasibility study to consider whether this land use (golf) is the highest and best use. Considerations might include a passive park with trails; other activities. A community pool has been mentioned several times
- 5. Heritage Conservancy will be a great partner in maintaining the natural areas and wetlands.
- 6. Group discussed the Langhorne Spring Water parcel; plan will recommend further study of connecting to this parcel from township and boroughs. This concept was of interest to the group.

E. Partnership Opportunities

1. Participants agreed that partnering on projects to provide safety pedestrian movement.

2. Anita commented that grant applications that include interested and financially-participating partners fare well when applications are evaluated.

1. LAA – Kevin McGerry

- LAA around since 1989; They serve boys and girls; in-house and travel for baseball, softball, basketball and soccer.
- Enrollment: Major spike since 2022 (2019—in house baseball=320 kids vs. 2024=565 kinds)
- Each age level has 8 teams per age group; teams 10-12 kids max to allow equal play) Older divisions-6 teams.
- Basketball has the greatest increase; 2019=500 kids vs. 2024=922!
- They have reached capacity for practice and games based on the number of fields they have access to.
- Maintenance: Grass cutting is \$20-25K annually; other needs---for a total of \$25k-45K annually.

- Appreciative of the GREAT response by MT P&R to all calls, texts.
- Challenges/Opportunities: 1. Would like a clearer representation of what each of the parties is responsible for each year 2. Lighting control 3. Discussions each year are fruitful; but would like to have something more to be able to plan better. 4. Where could they hold in-person league meetings without having to pay for the Barn or School District space?

2. MAA – Bill Thomas and Mike Kepner

- MAA is growing about 10-15% each year since 2019 in 3 of the 4 sports offered. (baseball, softball, basketball, soccer)
- Over 1000 kids in all sports for spring; and more for fall season.
- The biggest challenge is managing a practice and game schedule with the available fields. With all of the building, we think that number will only increase.
- Maintenance: Same figure for cutting (\$20-25K annually) for a total annual expense of \$35-40K. The biggest issue is dirt; location of fields and amount of water requires dirt every year.
- Challenges/ Opportunities: 1. Would like to see a clearer use agreement as to what each party is responsible for. Who owns what? Dugout buildings, benches, fencing, etc. When something comes up, the Twp and Maa figure it out---but more clarity would be helpful. Especially lighting. 2. Lighting: MAA pays pro-rated fee based on use of field for specified time, though lights not always on
- Need for Dog Parks!---Big problem for field maintenance is people using the field for their dogs. Please consider adding more dog parks to alleviate this issue.
- Water: We need water for the softball fields (keeps getting cut from budget); water for the field #3 is slow.
- MAA recommends that the Twp take control of Chickenfoot Park---and use it for more space, a trail possible dog park. Any possibility?**

3. Hulmeville Soccer – John Buckland

- HS has existed since 1978.
- Enrollment has seen an upward trend---with a 20% increase over 2024. Total of in-house and travel program: 1,300 kids per season. Anticipate that this trend will continue.

^{**} This issue was raised with the Bucks County P&R Director who serves on this CPROSGT Steering Committee. The County may well be interested in a swapping of use-for -maintenance partnership.

- HS uses front of Herbert Hoover ES (Herbert Hoover park); in the fall—they use the Det. Christopher Jones field.
- Maintenance: MT takes care of field cutting; HS covers nets and field lining each year. Annual costs \$20k/year.
- User agreement is pretty simple for HS; they would like to see if they
 could choose to have an annual contract vs. twice a year contract to save
 paperwork.
- Appreciate a great relationship with MT P&R.
- Field availability is the greatest challenge to the program.
- Wish List: 1. Hoover field needs rolling 2. More frequency in moving 3. Accessibility of lights.

- 2. Purpose of Meeting: To provide information to MT on neighboring P&R practices that enable an assessment of their current practices.

B. <u>Agenda Question/ Participant Responses</u>

- What is basic format/procedures used by your Township for prioritizing and managing the suite of Township facilities by athletic organizations?
 - a. How many different types of youth and adult athletic leagues are accommodated?
 - b. How many Township fields and facilities are used?
 - c. Does organizational use prevent recreational use by the general public?
 - d. What other facilities in the Township (non-Twp owned) are used?
 - e. Permits and Use Agreements? How is use monitored? Permitted vs. Actual Use
 - f. Communication methods?
 - g. Expectations of organizations toward use expenses (e.g cut grass; line fields; equipment on the field; lighting; netting, other capital improvements, etc.)
 - h. Are Township fees for use a 'fair' market rate? How do you support keeping offerings affordable while not subsidizing their budgets?
- 1. Walt Mulholland-Lower Southampton
 - Lower Southampton Athletic Association is major user group
 - LSAA does not pay fees; permit states full-time use M-Fr and Sat/Sun
 - Yes---this precludes use by other groups; working to understand actual use of the fields; Walt does drop-bys to check
 - Maintenance by LSAA lining; field improvements; major capital like lights is Township responsibility.
- 2. Jen Fean/ Derick Gianetti-Northampton
 - 5 in house youth leagues; 2-3 HOA softball leagues
 - Accreditation process: insurance, tax returns, paperwork. Accredited groups are required to comply with a 70% residency requirement

- Fees are based on roster: in township---no fee; in school district--\$25; non-resident \$45. Twp verifies rosters. Non-accredited group use a basic field rental agreement---but accredited groups get priority for scheduling. Tourney fees are applied.
- Accredited groups responsible for their own field maintenance---done with fundraising;
- Same problem as Lower Southampton---verification of use based on the permit and schedule.

3. Monica Tierney-Lower Makefield Township

- Same type of process as Northampton---accreditation/sanctioning process; fees are: \$30-residents; \$60 nonresidents; also lighting fees.
- Total generated fees are \$300,000
- Currently seven (7) sanctioned leagues: 13 soccer; 4 tennis; 2.5 footbal; 8 picklball 12 ballfield groups.
- Very close communications with league heads to ascertain maintenance requirements/field rotation needs; groups do basic level of maintenance to guarantee play; safety stuff-Township; other bigger items are split or leagues asked to pay.
- Total 5,266 league participants

(Question Pual Kopera: Any irrigated fields? Brain Andrews-Falls – One (1) field)

4. Brian Andrews – Falls Township

- Three (3) athletic organizations (represent 6 youth sports and 3 adult sports)
- Fields have lease agreements associated with them; currently in process of updating lease agreements
- Groups responsible for field upkeep for payability; township does the capital expense work.
- Fall Twp currently gives a \$6000 donation to forty (4) groups
- Fees assessed for a seasonal use; other groups pay a rental fee
 - Falls has a park security team that does a daily log of field use.

5. Brian Morris-Bristol Township

- Lease agreements currently with Levittown and United Bucks Girls Softball
- 10 year lease; past lease fee was \$1/year—recently updated to \$100/year
- Groups do all of the maintenance; improvements to the fields are part of the lease agreement

- Use fees for all other fields by other groups are on a per hour per use fee. Township partners with those types of groups to offer events
- Non standard groups who use the fields do a 80-20 split (80-group; 20 to Twp); good arrangement for Twp.
- Biggest money make is the turf field. Specialized portal to request field use. Lots of outside groups use the turf field.

C. Agenda Question/Participant Response

- In your Township's annual budget, how are 'programming' and 'maintenance' structured under program 'revenue' and program 'expense'?
 - a. Are public works staff used by the P&R department or is there a dedicated parks division?
 - If public works staff, is that labor expense charged to your department?
 - b. Are P&R labor rates included as part of program expense?
 - c. Are programs required by your Township to be financially selfsustaining? If not, what is your cost recovery formula?
- 1. Walt Mulholland Lower Southampton
 - All maintenance of parks is handled by PW; the P&R budget is not charged for PW maintenance.
 - Programming: We strive to breakeven or make a little profit. Full time staff labor costs are not covered at this point; we are trying to get to that point
- 2. Jenn Fean/ Derreck Gianetti- Northampton
 - Currently there is a dedicated park staff under the Public Works dept.; however the parks maintenance figure is under the P&R department
 - Both P&R and PW work together on the budgeting
 - Programming: We try to cover as much of the expense with the program revenue; programming share was recently changed from 70-30 to 65-35---bringing a little more revenue to Twp.
 - Since COVID, there is not as much pressure on the cost coverage issue.
- 3. Monica Tienrney-Lower Makefield
 - There is a dedicated park millage rate assessed in the Twp; goal is now to cover 70% of costs with revenue/ fees

- Expectation is that 120% of programming should be covered by revenue; supporting staff labor should be accounted for in the costs.
- Park maintenance was controlled by the P&R staff until last month; now PW handles all maintenance and P&R covers up to five (5) PW employees.
- P&R and PW work hard at communicating and getting the work done
- 4. Brian Andrews Falls Township
 - Park maintenance used to be covered by the P&R staff; now it is all under PW.
 - Programming: Goal ios to break even; when working with an outside group, we consider staff labor—especially if staff is actually running the event.
 - Pool management is tricky; but revenues (memberships, etc.) generally cover cost; major capital amortization is not considered in P&R budgets yearly.
- 5. Brian Morris Bristol Township
 - PW is used for all maintenance; event fees need to factor in PW staff for setup/cleanup
 - There is some hybrid arrangements between P&R and PW e.g. splash pad
 - There is no millage rate in Bristol; P&R paid out of the general fund
 - Programming: The goalis to be able to provide free events as much as is possible. Overall, they are in a good situation.

- 1. Walt Mulholland Lower Southampton
 - RCO not used here now.
- 2. Jenn GFean/Derrick Gianetti Northampton
 - No RCO.
- 3. Monica Tierney Lower Makefield
 - Yes; we use one. Threshold is \$25K;
 - We are getting a sufficient number of qualified contractors; we use CoStar or Sourcewell as much as is possible

- 4. Brian Andrews Fall Township
 - Yes; we have a RCO with an apprentice requirement
 - He also uses CoStar and Sourcewell for projects. **

**DD: Noting that more contractors with specialty experience are getting the CoStar and Sourcewell certification.

 Is there a possibility of collaborating on programming offered to maximize participation opportunities in the region? What would that process look like?

All participants agreed that there is a lot to be gained by collaborating on programming to offer new programming----or more importantly---to be able to continue programming when township registrations are low.





Q2 How long have you lived in your community?



Q3 Indicate the number of people in your household in each group.




Q4 Generally, how often do people in your household visit parks in Middletown Township?



Q7 What is your favorite type of open space feature? Select One.









The creek needs to be dredged to alleviate the flooding and water flow issues. One other item of note is that one of the drains by the asphalt walk way on the Twin Oaks side had a tree growing out of it! There are very simple and cost effective solutions that cost are less than the improvements of recent years. I recommend having and independent review and estimate. 
Q11 In general, how important do you feel open spaces such as public parks and natural areas are to the well-being and quality of life in Middletown Township?








Land Use Map




Soils Map




Geology Map






Hydrology Map





Canopy Cover Map






Elevation and Steep Slopes Map






Existing Open Space Map







Existing On and Off Road Trails Map




Existing Sidewalks Map




10-Minute Drive: Water Access


















Firefighters Park Concept



Middletown Community Park Concept






Consideration of Increase to Fee in Lieu of Parkland Dedication

A generally accepted method to determine fee in lieu of land dedication for recreation is to determine the average fair market value (per acre) of the land otherwise required to be dedicated. This is usually established through the preparation of an appraisal of the land.

Absent this appraisal effort, an increase to the fee in lieu of dedication for residential uses may be determined as follows:


- 1. NRPA Metrics for recreational land: 11.2 acres per 1,000 residents = 0.0112 acres per person
- 2. Average household size in Middletown: 2.64 persons per household
- 3. Recommended acreage per household: 2.64 persons/household X 0.0112 acres per person = 0.0296 acres per household
- 4. Consider land development costs; infrastructure; and equipment: Double the acres per household value to 0.0592 acres per household.
- 5. Convert acres per household to SF per Dwelling Unit (DU): 0.0592 acres per household x 43,560 SF/acre = 2,579 or 2,600 SF per DU.

Fee Determination

- 1. Land Value General Estimate: \$50,000 per acre
 - Fee in Lieu of: \$50,000 X 0.0592 = \$2,960 per DU
- 2. Land Value General Estimate: \$75,000 per acre
 - Fee in Lieu of: \$75,000 X 0.0592 = \$4,440 per DU
- 3. Land Value General Estimate: \$100,000 per acre
 - Fee in Lieu of: \$100,000 X 0.0592 = \$5,920 per DU

Summary:

The current fee in lieu of value is determined by the Board of Supervisors on a case-by-case basis. By establishing a set formula for fee-in-lieu calculations, the Board can demonstrate its commitment to the preservation of open space for the community.



The Official Map

FACT SHEET

for Local Officials

What is an Official Map?

An "official map" is a combined map and ordinance designed to implement the goals and community vision set forth in the comprehensive plan. The official map shows the locations of planned future public lands and facilities such as transportation, recreational parks and trails, and open space. The official map expresses a municipality's interest in acquiring these lands for public purposes sometime in the future. Official maps can be used by townships, boroughs, cities, and counties. The official map is not to be mistaken for the official zoning map of a municipality.

Municipalities and counties are authorized by Article IV of the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code (MPC) to develop and implement official maps. Official maps may include, but are not limited to:

- Existing and proposed public streets, watercourses, and public grounds, including widening, narrowing, extensions, diminutions, openings, or closings.
- Existing and proposed public parks, playgrounds, and open space reservations.
- Pedestrian ways and easements.
- Railroad and transit right-of-way and easements.
- Flood control basins, floodways and flood plains, storm water management areas, and drainage easements.
- Support facilities, easements, and other properties held by public bodies undertaking the elements of a comprehensive plan.

What are the Benefits?

- The official map can help focus limited financial resources on projects that meet and advance community goals.
- The official map helps municipalities make improvements such as connecting and improving the local street network, intersection improvements, protecting important natural areas, and providing more green space, recreation facilities, trails, and sidewalks.
- The official map saves time and money by informing property owners and developers of municipal goals and intentions in advance of development plans.
- The official map is an effective negotiation tool for municipalities, helping to ensure that development is compatible with and supportive of public goals.
- The official map supports other land use management tools (zoning, subdivision/land development, etc.) by advancing the implementation of infrastructure and public spaces.
- The official map gives municipalities a competitive advantage in securing grants.

What are the Basics of Official Maps?

- A municipality should have an adopted comprehensive plan if they choose to adopt an official map.
- Official maps can cover the entire municipality or only a portion.
- The typical cost to develop an official map and ordinance is \$5,000-\$6,000.
- The governing body is required to provide a 45-day review period and one public hearing (at minimum) prior to adoption.
- Once a property owner or developer notifies a municipality of their intention to build, subdivide, or perform other work on land that is located on an official map, the municipality has up to a year to confirm its acquisition interest and negotiate to acquire the land.
- Acquisition can take the form of dedication by owner, purchase of land or easement by the municipality, negotiations with owner/developer to make desired improvements, or eminent domain (although rare), if the municipality chooses.
- Approximately 64 of Pennsylvania's municipalities, and one county, have an official map. This handbook aims to
 reduce misunderstandings and misinformation that may have deterred others from achieving the successes made
 possible by the official map.
- Public outreach and education is key to a successful official map development, adoption, and implementation process.
